Honors Trips Are Back!

After years of pandemic-related uncertainty, we are reviving Cook Honors College trips in 2023. Over spring break Dr. Ken Sherwood will take students on a sailing excursion around the Florida Keys, where they will read related literature, keep journals, learn about the eco-system from area experts, and gain practical experience in the art of sailing and living communally on a boat.

In July, CHC director Dr. Craig and volcanologist Dr. Nick Deardorff (Geoscience) will lead twelve students on a two-week journey through Iceland. Students will learn about Icelandic sagas and folklore, volcanoes and glaciers, and sustainability initiatives unique to the country.

Students planning to join these trips are eligible for support through the Cook Achievement Fund. Many of them have never been abroad or even taken a flight on a plane before. In keeping with the purpose of the Fund, we are giving CHC students new experiences that will no doubt change their lives in ways they can't yet know. Honors College Students Center Community and Belonging in Dallas

This year's theme at the National Collegiate Honors Council (NCHC) conference in Dallas, Texas was "Centering Community," and four Cook Honor College students in attendance lived that theme through their scholarship and service activities.

Milady Lagunas (junior, political science), Magali Ortiz-Ayllon (junior, early childhood/special education), Estefani Sánchez Fonseca (senior, political science), and Jorge Tapia Becerril (senior, political science) presented a panel on student perspectives on the recruitment and retention of Latinx students. The wellattended event was moderated by CHC director Dr. Chauna Craig.

Three of the students also opted to join an NCHC sponsored service event at Kirkpatrick Middle School in Fort Worth helping middle school children paint a mural around the theme of immigration and belonging. Milady Lagunas, in an interview televised by KXAS-TV, the NBC affiliate in Fort Worth, described how important it was for her to model to the children that they have a place in higher education. In 2020-21 just over sixty percent of Kirkpatrick Middle School students were enrolled in bilingual and English education programs, many of whom are considered at high risk of dropping out of school.

"Since the loosening of pandemic restrictions, we've taken students to two honors conferences, one regional and one national," said Dr. Craig. "In Philadelphia, conference organizers told me how amazing our group was, and in Dallas, a student came up after the panel to say that she wished she were in our honors college. I could not be any prouder of how well these students represent Cook Honors College."

Milady Lagunas felt the conference was the experience of a lifetime. "I not only got the opportunity to represent the CHC with pride, but I was also able to visit a new city with my closest friends. We learned so much from each other and from the experience, and we will definitely remember this as one of our highlights of our time at IUP. We are also thankful for the achievement fund, which made this trip possible!" she said.


Whitmyre Hall Returns
