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
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A MESSAGE FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT

Whoever would have known that while helping his son, Chris, in 2001, by participating in a weekend outdoor sport show, the course of John's future would change so dramatically?!

Summit Tree Stands needed a weekend representative to attend a show in Harrisburg. That weekend was the beginning of a long and prosperous opportunity for John and his family. John started hunting as a 16-year-old in Western Pennsylvania and has since travelled nationally and internationally, participating in and promoting the sport he loves.

RECIPE CORNER

Zucchini Relish

10 cups zucchini, chopped (about 9 medium) 4 cups onion, chopped (about 3 large) 5 tbsp. salt

Mix the above and let stand overnight - then rinse and drain

1 tbsp. cornstarch

2 tsp. celery seed

1 sweet red bell pepper, seeded and chopped

1 green bell pepper, seeded and chopped

5 cups sugar

2-1/2 cups vinegar

1 tbsp. turmeric

1 tsp. black pepper

Add remaining ingredients and simmer uncovered 30 minutes

Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal. Makes about 7 pints.

Hummus with Tahini

1 can (15.5 oz.) chickpeas, drained $\&\ rinsed$

1/3 cup lemon juice, fresh or bottled

1/4 cup tahini

2 cloves garlic, crushed

2 tbsp. olive oil

1/2 tsp. cumin powder

1/2 tsp. cayenne pepper

1/8 tsp. red pepper flakes, use less if too zippy

Pinch black pepper, fresh ground

1 tsp. salt

1/3 cup water

*Alternate to red pepper flakes—use roasted red peppers. Mince the red peppers and put in blender at step 1 (see directions at end of recipe on roasting red peppers).

- **Alternate to red pepper flakes AND cayenne pepper. Blend in 1/2 cup green olives with pimentos.
 - 1. Put 1/2 of the lemon juice, tahini, garlic, olive oil, cumin powder, cayenne pepper, red pepper flakes, black pepper, salt, and water into the blender and blend for 5 seconds.
 - 2. Add the chickpeas and blend on high until it reaches the consistency of sour cream, but granular, about 30 seconds or longer if so desired.
 - 3. Blend in the remaining lemon juice, to taste. If the dip is too thick, add a little water slowly and blend until it reaches the correct consistency.
 - 4. Pour into a serving bowl, cover and refrigerate for a few hours before serving. (It can be eaten immediately, but becomes even more flavorful if left to chill well.)

If desired, drizzle olive oil over the top and add a garnish of parsley before serving. Serve with pita wedges or slices of whole grain breads or veggies.

Note: Be sure to rinse the canned chickpeas well to clear away the taste of any ingredients used in the canning process.

How to Roast Red Peppers:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 375 or 400 degrees Fahrenheit. Cut up the peppers first, usually into 3 flat sections, removing the seeds. Lay skin-side up on a non-stick sheet or on aluminum foil shiny side up leaving a bit of space between them. Bake approximately 10-15 minutes.
- 2. Once you notice the skin has started to wrinkle and blister, even turning brown and puffing up in spots, remove the peppers and cool them in a bowl covered with cling wrap (or in a plastic bag).

Dog Days of August for the Office of Conference Services!

If you were on campus during the month of August anytime in the past fifteen years, you might have seen a large tent set up across the lawn of Zink Hall, and under that tent you would have seen a number of dogs ----- many, many dogs of all different sizes, shapes, and colors!

The Office of Conference Services once again coordinated the Advanced (American) Dog Show Judges Institute on August 10-14. In the dog world the Institute is the only one of its kind and is considered to be very prestigious, attracting participants from all across the United States. Attendees are either already a judge of one or more breeds but interested in elevating their skills to a higher level, or they may be interested in learning the standards of judging a different breed. Learning workshops are held in the morning, with one dog in the classroom for demonstrations of how to check "what to look for," and the afternoons are spent outside under the tent where a mock dog show takes place with the participants putting to practice what they learned earlier that day. The objectives of this event are to represent the good, welfare, and education of AKC-approved Dog Show Judges in America and additionally to further the advancement of purebred dogs.

Owners of purebred dogs who want the opportunity to be part of the event also come from many different states. The dog breeds fall into ten specific groups, such as Working, Non-Working, Toy, Terriers, Herding, etc., and there are a minimum of sixteen breeds brought in from each group each day. Because of the number of breeds within each group, they are alternated every year, for example, if Golden Retrievers were here this year, they will not be next year.

If you appreciate the loyalty of man's best friend, make a note to take some time next August to visit the large tent in front of Zink.
