### **Hot Takes: Critical Race Theory (CRT)**

In collaboration with the Student Affairs in Higher Education (SAHE) Department Racial Justice Advisory, we present *Hot Takes*: A crash-course style social justice presentation series. The first session on Critical Race Theory was presented by Dr. John Mueller, professor, and Karis Cornelius, graduate student, from the SAHE Department. #### A Brief History of CRT

Despite recent popularity in the media, Critical Race Theory is not new.

- CRT began as a movement within the legal system at Harvard Law School in the 1980s as a successor to Critical Legal Studies (CLS)
- Legal scholars noticed racial inequities lingering after the Civil Rights Movement
- CRT is a framework to examine the role of race and racism at the structural level in different aspects of society (education, legal, health, financial, etc.) and to help us understand and explain how and why racial inequities persist.

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### **Hot Takes: Critical Race Theory**

#### **3 Common Myths of CRT**

MYTH: CRT teaches that all White people are inherently racist.

**REALITY:** CRT considers racism in laws and policies, not individual acts.

Hypothetically, even if there are no racist individuals, CRT says that

inequities persist because of racism in laws and policies.

**MYTH:** CRT is a program, training, or curriculum that is being taught in secondary schools.

**REALITY:** CRT has become a blanket term for all race-related education. CRT is just one of the *ways* to teach subjects like history and education.

**MYTH:** CRT is a criticism of our nation and of patriotism.

**REALITY:** CRT seeks to reform laws, policies, and practices to more

closely support our nation's founding idea of equality.
