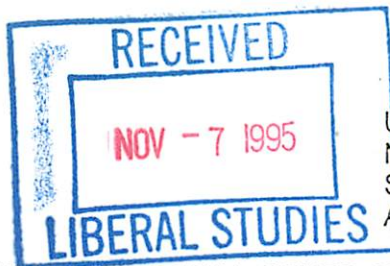

The Gerontology Certificate Program provides an interdisciplinary approach to the systematic study of the aging person and is designed to be combined with any undergraduate major at IUP. The 21-credit-hour program entails three core courses, three elective courses, and an internship that will provide experiential learning in an agency or program serving older adults. 3. Rationale for Change(s)

- a. Elimination of BI 160 as a core course.

This course is not offered at IUP and has been removed from the Catalog. The other Core courses HP 481 (proposed HP 350) Health Aspects of Aging*, HP 413 Physical Activity and Aging, PC 312 Adult Development and Aging, and SO 357 Sociology of Aging are offered routinely, and fulfill the program design which is to allow students to explore various aspects of aging.

These courses were recommended by the individual departments as being appropriate for the Gerontology Certificate Program. Review of their syllabi indicates that they provide information which will enhance the students'

knowledge as it applies to Gerontology.

Increasing the number of electives will offer the students more choice and facilitate the students' enrollment in electives and progression within the Program.

Part III. Implementation. Provide answers to the following questions:

1. How will the proposed revision affect students already in the existing program?

The current students will not be adversely affected. The students will benefit from approved changes because they will be able to take advantage of an increased number of electives.

2. How will the proposed revision affect faculty teaching load?

Students will be able to register for seats in courses which are already being taught. Since the numbers seeking any one course will not be large, it will not affect teaching load, or require additional faculty.

3. Are resources adequate?

Resources are adequate.

4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students?

The Gerontology Certificate Program is currently small, but it is expected that the numbers will grow. The expansion and updating of appropriate courses will enable the enrollment of students into courses that fit their needs and interests. Since the program entails courses from several departments, the addition of students into a variety of courses should not place a burden on any department.

IV. Course Proposals


All courses added to this revision are currently approved, offered university courses. All courses deleted are those courses that are no longer available.

BI 160, Biology of Aging, has never been offered by the Department of Biology (it's no wonder "Students from time to time indicate difficulty in scheduling this course"). The course was apparently developed by Dr. Harold Grau before he left IUP. He never taught it nor has any other faculty. This past year I asked Diane Duntley to remove BI 160 from the University catalog.

I must admit, while I am certain the "Gerontology Certificate Program is alive and well," I personally have never had a single student ask me about any appropriate Biology courses for the program. The program, as developed, did not list, other than BI 160, any biology courses as appropriate.

I am not certain how large your certificate program is, but with small enough numbers there might be other course options available. If you feel other courses are appropriate, please let me know and we can discuss those possibilities.

In response to your memo of October 19, 1994 in which you requested scheduling information for our courses that are listed as components of the Gerontology Certificate Program. I submit the following:

CS 315 Consumer Economics and Family Finance is offered every semester, usually two sections. It will not be offered Summer 1995.

HE 324 Family Dynamics is offered every semester but enrollment is by permission only because there is limited seats and it is a "Writing Intensive" course. Linda Nelson issues the permission for the course.

HE 456 Independent Living for Individuals has not been offered since 1990 and until additional staff is acquired the likelihood of offering it in the near future is slim. We do have the resources to offer the course but not the faculty.


I am pleased to learn that the Gerontology Certificate Program is alive and well. If there is anything our department can do, please do not hesitate to contact us. Thank you.
