I wish to express my gratitude to the many of you who have generously provided support to the Allegheny Arboretum. The Arboretum is an ongoing project that will continue to

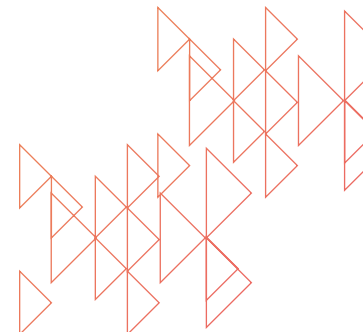
evolve as part of IUP and the Indiana community. Without your support, we will not be able to accomplish our goals.

# PAST TO PRESENT: THE IUP OAK GROVE

You know the Oak Grove as the center of administrative, academic, and cultural activities of the university. Addressing the “health” of this attractive and memorable space was also one of the reasons for the creation of the Arboretum. Indeed, one of the first activities of the newly formed Arboretum Board in 2001 was to obtain a Phase I Kiski Basin Initiative Grant for maintenance of the Oak Grove.

In spring 2015, IUP Magazine featured the “Evolution of the Oak Grove.” Since 2015, additional trees and tree species have been added with the intent of adding diversity to the grove. In addition to tree care, all of the 25 benches in the grove have been replaced with the support of donations from “Friends of the Arboretum.”

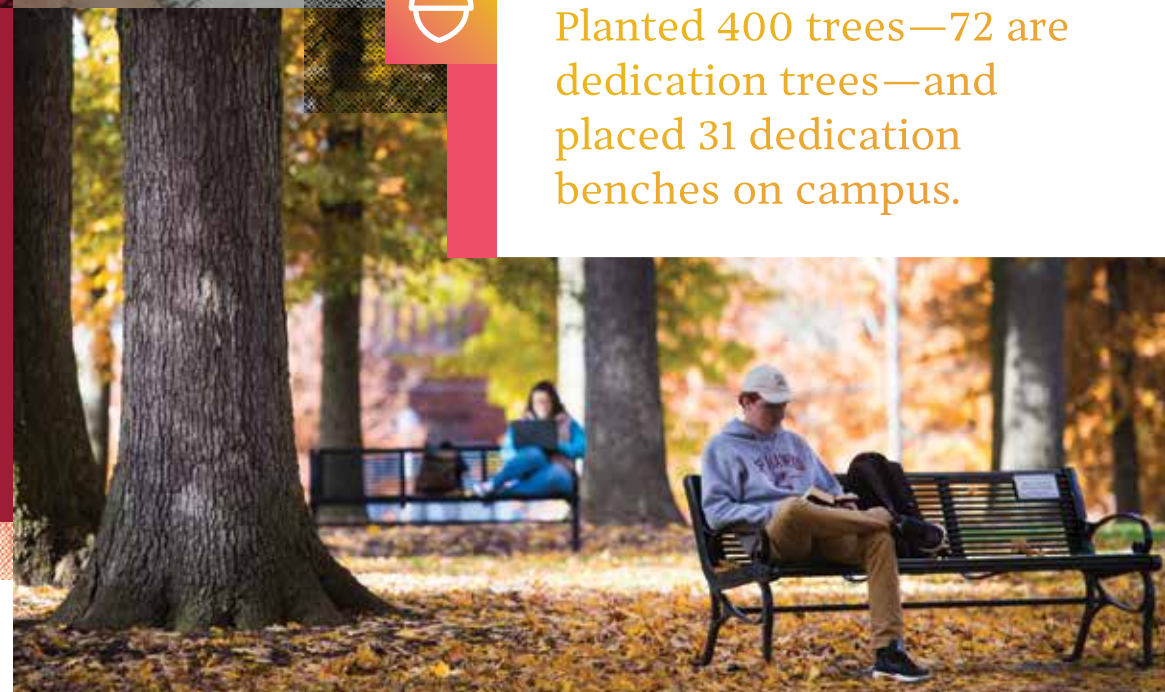

The Oak Grove’s history goes back as far as IUP, with some of the current trees in it believed to date back to the strand of trees that would become the site of Sutton Hall. As we look forward, the Arboretum will continue to promote a healthy and diverse Oak Grove.

## EAST LAWN: “THE FRONT YARD OF THE UNIVERSITY”

Since its opening in 1875, Sutton Hall’s East Lawn has acted at the “front yard” of the university. Over the years, the site has been the home of the university flag pole, ornamental fountain, and gazebo. It has seen graduation ceremonies, May flagpole celebrations, class pictures, Earth Day celebrations, movies, concerts, and many other university functions.

Flagstone Theater was constructed in 1958 as the first funded project of the IUP Foundation. Before its removal in 2015, it was the site of many student activities.

The fountain was a favorite setting for photographic poses and even inspired a young poet: “Its’ tinkling, laughing, happy chime seems like youth’s unending chant / Its’ ever upward flow, like young forces leaves no room for ‘can’t.”

The Arboretum Board would like to have the fountain, that was removed in 1970, replaced.

Over the years, the east lawn area has seen a general decline in tree cover and maintenance. In 2003, the Arboretum received a Phase II Kiski Basin Initiative Grant to address these trends. The resulting \$6,000 was designated for tree maintenance in the east lawn area.

Completed in 2009, the Campus Preservation Plan that was prepared by the Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation noted that the tree cover in the east lawn area had declined over the years. As the report recommended, “the planting of long-lived monarch trees should be expanded campus-wide to beautify and unify the grounds. The Oak Grove is an excellent model and should be used as a guide for planting throughout the entire campus.”

Following these recommendations, the Arboretum Board started a “reforesting” plan for the east lawn. In 2000, tree analysis data recorded the presence of 26 trees representing 12 species in the east lawn. Since then, 18 trees representing 13 species have been added to the same space. The resulting 44 trees representing 23 species will re-establish the ‘cathedral-like’ canopy that once existed here. Future plans will add a few additional trees to the area.



# CONFLUENCE DISCOVERY PARK 2030 MASTER PLAN

In 2017, the Allegheny Arboretum and IUP were awarded \$220,000 from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Economic Development for a Greenways, Trails, and Recreation Program Grant. IUP matched a portion (15%) of the total and contributed an additional \$33,000. The \$253,000 total was used to pay for the development of the Confluence Discovery Park 2030 Master Plan that was completed in 2019.

The next step in the project will be to obtain funds for Phase II – Overview and Construction Documents, which will provide the engineering and construction plans for building the first phase of the five-phase master plan proposal. The Allegheny Arboretum Board and IUP will work with the University Advancement Division, IUP Research Institute, and the Foundation for IUP to identify and apply for funding for Phase II from public and private sources.

Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all plans for fundraising had to be suspended. The current plan is for attempts to start looking for potential funding sources for Phase II to be made in the coming year.



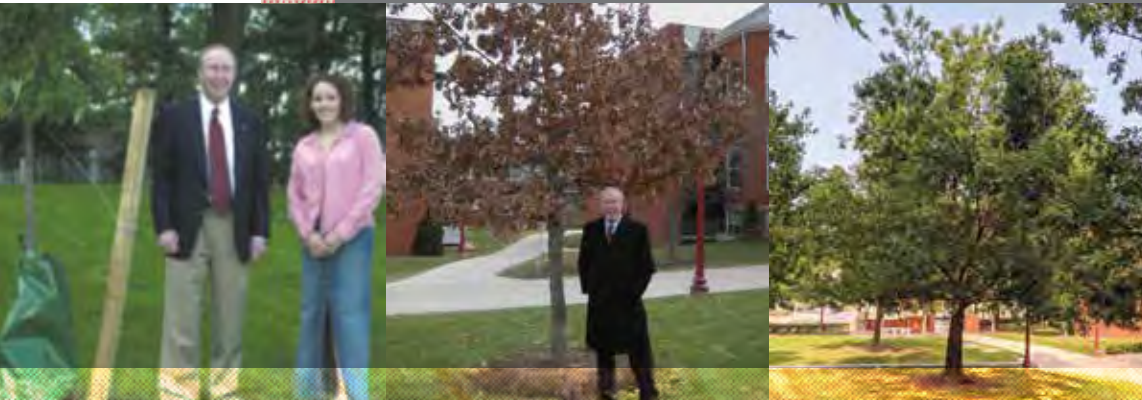

## LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS AWARD

This year, the League of Women Voters of Indiana County awarded the 2020 Peggy Clark Grassroots Environmental Leadership Award for an organization to the Allegheny Arboretum. In his confirmation letter, Dr. Thomas Simmons stated that “the Allegheny Arboretum demonstrates grassroots leadership by the collective action of community leaders and Indiana University of Pennsylvania professors in their efforts to effectively change how our regional flora is preserved and protected by educating others about local environmental conditions and the need to protect natural resources.” The Allegheny Arboretum Board and IUP thank the League of Women Voters of Indiana County for this recognition and support.



## ART IN THE ARBORETUM



In February 2020, the Art in the Arboretum Committee evaluated three student projects. The winning selection was “Birds of a Tree,” submitted by Dave Salinas and Katie West.

The artwork would have been composed of four vertical sculptures presented on posts, along with a central vertical piece. Its location was planned on the northeast grassy corner of the parking lot adjacent to Wayne Avenue. Due to the pandemic, the project had to be canceled. However, the students were each awarded \$250 for their winning proposal. Future Art in the Arboretum projects are not planned at this time.



Electronic Marketing: From 2004-13 students in the Electronic Imaging classes created posters that could be used for marketing the Arboretum. The students were under the direction of Drs. Dennis Ausel and Christopher Juengel from the Communications Media Department at IUP.



# SCIENCE DISCOVERY AND OUTDOOR LEARNING CENTER DEDICATION

On October 18, 2019, the Science Discovery and Outdoor Learning Center was renamed the Larry F. Sabotka Science Discovery and Outdoor Learning Center in honor of Mr. Sabotka, a 1963 graduate of IUP. He provided \$150,000 to support the center and create a scholarship. He also pledged upward of \$1 million to sustain the center for the future.

Originally opened in 2011, the center is located in the rear courtyard of Stouffer Hall. In this outdoor classroom facility, students and educators have access to state-of-the-art facilities and a lush natural environment for versatile learning on campus.

## DESIGN REVIEW COMMITTEE

In cooperation with IUP, the Design Review Committee has provided suggestions regarding what trees should be planted in conjunction with the landscaping around new buildings. Examples include the North Dining Hall, Northern Suites, Humanities and Social Sciences Building, and the Creative Arts Plaza.

The committee has submitted its recommendations for the new John J. and Char Kopchick Hall, including the planting of several tree species that were removed for the construction of the new building. The major goals of the committee are to select suitable tree species that fit the landscaping around the new building and to increase the diversity of trees on campus.

## ACADEMIC COMMITTEE

Over the past 20 years, faculty and students from five departments (Anthropology; Art; Biology; Geography and Regional Planning; and Geoscience) have been involved in teaching and research projects related to the Arboretum. The first faculty/student project was a survey of the trees in the Oak Grove, which was completed in 2002. This led to the publication of the *Trees of Indiana University of Pennsylvania*, created in 2003 by students working with Dr. Jerry Pickering in his Plant Taxonomy class. This formed the basis for the 2006 publication of the *Map and Guide to the Living Collection of the Campus Trees*. The guide was updated in 2017 and 2020.

Over the past year, students have worked with Dr. Tomas Simmons of the Biology Department and Dr. Lara Homsey-Messer of the Anthropology Department. Both projects have taken place in the south campus woods.

Dr. Simmons and his students have established plots for the long-term (5-year) study of forest ecology. In addition, studies have taken place involving mast production by monitoring acorn production at selected sites. Mast production refers to edible or reproductive parts produced by woody plants.

Dr. Messer's students have been involved in the creation of soil pits for the purpose of teaching students about soil science. This is the result of an agreement between IUP and Soil Hub, LLC. The purpose of the agreement is twofold. Soil Hub will use the pits to run DEP-approved soil and wetland delineation training for environmental practitioners, such as sewage enforcement officers. IUP will use them as experiential training loci for classes in Archaeology, Geology, Biology, and Environmental Engineering. IUP students will be able to take Soil Hub workshops free of charge, and IUP will receive 8% of registration fees. Soil Hub provides online and in-person soil science training classes.

# HARVEST TO USE PROJECT

In December 2004, Chris Weiland and his coworkers from the Center for Turning and Furniture Design cut planks from the first tree, a white oak, saved on campus as part of the Harvest to Use Project. The wood planks were dried in the wood drying building to be later used in various faculty and student projects of the Center for Turning and Furniture Design and Art Department at IUP. The wood from approximately 280 trees has been “recycled” through this project.



# COMMUNITY OUTREACH

An important goal of the Arboretum involves community outreach. This has been accomplished in several ways:

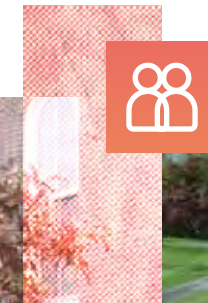
- walking tours of the Arboretum
- presentations to community organizations
- radio interviews
- financial contributions to worthy causes.

Cub Scout members have assisted in the planting of trees in the Arboretum and Indiana County's Memorial Park. The Arboretum has funded the planting of "public trees" at various locations including Indiana Memorial Park, Mack Park, the Heritage Garden at IUP, downtown Punxsutawney, and the Indiana Multi-Model project. Information about the Arboretum has appeared annually in the *Keystone Gardener*, the official publication of the Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania.

In 2013, a three-week Arboretum Museum Exhibit took place with support from the University Museum, the Evergreen Garden Club, and the Indiana Garden Club. The show featured prints, drawings, and watercolors from the collection of the Hunt Institute of Botanical Documentation at Carnegie Mellon University. It also featured displays on the lumber history of the Indiana region and Arboretum related faculty and student activities.



Members of the Board have been active in various community organizations such as: Livable Indiana Neighborhood Connections (LINC), Indiana Community University District (ICUD) project, Stormwater Education Partnership, Indiana Shade Tree Commission, and Indiana County Walk Works Program. Future presentations are planned on the proposed *Confluence Discovery Park 2030 Master Plan*.

## Summary of selected Allegheny Arboretum activities

- 2000** Arboretum established.
- 2001** Approved name, Allegheny Arboretum at IUP consisting of the entire campus. Goals, objectives, and collection policy of the arboretum established.
- 2002** Awarded \$5,000, matched, by IUP to fund Phase I of the “Oak Grove Renovation and Preservation Project.” Maintenance is done on Oak Grove trees.
- 2003** Arboretum web page developed.
- 2004** Allegheny Arboretum becomes part of IUP under the vice president for Administration and Finance. Arboretum becomes a 501(c)(3) organization, with all finances maintained by the Foundation for IUP. The first tree (a white oak) is cut and used as part of the “Harvest to Use Initiative.”
- 2005** *Campus Tree Tour Map and Guide* published.
- 2006** Allegheny Arboretum exhibit at the University Museum co-sponsored by the Evergreen Garden Club with displays on botanical art prints from the Hunt Botanical Institute and the lumbering history of western Pennsylvania.
- 2007** As part of the arboretum's Outreach Program, twelve identification plaques were placed on selected trees in Indiana's Memorial Park. The locations of each of the forty total trees in the park were also mapped.
- 2008** Construction begins on the “Heritage Garden” that replaced the “Touch and Smell Garden.”
- 2009** Wood-drying building constructed as part of the “Harvest to Use Initiative.”
- 2010** Allegheny Arboretum included in the *2030 Campus Facilities Master Plan*. The first steps are taken in the construction of the Stouffer Hall Outdoor Learning and Teaching Laboratory.
- 2011** *Allegheny Arboretum Concept Overlay Plan* completed.
- 2012** Stouffer Hall Outdoor Learning and Teaching Laboratory dedicated.
- 2013** *Tree Inventory and Management Plan for the IUP Campus* completed.
- 2014** Allegheny Arboretum receives a Level I accreditation from the ArbNet Arboretum Accreditation Program. Arboretum video released ([www.iup.edu/arboretum](http://www.iup.edu/arboretum))
- 2015** Best College Reviews ranks Allegheny Arboretum 10th in a listing of the 50 most beautiful college arboretums. Annual Report featured “Art in the Arboretum” of all the sculptures on campus.
- 2016** First “Art in the Arboretum” student sculpture awarded.

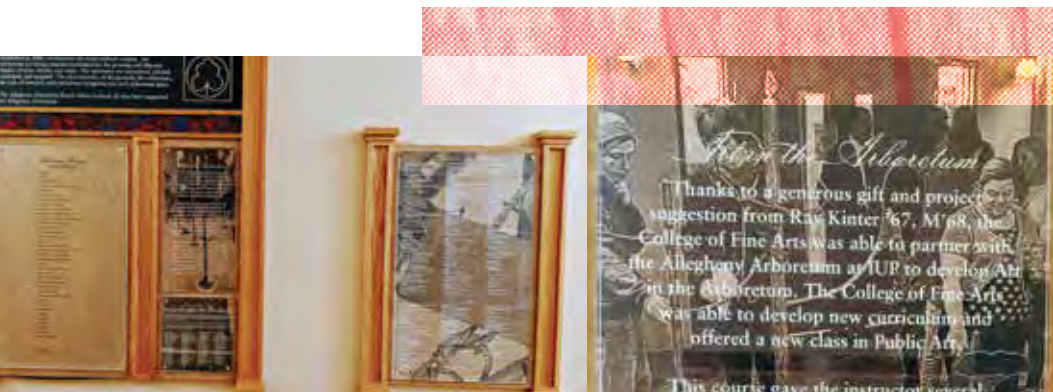
