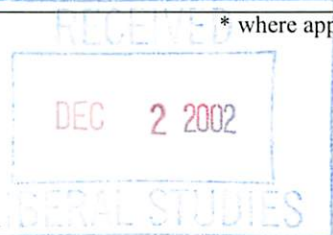

Part II. Description of the Curriculum Change

1. Course to be deleted:

CRIM 361: Juvenile Law (3c-01-3sh) will be deleted. The undergraduate catalog description of this course is as follows:

An analysis of pertinent juvenile law and procedure involving case study methods.

2. Justification/Rationale:

This course, which is currently offered as an elective, is being deleted because of the changing needs of the discipline of criminology. Over the past 15 years, this discipline has evolved from one that was more applied in nature and emphasized knowledge of the skills necessary to work in the criminal justice system, to its current form that focuses on theory, research, and critical thinking about a variety of issues relevant to crime and criminal justice (these specific issues can be identified in the proposed curriculum). CRIM 361, along with another elective pertaining to the topic of juvenile justice, will be replaced with CRIM 235: Survey of Juvenile Justice and Juvenile Law (see Appendix C). This new course will be a controlled elective that students may select from a group of courses that focus on the criminal justice system. CRIM 235 will provide students with a basic knowledge of juvenile justice operations, procedures, techniques, and legal bounds. Other more advanced courses in the proposed curriculum (e.g., CRIM 401: Contemporary Issues in Criminology, CRIM 403: Dilemmas in Criminology and Criminal Justice, CRIM 394: Crime and Delinquency Prevention, CRIM 470: Comparative Study of Justice) will allow students to further examine a variety of issues pertaining to juvenile justice.

3. Impact:

Deletion of CRIM 361 will not affect any other existing criminology courses or programs offered at IUP. Because this course is an elective, students also will not be affected, as a new set of electives is offered in the proposed curriculum (including CRIM 235 mentioned above).

This course is one of seventeen course options that students choosing the Juvenile Delinquency substantive area within the Sociology/Human Services Track may take (see p. 111 in the 2002-03 IUP Undergraduate Catalog). It is also one of fifteen course options that students choosing the Juvenile Delinquency substantive area within the Sociology/Applied Social Research track may take.
