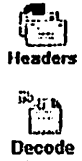

3. Justification/rationale for the change.

**The current prerequisite for Accounting 201 is not necessary to the content of this course. The current Syllabus of Record makes no mention of Accounting practices or theory and therefore, this is simply a catalog change rather than a course change. This prerequisite places an unnecessary constraint on the students' enrollment in this class and the knowledge learned in Accounting 201 is not applied directly and is not necessary for the student's completion of the class assignments or overall objectives.**

Dear Jerry,

As I mentioned to you last semester, our department has voted to eliminate Accounting prerequisites for our IFMG courses. When we spoke, you indicated you had no problem with this decision. Would you mind sending an e-mail to this effect via a reply to me that we can submit as a formal Letter of Acknowledgement along with our Curriculum Proposal/Change paperwork to appropriate curriculum committees, Dean Camp, etc.? The courses involved are as follows:

IFMG 230 - Introduction to Back-End Business Applications  
IFMG 251 - Business Systems Analysis and Design  
IFMG 255 - Business Applications in COBOL  
IFMG 300 - Management Information Systems: Theory and Practice

(Please note that Junior Standing—that requires Accounting 201 and 202—will be required for IFMG 300. This catalog change just eliminates that requirement.)

Our courses, naturally, refer to information systems in the context of functional areas of business and this will not change. However, present our assignments or course objectives require prior accounting knowledge (with the exception of IFMG 300 as discussed above). None of the Syllabi of Record courses mention accounting and, therefore, there is no need for a change in our courses.

Our department appreciates your support in this matter.
