

"A lifetime of discovery never ends," said the retired chemistry and physical science teacher who now lives in Sarasota, Florida.


During his career and after his retirement, Sobotka traveled extensively—sometimes for pleasure and sometimes because of a love of learning. In addition to taking a multitude of courses beyond his master's degree and teaching summer courses to other teachers, he also developed interests connected to the outdoors—biking, skiing, and landscaping, for example.

"My interest in nature and landscaping did not come from a book," Sobotka said. "By taking a seed from an orange and planting it, I discovered it could sprout and eventually grow into a beautiful tree. Science showed me that it needed water and nutrients to survive. Education is that seed which allows children to grow into adults. The teacher provides the nutrients.

"My wish is for students to discover knowledge that does not come from just the books they read. It also comes from the hands-on, physical world of the environment around them. To plant something and watch it grow over time can be as exciting and fulfilling as reading a book about Johnny Appleseed."



COMM MEDIA DOCTORAL STUDENT CO-AUTHORS BOOK


IUP doctoral student, Jeremy C. McCool, co-authored a children's book on positive self-image. McCool, who is working toward his PhD in Communications Media, co-authored *Princess & The Power of Melanin*, the story of an African American girl who learns to embrace her beauty with confidence. McCool did not intend to become an author but felt compelled to offer this story of positive self-esteem for children. "...to create any kind of social change you have to start with our youth. It's easier to teach a five-year-old to love themselves than a 50-year-old who has been through a lot of trauma. You have to start with a young person," he explained. The book was written in conjunction with IUP alumni, Dr. Anthony McBride, Associates Degree in Liberal Arts from Hilbert College (1989), a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Northeastern University (1991), a Master of Arts in Criminology from Indiana University of Pennsylvanian (1999) and a Doctorate of Education from Duquesne University in (2004).

The co-authors met while McCool was attending Western Illinois University, where McBride is a faculty member. After learning that McBride had successfully published several children's books, McCool decided to pitch the storyline for *Princess & The* Power of Melanin to him. That pitch turned into a successful collaboration resulting in the manuscript's publication. McCool and McBride hope to build upon their brand by creating a series of books focused on positive selfimage and values. Eventually, the authors hope to turn this series into an animated

show or film.

COMM PRODUCTION EXPERIENCE

Students in the COMM 360 Digital Sports Production class have been recognized alongside the best in the media industry with a 2018 Telly Awards silver prize for their coverage of a 2017 IUP football game. COMM 360 students worked collaboratively with the Center for Media Production (CMPR) to manage every aspect of live sports production for Crimson Hawks football and basketball. The class

was led by faculty member Dr. Stephanie Keppich, but students learned the necessary skills to manage many aspects of sports production independently, from directing and operating live graphics to incorporating audio and replay technology – all while switching between five cameras.

The CMPR provides communications media students across the department with practical experience. Students work with clients to acquire and develop the skills necessary to work in multiple levels of media production, services offered include video creation, still photography, and website maintenance. The collaboration between the CMPR and IUP Athletics has proven to be especially successful, with communications media students managing, producing, shooting, streaming, and anchoring coverage of the women's volleyball, football, and men's and women's basketball teams. Through hands-on coursework and opportunities at the CMPR, the Department of Communications Media strives to ensure that all of its graduates leave IUP with invaluable real-world experience.

IUP TEACHER CANDIDATE NAMED TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Josh Krentz, a student in Indiana University of Pennsylvania's Center for Career and Technical Personnel Preparation (CTPP) program and a teacher at the Forbes Road Career and Technology Center in Monroeville, Pennsylvania, has been named the 2018 Collision Repair Education Foundation's 2018 Instructor of the Year. Becky Bruce, director of the IUP Center for Career and Technical Personnel Preparation, where Krentz has been a student since 2014, nominated him for the award. "It is very gratifying to see Mr. Krentz recognized with this prestigious honor. He's a wonderful teacher and truly an asset to the career and technical education community," she stated.

Bruce recognized Krentz's accomplishments as an educator at the Forbes Road Career and Technology Center, which include developing a Recycled Rides program through the National Auto Body Council, providing additional field trips and tours of local auto body shops, efforts to foster collaboration with other schools in the community, and collaboration with industry partners in the field to ensure that his classroom curriculum is up-to-date. "Mr. Krentz goes above and beyond the daily classroom instruction," Bruce said in her nomination. "He works to find both local and national opportunities for his collision repair students. These opportunities benefit his students, their community, and their school." Krentz was honored at the Collision Repair Education Foundation's national meeting in Las Vegas, Nevada in October 2018.

IUP GRADUATE MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Phillip Woods ('00, D'17) was inspired by his mentors at IUP to use his doctoral degree in administration and leadership studies to share knowledge and support students. After beginning his teaching career in special and elementary education in the Penn Hills School District and spending six years as principal of West Mifflin High School, Woods was presented with the opportunity to enact positive change when he was offered

the position of principal at an East Pittsburgh school with a history of academic and disciplinary challenges. Woods began his tenure as principal of Woodland Hills Junior Senior High in July 2018 eager to confront the issues the school was facing and to work collaboratively with staff and students to find solutions.

Woods's determination to help students better themselves was inspired by the athletic coaches that guided him throughout his youth. Later, he felt similarly supported by his IUP football coaches. The importance of mentorship was underscored by IUP professors, Dr. Joe Marcoline, Dr. Bob Millward, and Dr. Roger Briscoe, who not only helped him navigate the dissertation process, but also guided him in finding a fulfilling career. While at IUP, Woods assisted Millward with an initiative to recruit more African American men into education. "I don't know if I could have done it without those guys," he said of his professors. "I've never felt more supported or encouraged." Now Woods has taken on the role of mentor and has emerged as a leader in his position at Woodland Hills. Since Woods's arrival, the district has implemented three programs aimed at improving school culture through restorative justice, staff training on implicit bias, and a diversion program to allow the school, not the criminal justice system, to handle minor disciplinary infractions. Since implementation, the district has seen a significant drop in disciplinary infractions. Woodland Hills School District Superintendent James Harris believes that Woods is a driving force for change within the district, "He was 100 percent responsible for that change," Harris stated. "The reality is the man is a leader in the building. He is all present. It is very empowering to everybody."

YOUNG ALUMNI ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Justin Brown (M '13), a graduate of IUP's Student Affairs in Education program, was awarded the 2018 Young Alumni Achievement Award. While completing his undergraduate degree at Slippery Rock, Brown was inspired to found the Diversity Awareness Program (D.A.P.). D.A.P. was created to educate and raise awareness of the importance of diversity and embracing people of all cultures and backgrounds. Throughout his undergraduate career and as he pursued his master's degree at IUP, Brown worked to grow and expand the D.A.P. program, ultimately having visited over 450 schools to educate students on diversity and starting 27 chapters across the country.

After obtaining his degree at IUP, Brown became a resident director at West Chester University (WCU) in West Chester, Pennsylvania. Brown has taken on an active role in improving campus life, becoming RAD (Rape Aggression Defense) certified and a certified trainer for the Green Dot Initiative to prevent dating and sexual violence. His commitment to diversity has continued throughout his professional life, he is involved in diversity and inclusion training at WCU and has spoken on the topic at over 40 schools and 20 national conferences. Brown proudly authored *Ugh!?! Not Another Diversity Book!* based upon his experiences with D.A.P. He also founded a nonprofit, Onward + Upward, which mentors students on financially preparing for college and offers career counseling. Brown has been honored with many professional and academic awards, including IUP's Chacivity Award in 2012.

COEC EDUCATION DAY



EDUCATOR PREPARATION PROGRAMS RECEIVE CAEP ACCREDITATION

The College of Education and Communications once again received accreditation by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) in 2019. This is a source of pride for the college, as only 42 institutions from 23 states and the District of Columbia received recognition during this review process. Fewer than 240 universities in the nation hold CAEP accreditation for their teacher education programs.

The review process is lengthy and rigorous. Over 50 IUP faculty and staff took part in the process. Led by Dean's Associate Dr. Sue Rieg, it included a thorough self-study of programs, a site visit from independent reviewers, and an examination of the preparation provided to students in the program. Upon completion of their review, the examining team indicated no areas for improvement. "This accomplishment indicates that our programs are following best practices, that our graduates are achieving success, and that our education graduates are well prepared for the classroom today and for the future," noted Dr. Lara Luetkehans. IUP's teacher education programs have been accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (now CAEP) since 1974.

FULBRIGHT DISTINGUISHED AWARDS IN TEACHING

The College of Education and Communications once again hosted a group of international educators for a one semester immersive experience at IUP. The educators were hosted through the Fulbright Distinguished Awards in Teaching Program or Fulbright DAI, a sister program to the International Leaders in Education Program (ILEP). The Fulbright DAI is designed for educators from around the globe to pursue professional development, participate in field experience, share cross-cultural best practices in education, and to enjoy cultural activities and experiences. Dean Lara Luetkehans and Dr. Michelle Petrucci of the Office of International Studies collaborated to submit the successful application for the IREX grant that supported the FDAI.

SCHOOL-SAFETY SYMPOSIUM

Dr. Timothy J. Runge, of the Education and School Psychology Department, in collaboration with the Indiana Area School District, IUP, Pennsylvania Representative Jim Struzzi, and the Indiana County Tourist Bureau helped to organize a School Safety and Security Symposium on March 15, 2019 at the Kovalchik Convention and Athletic Complex. Nearly 600 attendees from across Pennsylvania and neighboring states representing law enforcement, local and state government, mental health agencies, and advocacy organizations gathered for the full-day event. The purpose of this symposium was to share ideas and research around improving the safety, security, climate, and culture of schools. Organizers emphasized a comprehensive approach to school safety, guided by the belief that school safety begins with students being able to identify and express emotions and concerns in healthy ways. "The issue of security and safety in schools includes both physical

security and the recognition of the need to teach social and emotion learning, as well as provide mental health services for children," Dr. Runge said.

Three faculty members from the Educational and School Psychology Department presented workshops among the 36 breakout sessions. Dr. Mark McGowan discussed current understandings of violence, delinquency, and aggression in youth. Participants were given an opportunity to integrate and apply strategies within case studies and vignettes. Dr. Courtney McLaughlin described the role of social media in school culture. She focused on how adolescents utilize social media, emphasizing the important role of parents and how schools can support them. Dr. Runge discussed his findings from working with over 1,100 Pennsylvania schools over a 10 year period through his work with the Pennsylvania Positive Behavior Support Network. Runge presented outcomes related to reductions in disruptive behavior, out-of-school suspensions, out-of-school placements, and other key indicators to provide evidentiary support for expansion of implementation to other schools. The efforts of these COEC faculty members in collaboration with other local entities provided a valuable resource and greater awareness of school safety and wellness to the education community locally and across the region.

FACULTY CERTIFICATION IN MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID

Faculty members in the COEC are constantly seeking opportunities to further develop their professional skills. In July 2018, Dr. Mariha Shields, a faculty member in the Communication Disorders, Special Education, and Disability Services Department, became a certified Mental Health First Aid Instructor. This certification qualifies Shields to recognize and respond to people who may be experiencing a mental health or substance abuse challenge and to train others to do the same.

Dr. Shields developed a training program on youth mental health for pre-service teachers. The department organized training sessions in the new program for students during their professional development days. Shields received an external grant from the Higher Education Suicide Prevention Coalition to help cover the costs associated with hosting these trainings. This program has been very successful and planning for future training sessions is underway.

PAYING FORWARD

\$10,000 in scholarships were awarded by the Professional Studies in Education Department this year. The scholarships were made possible through the generous support of faculty, alumni, and staff who contributed to the PSE Scholarship Fund and the PSE Enhancement Fund. Students majoring in Early Childhood Education, Early Childhood/Special Education, and Middle Level Education were eligible to apply. PSE Faculty members reviewed all applications and awarded scholarships to sixteen students. Recipients were honored at a department reception in March 2019. The department hopes to continue awarding scholarships each academic year.

OUR DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI

In April 2019, two College of Education and Communications alumni were selected as the recipients of the IUP Distinguished Alumni Award for performance in their field.

Kevin Bailey, a graduate of the Student Affairs in Higher Education program, was recognized by IUP with a Distinguished Alumni Award for distinguished performance in his field. Bailey ('86, M'90) has served as vice chancellor for student affairs at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte since 2017, returning to the university where he first began his career in 1990. Additionally, Bailey has also held teaching and administrative positions at the University of West Florida, Tulane University, Millersville University, Bowling Green, and IUP. Bailey began his journey at IUP as a first-generation college student, going on to become a leader in national student affairs organizations, and serving as a highly regarded consultant, mentor, teacher, presenter, and author. In addition to the 2019 Distinguished Alumni Award, Bailey was recognized by the College of Education and

Communications with the Distinguished Alumni Scholar award in 2015 and by IUP's Student Affairs in Higher Education program with the Ron Lunardini Distinguished Alumni Award in 2009.

Amanda Lucidon, a graduate of the Communications Media program, was recognized by IUP with a Distinguished Alumni Award for distinguished performance in her field. Lucidon ('01) is an award-winning documentarian, filmmaker, public speaker, and *New York Times* best-selling author. She was an official White House photographer, responsible for documenting First Lady Michelle Obama and President Barack Obama. She is one of a few women in history to have served in that role. In 2018, the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts appointed her a Turnaround Artist to highlight arts in underserved schools. She is the author of Chasing Light: *Michelle Obama through the Lens of a White House Photographer* and *Reach Higher: An Inspiring Celebration of First Lady Michele Obama*. Originally from

ENSURING THE FUTURE OF IUP COEC

Through the generosity of Bill and Judy Scheeren, the Dr. and Mrs. William O. Scheeren Scholarship has been established for fulltime Sophomore, Junior, or Senior College of Education and Communications students with an earned 3.0 GPA, with preference going to those students enrolled in the IUP ROTC program. The Scheeren's generous donation is a part of IUP's Imagine Unlimited \$75 million comprehensive campaign, which currently has gifts totaling more than \$67 million.

Dr. Scheeren graduated from IUP in 1968 and is known by colleagues and students from the Hempfield Area School District where he retired from the library department. His wife Judy is a long-time technology professor at Westmoreland County Community College. Both Bill and Judy serve on IUP's College of Education and Communications Advancement Council and the National Imagine Unlimited Campaign Cabinet. Megan Baker, a 1996 Communications Media graduate, is the founder, president, and CEO of Baker Public Relations, a full-service communications firm. In 2004, her efforts producing and co-hosting a long-format community program won her a New York State Emmy.



Maya Cryor is a 2014 graduate of the IUP Department of Communications Media. She currently works for award-winning producer and director Stan Lathan. In that position, she has worked directly with stand-up comedy specials for HBO and Netflix.



Leigh Heidenthal graduated from IUP with a Bachelor of Science degree in elementary education in 1996 and a Master of Education degree in literacy in 2002. Since then, she has served as an elementary teacher in Prince George's County School District, in Maryland; Westmont Hilltop School District, in Pennsylvania; and, most recently, Indiana Area School District.

IUP STUDENT AWARDED BOLDEN SCHOLARSHIP

Bolden Scholarship is awarded annually through the POISE Foundation in Pittsburgh to students that are pursuing teaching careers at accredited education programs in Western Pennsylvania.
