Applied Research Track (Substantive Area Changes for Controlled Electives)

List of all associated changes and rationale.

1 CDFR prefix changes

Rationale:

Prefix changes from HMEC to CDFR are already reflected in the catalog for Interpersonal and Family Sociology substantive area.

2 Criminology Changes

Rationale:

We need to remove courses that are no longer being offered by Criminology in the Juvenile Delinquency substantive area in the Applied Research Track.

- CRIM 451 (Etiology of Delinquent Behavior) is no longer offered and will be removed, leaving SOC 333 (Delinquency and Youth) as the only required course.
- Under the electives, CRIM 270 (Juvenile Justice Systems), 361 (Juvenile Law), 370 (Correctional Institutions) and 451 (Etiology of Delinquent Behavior) will be removed as they are no longer offered.
- The elective criminology course replacements for the courses no longer offered will be as follows: CRIM 394 (Crime and Delinquency Prevention), 225 (Survey of Corrections) and 235 (Survey of Juvenile Justice and Juvenile Law).

3 For Community Development Substantive for Applied Research Track

Rationale:

- PLSC 354 (Metropolitan Problems) – the course has not been offered for quite some time and correspondence with the Political Science department indicated that it may not be offered in the near future and suggested possible substitution for our Community Development substantive area students.
- The PLSC 354 course is no longer being offered. SOC 448 (Social Policy) was selected as an appropriate substitute for students in this substantive area.

4 There appears to be a typo under the Community Development substantive area in the Applied Research Track

Rationale:

- As listed previously, 2 courses were required along with 4 elective courses (totaling 6 courses) as opposed to the other 5 substantive areas, which required a choice of 1 of 2 required courses and 4 electives for a total of 5 courses).
- Committee suggests following the format of other substantive areas (1 required course, 4 electives).

5 Deviance course placement (SOC 269)

Rationale:

Course placement suggestions because of the good fit with the substantive area of study:

1. Juvenile Delinquency substantive area in the Applied Research Track under controlled electives.
2. Community Development substantive area in the Applied Research Track under controlled electives.
3. Interpersonal and Family Soc substantive area in the Applied Research Track under controlled electives.

6 For Medical Sociology Substantive for Applied Research Track

Rationale:

- Add SOC 357 Sociology of Aging under controlled electives.

Rationale.

1 These changes will give students a broader selection of controlled electives in the respective substantive areas, come into compliance with changes already made in other departments (for example, Child Development and Family Relations and Criminology).

Implementation.

1 How will the revision impact students already in the track?
Students will have more options available to them in their substantive areas for selecting controlled electives.

2 Are faculty resources adequate?
Yes, it is believed that faculty resources are adequate. These are not new courses with the exception of SOC 269 which will be offered with existing faculty by rotating other courses previously taught to other professors.

3 Are other resources adequate?
Yes, for the same reasons listed above.

4 Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students?
No. We anticipate the number of students in the Applied Research Track to remain similar with similar selections for controlled electives; however, they now have more choices.

Periodic Assessment.

1 Describe the evaluation plan.
There is no accrediting body for Sociology, so the only evaluation is the university's five year review.

2 Frequency of evaluations.
Every five years.

3 Evaluating entity.
Department and outside reviewer.

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
