President's Report

Provost's Report

Good afternoon,

Last week, there was a ribbon cutting for Kopchick Hall. It was extremely well attended. Exciting things are ahead for us with this new building. I want to say a special thanks to Dean Hovan who did great work in planning this event.

IRMC Rural Health Conference will be held on Thursday, November 16 from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the KCAC. We are still accepting registrations. There are some great topics and I hope that you will make plans to attend.

IUP's kick-off meeting for OneSIS was held recently. Additional meetings will be held over the next few months. I want to thank Chris Kitas and Amanda Marshall for their leadership with this project. Our go live date is fall of 2025.

As you know, we have been engaged in an academic program review and restructuring. These are parallel processes. Programs are currently immersed in a self-study to put forward recommendations about the future of their programs. This review is to result in one of the following recommendations:

- Continue with no action;
- Continue with curricular modification;
- Report ways to share courses or programs within IUP;
- Report ways to share courses across PASSHE;
- Discontinue programs, but keep or develop service mission; or
- Discontinue program.

Two open fora were held to provide an opportunity for everyone to engage in conversations and react to the proposed structures. This was followed by two new proposed structures. We are in the final stages of working through the feedback regarding the new proposed structures. We will post the recommended academic structure tomorrow, along with the rationale. We are looking forward to sharing what we recommend. Cabinet reviewed the new recommended structure yesterday and there will be an opportunity for the Council of Trustees to review it as well.

Question from a member in the audience:

When should we start to submit curriculum changes that need to take place.

Answer from Provost Luetkehans:

We are working on an implementation plan that will occur in the spring semester. You should start to conceptualize the curriculum changes, but there will be guidance on how to use Curriculog to move through the process.

Ouestion from a member in the audience:

Is the restructure that is to be announced tomorrow the final version?

Answer from Provost Luetkehans:

It is the final recommendation, but we anticipate that there may be some final tweaks.

- Abby Hancox, Student Government Association President
- In response to the off-campus incident of violence on October 8, SGA, in collaboration with GSA, hosted an information session on October 10. Dr. Segar, Michelle Fryling, and Chief Stringer were in attendance to provide information and answer questions students had about the incident.
- The majority of the student concerns revolved around IUP's response to the incident. After the session, I do believe that the students with such concerns were able walk

- away with a better understanding of IUP emergency response protocol, especially with this incident being off campus.
- Students in attendance expressed interest in active shooter trainings for students, faculty, etc. As such, SGA will be looking to host an active shooter training for students in the future.

Graduate Student Assembly Remarks

- Koga Chilume, Graduate Student Assembly President
- Echoed the information provided by Abby Hancox. GSA will continue to work to provide future additional resources.

Vice President for Student Affairs' Remarks

- Dr. Thomas Segar, Vice President for Student Affairs
- Appreciated students wanting to share their thoughts and feelings regarding the occurrence. Information regarding training from University Police is forthcoming and will focus on keeping the IUP community safe.
- Student Affairs and University Police work hand in hand with other university and community partners to keep the campus community safe.
- The addition of Marketing and Communications with Student Affairs will lead to a great opportunity to enhance the communications sent to the university community.
- Encouraging students to sign-up for <u>Everbridge</u> is an important part of the onboarding process and will continue in the future.

New Business

- A vote was taken to determine preferred meeting method for future meetings. The committee will continue to meet via Zoom.
- Article Discussion <u>Survey</u>: <u>Barriers to college students' campus engagement</u> (<u>insidehighered.com</u>)

The article identified advertising (students not being aware of opportunities), conflicts with days/times of activities and other commitments (often work) as primary barriers from a national survey. It also highlighted some of the benefits of on-campus work for students and noted that incentives for attendance/participation can be helpful. The article also indicated that students want in-person activities as opposed to virtual, and their primary goal of participation in co-curricular involvement is to meet new people.

- o Discussion of barriers to engagement and how they impact our students at IUP.
 - Feeling of connectedness.
 - Lack of available time due to needing to work.
 - Some students may feel connected because of their involvement with athletics or other groups.
 - Some students do not feel the need to engage with others because they have found their group.
- o How can we help students select a modest number of things to be involved in?

- Quality vs quantity.
- 15-20 hours of employment per week is the sweet spot.
- Need for students to have events where they can bring their friend groups and events where they can meet new friends.
- Advertisement
 - Word of mouth and social media are the main methods as of now.
- o Employment
 - Considerations being made to reduce the level of clearance required to be employed on campus. However, one student member indicated that having the clearances as part of that process can be helpful for other activities that require them, like internships.
- Student Affairs Organization Review
 - Dr. Segar shared the organizational structure for Student Affairs to provide context for the committee's work.
