Fireside Chat with Mr. Sharif El-Mekki, Founder & CEO, The Center for Black Educator Development *Monday, March 21, 3:30-5:00pm*

Mr. El-Mekki is a former principal and teacher, an IUP and Cheyney alum, and a national voice in conversations around diversifying the teacher workforce. The Center for Black Educator Development addresses educational inequities to improve academic and social outcomes for all students through increased teacher diversity. Their work includes professional development for school districts, departments of education, and colleges and universities. During the summer, they run Freedom Schools Literacy Academies, which integrate a culturally sustaining early-literacy curriculum with an educator-apprenticeship program, providing college and high school students with experiences designed to encourage a future career in education.

In this session, understand why teacher diversity matters and how the Center for Black Educator Development is addressing that problem. Think about how we as teachers, administrators, and coordinators can learn from their model.
