## **LIGHTS! CAMERA! ACTION!**

Film screenings, a professional fight choreographer and various film workshops will bring students and aspiring filmmakers together for The Fledging Filmmakers Festival; better known as Flick. On April 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2016 more than one hundred filmmakers, film students and film enthusiasts will convene at IUP's Hadley Union Building to celebrate a passion for film. The festival is designed for



anyone who strives to enhance their skills in the art of filmmaking.



Fledging filmmakers were able to enter their productions into numerous categories that have been reviewed and judged. Categories for submissions included Best Overall Flick, Best Experimental Flick, and Best Narrative Flick among several categories. Dr. Jim Lenze, a professor in the Department of Communications Media, has served as co-chair of Flick. Lenze explained the festival will award \$10,000 in cash prizes to the best Flicks. "We originally had over 800 film submissions that came from all over the world. We had films that came in from the U.S., Europe, and even Iran and Afghanistan. There will be a wide range of people coming, from high school students to Pittsburgh filmmakers."

Submitting a film was not required to attend Flick or take advantage of the festival's workshops. All attendees can participate in 45 minute classes focusing on

several aspects of media and filmmaking such as documentary filmmaking, short film production, virtual reality filmmaking,

storytelling, screenplay writing, and marketing independent films.

Professional fight choreographer, Michael Chin, will be teaching two workshops on stage fighting choreography. Chin is a professional actor and sanctioned master instructor and choreographer with the Society of American Fight Directors. He has taught, choreographed and consulted with theatre groups, universities and on several films. Chin currently teaches at Muhlenberg College in Allentown as well as Pace University, Brooklyn College and Juilliard. The one-day festival will consist of an opening ceremony starting at 8:30 a.m. in the morning and workshops throughout the day. The event concludes with a closing ceremony at 4:30 p.m. where a total of \$10,000 in Flick prizes will be awarded across several categories.

Lenze explained Flick is extremely beneficial because it provides excellent feedback as well as significant lessons and knowledge in media, especially filmmaking. Not only will the people involved get to benefit, the event also brings prospective students to IUP and is an opportunity to build a larger film community at the university.
