___A. PURPOSE, RESEARCH VARIABLES, AND POPULATION

<u>Purpose of the study</u>- The current study investigates IUP student's perceptions of recently released prisoners. The students will be categorized based on where they are from: an urban or rural environment, with the overall goal testing if students from rural areas view ex-offenders differently than students from urban areas.

Background- The field of prisoner reentry was formed by criminologists and policy makers as a way to combat the high recidivism rates that plague our country's corrections system (Travis, 2005). As inmates are released from prison, they often face an uphill battle in successfully reintegrating with society and desisting from further sanctions. Most of the research on reentry addresses the intertwining problems with employment, housing, and mental health and substance abuse issues (Petersilia, 2003; Travis, 2005). Government funding and policies have been put in place to aid in the reentry process for ex-offenders, but they are often focused in urban communities. Rural areas face additional problems for formerly incarcerated individuals on both to social and structural level (Wodahl, 2006). There is distrust in outsider help and family centered orientation in rural areas may lead to more negative views of those with a criminal record (Wodahl, 2006). The current study investigates differences in perceptions of ex-offenders from college students who are from rural or urban communities. Based on previous prisoner reentry research addressing differences in rural and urban areas (Robertson, 1997; Wohahl, 2006), it is hypothesized that students from rural communities will be less accepting of formerly incarcerated individuals. Because rural reentry is a field of limited research, differences in perceptions could identify another barrier faced by inmates reintegrating back into rural communities that differentiates them from their urban counterparts.

Characteristics of the Subject Population-The following information should be provided:

- a. <u>Age Range-IUP</u> undergraduates will be included in the current study. No specific age range is desired, but it is expected that most respondents will fall between ages 18 to 24. Students under the age of 18 will be directed not to participate.
- b. Sex-There is no restriction on the sex of the respondents
- c. Number-A total of 2,000 students will be emailed a link to a Qualtrics survey. I am hoping for a response rate of at least 10%.
- d. <u>Inclusion Criteria</u>- All IUP students who were raised in the state of PA will be included in the current study.
- e. Exclusion Criteria-Students who were not raised in PA will be excluded from the current study. Students will be grouped based on which PA county they were raised in and then cross referenced with the Center for Rural Pennsylvania's classification of rural and urban counties to group students into being raised in either a rural or urban county. Because this information is not known in other states, those students will be excluded from the current study.
- f. Vulnerable Subjects- No vulnerable subjects will be included in the current study.

Method of Subj. Selection-Describe the study's method(s) of identification and recruitment of prospective subjects.

The current study will utilize Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) undergraduate students from Pennsylvania as the unit of analysis. Because the nature of this study is exploratory in nature, college students serve as an adequate sample for preliminary analysis. College students will be surveyed in this study because of the availability of such a large group of individuals from both rural and urban areas. Students at the IUP will serve as an adequate sample for this study as IUP is a medium state institution with diverse students from various parts of the state of Pennsylvania.

Using IUP college students as the population, a simple random sample will be drawn of undergraduate IUP students. This sample will come in the form of email addresses of students provided by the Applied Research Lab at IUP. The Applied Research Lab has access to software that, with IRB permission granted, can obtain a random sample from all undergraduate email addresses at IUP. Because only students from Pennsylvania will be utilized in the study, a recruiting email that is sent out to the students will be addressed for only students who were raised in Pennsylvania to answer. The first item on the survey will also include a screening question for only students raised in PA to continue on with the survey.

<u>Study Site</u>- This study will take place using the online tool Qualtrics. A random sample of IUP undergraduates will be sent the survey via their IUP email addresses.

Methods and Procedures Applied to Human Subjects-

A cross sectional survey design will be implemented in this study. College student's perceptions of ex-offenders will be measured using a 10-item scale constructed by the researcher. Because no scale measuring public opinion of ex-offenders was found in the literature, one was constructed for this study. The students will be separated into two groups based on whether they grew up in an urban or rural county.

Survey methodology was chosen for the current study as it is the most succinct way to collect information from a large group of people in a short amount of time. The respondents will be asked to respond to a short survey of approximately 20 questions. To obtain a measurement of college student's perceptions of formerly incarcerated individuals, a 10-item scale was developed for the current study. Asking questions relating to the major topics in prisoner reentry as well as general perceptions toward crime control and punishment, the instrument measures broad opinions toward ex-offenders. In addition to the scale items, there are eight other questions asked that will be used as independent variables in the study. These include that county the respondents were raised in, age, gender, race, major, academic year, and the amount of criminology courses they have taken. In addition, the respondents will be asked if they know anyone who had served time in jail or prison and if they have noticed if they had been treated differently. These questions will serve as control variables in the analysis. Additionally, the survey begins by asking if the student is a resident of the state of Pennsylvania. If answered affirmatively, the student is asked to identify the county. This information in only used to determine if the student was primarily raised in a rural versus urban county.

__C. RISKS/BENEFITS

<u>Potential Risks</u>-Identify the potential risks of the study. There are no foreseeable risks in the current study. This study merely asks about students opinions.

Potential Benefication There are no direct benefits to the proticipants. The current study is exploratory in nature, used to determine if the care differences in public perception of ex-offenders in college students. Results of this study could lead to future research on a wider scale that identify rural resident's perceptions of formerly incarcerated individuals.

<u>Compensation for Participation</u>-No compensation will be used in the current study. Participation is completely voluntary

<u>Alternatives to Participation</u>-Participants can opt out of taking the survey with no penalty. There are no other alternatives to participation

Information Withheld-No information will be withheld from the participants

<u>Debriefing-No debriefing procedure is necessary in the current survey.</u>

Participations will be thanked for their participation at the conclusion of the study.

_D. CONFIDENTIALITY

All Information will be gathered from the online survey tool Qualtrics and all of the respondent's information will be completely anonymous. Data will be gathered and analyzed in the aggregate, with no individual responses used in the presentation of the data.
