Department of Counseling Frequently Asked Questions for International Applicants

I would like to learn more about the counseling program at IUP.

The counseling programs at IUP are 60-credit master's programs that are accredited by the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP). You can choose to get a master's degree in either Clinical Mental Health Counseling or School Counseling. They are offered at both the IUP main campus (Indiana, PA) and the Pittsburgh East campus (Pittsburgh, PA). If you would like to learn more about either program, you are *strongly* encouraged to register for an information session hosted by the Department of Counseling. In these sessions, you will be able to meet a professor and current students from the department, learn about our curriculum, programmatic culture, and admissions process, and ask any question you have. Are there international students in the program? What percentage of your student body are international?

Yes, there are international students in this department, and we love the diverse perspectives and experiences they bring! Approximately 5% of our students in any given semester are international. For example, in recent years, we have had students from Uganda, China, Taiwan, India, Saudi Arabia, Japan, and Nigeria.

What is the difference between the main campus and the Pittsburgh East campus? Which campus do most international students choose?

Our Counseling master's programs are offered at both the Pittsburgh East campus, as well as the Indiana Campus. Most international students choose to attend the main campus. This is because the Pittsburgh East campus is a satellite campus, meaning it only has classrooms, a computer lab, and a lounge area available for students. At the Pittsburgh East location, there are no other institutional offices, buildings, or resources associated with IUP. Because of this, some international students find it easier to attend the Indiana campus, given that there are more campus support services at this location, and they can utilize campus housing.

The Indiana campus has all the typical buildings, offices, and resources that you would expect from a university, including classrooms, libraries, the Office of International Education, student housing, and dining halls. How many students are admitted to the program each year?

About 25 students are admitted every year at each campus. This includes students enrolling in both the Clinical Mental Health Counseling MA and School Counseling MEd programs.

Do most students finish this program in 2 years?

It is possible to finish the program in 2 years. To do this, a student would need to take about 4 courses each semester (including in the summer). However, this is not recommended since the program is both developmental and intensive in nature. Instead, most full-time students take 3 courses each semester, which allows them to finish in about 2.5 years on average.

What are the requirements for international students to apply to the counseling program? Do international applicants need to have their transcript evaluated by a transcript evaluation service during the application process?

Yes. As an international applicant, you will need to submit your undergraduate and/or graduate transcripts to be evaluated by an external academic credential evaluation organization, such as World Education Services or another member of the National Association of Credential Evaluation Services. What level of English skills is required for admission?

All international applicants must submit proof of English language proficiency. There are various tests that a student can take to provide this documentation. Below are the tests that IUP accepts and the minimum scores that must be obtained. The Counseling Department does not require a score higher than what's listed as the general required score for any test below.

IELTS - 6 <u>TOEFL iBT</u> (The reporting code for IUP is 2652) - 76 <u>Cambridge English Qualifications</u> - 179 <u>Duolingo English Test</u> - 110 <u>Pearson PTE</u> - 53 GTEC - 1280

If a student if from a country where English is the dominant language or if they received a degree that was taught in English, this requirement is usually waived. Do international students receive financial aid and/or scholarships from IUP?

International students are eligible to apply for departmental scholarships as well; however, most are not usually eligible for federal financial aid.

I would like to learn about Graduation Assistantship positions.

Graduate Assistantships (GA) provide a great opportunity to work with other students and professors while receiving funding to supplement your education. In return for working 10 or 20 hours per week, you will receive a significant partial tuition waiver and a small stipend. For more information about GA positions at IUP you can view this link:

The Department of Counseling has historically been very well-funded for GA positions. While the application process is competitive, approximately half of students who apply are selected each year. Assistantships may involve working to help your assigned faculty supervisor with tasks related to administrative responsibilities, class preparation, and/or research projects. Holding a graduate assistantship for one year does not guarantee one for subsequent years. Students must re-apply by submitting an application for each year they would like to be considered. Students must be in good academic standing and maintain a required number of credits to hold a graduate assistantship.

How many students in the program receive a Graduate Assistantship position? The Department of Counseling has historically been very well-funded for GA positions. While the application process is competitive and positions cannot be guaranteed, the majority of students who apply are selected each year. Assistantships are annually renewable and may involve working to help your assigned faculty supervisor with tasks related to administrative responsibilities, class preparation, and/or research projects. Positions are available at both campuses and students are invited to apply for employment both within the department and/or in other campus offices (e.g., Graduate Admissions, the Career Center, etc.) as needed.

Can international students work towards licensure hours after graduation?

International graduates are eligible to pursue licensure as professional counselors (LPC) in Pennsylvania but are not currently permitted to apply for school counselor certification through the Pennsylvania Department of Education. Other states do permit certification. Does IUP help students find employment opportunities after graduation? Throughout this program, there are many opportunities to take part in professional conferences, which help students to learn more about the counseling profession and network with other students and practicing professionals. Additionally, all students are required to take two practicum courses and complete a field experience where they work with real clients/students to practice their counseling skills under supervision. Students beginning the practicum and field experiences are provided with a list of locations where IUP students have worked in the past and sometimes these practicum and field experiences can turn into employment opportunities. They also provide an excellent opportunity to meet people working as professional counselors who could potentially point you to employment opportunities. Additionally, professors, students, and alumni are always happy to help each other out and will likely try to make employment suggestions if you ask! Can students begin in any term?

In this cost breakdown, you will see that most of the costs are per credit. Because our Counseling master's programs require <u>60 credits</u>, all of the per credit fees are added up and multiplied by 60 in the box above. This allows you to see the current overall tuition cost. The other fees are either paid one time only, per semester, or per year. This cost will vary, depending on how long you take to complete the program, so these are not added up. However, it is typical to plan for at least 7 semesters, including 3 semesters per year - usually Fall, Spring, and Summer.
