Chronological study from ancient times to the mid-19th century of the dominant influences and characteristics of historical interiors, furniture, and ornamental design. Emphasis placed upon stylistic detail and its relationship to social, economic, political, religious and aesthetic influences; and to the contemporary scene.

Emphasis placed upon <u>stylistic</u> detail and its relationship to social, economic, political, religious and aesthetic influences; and to the contemporary scene.

 - a. Course prefix and number change are in line with the revised Interior Design program proposal.

 The name change more specifically reflects the content of the course and the chronological order in which it should be taken. This course is proposed as the prerequisite of ID 380 Development of Design II (currently CS 463 Modern Interiors).
 - b. Stylistic is a better word to describe the details.
