

YOUR EDUCATION AT IUP

The Ph.D. in Administration and Leadership Studies (ALS), with an emphasis on Nonprofit and Public sectors, prepares you to excel in leadership positions in a variety of settings. Experience a program in which you'll meet other professionals who are working in such areas as higher education, K-12 education, human services, nonprofit administration, health care, criminal justice, government, corporate leadership, and the military.

You can earn your doctorate without interrupting your career by taking courses weekday evenings and some Saturdays at one of two locations: the Dixon University Center, located in a picturesque setting along the Susquehanna River in Harrisburg; or IUP's main campus in Indiana, Pennsylvania. By taking two courses per semester, summers included, you can complete your coursework in less than three years.

Throughout the program, you will experience a cohort model with limited enrollment. This means you will progress through your sequence of courses with your classmates as a group, which will enable you to build and maintain a supportive professional and academic network.

CURRICULUM

The ALS Ph.D. curriculum is designed to enhance your leadership development skills and administrative capacity. You will learn to apply theory and research in a variety of contexts and will be encouraged to tailor your research to your individual area of expertise and desired focus. Additionally, you will learn to critique research, evaluate studies, and successfully design, conduct, and defend your own original research study.

Throughout the program, you will take 61 credit hours, which include coursework, two comprehensive exams, and a dissertation.

APPLICATION PROCESS

New students are admitted to the Ph.D. in ALS and begin classes during the summer preceding the fall semester with a Proseminar course designed as an introduction to doctoral-level studies. Cohorts begin in even years at the Indiana campus and in odd years at the Harrisburg site.

A master's degree is required. Some background in the social sciences is helpful but not required.

Submit the following items to IUP's School of Graduate Studies and Research:

- Application form (paper or on-line version. Visit www.iup.edu/admissions/graduate/howto)
- \$40 nonrefundable application fee (fees subject to change)
- Three letters of recommendation (professional or academic)
- Signed, dated statement of career and academic goals
- Official transcripts from all colleges and universities attended
- Official GRE test scores (no substitutions accepted)
- Work Experience Statement (either a vitae or resume)
- A major writing sample such as a master's thesis, course paper, policy document, or program report

A personal interview may be requested.
