2. ENGL 338 - Oral Literature

3cr-01-3cr

Prerequisites: ENGL 101, 122, or permission

Acquaints students with the nature of oral composition, the habits of thought that orality fosters, and the particular mode of awareness the oral dimension of literature demands of an audience (and awakens in a reader). At the conclusion of the course students should have an understanding of the formulaic nature of such purely oral forms as the ballad and the epic and an awareness of the manner in which orality patterns thought differently from writing, and they should be able to detect oral features and patterns in works of literature from cultures not primarily oral but containing a high "oral residue."

3. Current catalog description

ENGL 338 - Oral Literature

3cr-01-3cr

Prerequisites: ENGL 202, 210-213

Acquaints students with the nature of oral composition, the habits of thought that orality fosters, and the particular mode of awareness the oral dimension of literature demands of an audience (and awakens in a reader). At the conclusion of the course students should have an understanding of the formulaic nature of such purely oral forms as the ballad and the epic and an awareness of the manner in which orality patterns thought differently from writing, and they should be able to detect oral features and patterns in works of literature from cultures not primarily oral but containing a high "oral residue."

Prerequisite change from ENGL 101, 122, or permission to ENGL 122, 202, one of 210-213 or 226

4. Rationale: This is a change in pre-requisites only. Originally our curriculum was designed to force students to take all of our survey courses, in order, before moving on to upper-division courses. The realities of registration make this very difficult for students to do and still graduate in a timely manner. Limiting the prerequisites for this course to our introductory majors' course (122) will allow our majors more flexibility. In addition, the ENGL 101 and "or permission" may encourage minors to take the course; the ENGL 202 has been dropped as a prerequisite since success in the course does not depend on research skills.
