Criminology Graduate Student at the Helm of Student Organization Tackling Issues of Racism

Nabiha Islam, a master's degree student in the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice, is the creator and president of IUP Students Against Racism (IUPSAR). IUPSAR is a student organization whose goal is to combat and shed light on racism within the IUP community and the Indiana community-at-large. According to Nabiha, the organization focuses on educating students about racism, the importance of diversity and inclusion, and how to overcome unconscious bias. Nabiha notes that the group also provides a "safe space" for students to share their personal experiences with racism, bias, and exclusionary practices.

IUPSAR is a new organization for the IUP community with the Fall semester being the first full semester of operation for the group, which has approximately 15 student members. Any student with a minimum 2.0 GPA may join the organization. IUPSAR, both independently and in collaboration with other campus groups, hosts diversity events, community-building activities, fundraisers, and experiential learning experiences throughout the year.

Nabiha received her bachelor's degree in Criminology from IUP in 2018 and is currently enrolled in the on-campus MA Program in Criminology. She is slated to graduate the program in August and plans to pursue a law degree.



Food Photography Workshop

Team From Psychology Publishes Study

IUP Clinical Psychology program graduate Adrie Henry recently published an article in the journal *Violence Against Women* entitled, "Reflecting the times? Reexamining the effect of alcohol intoxication on perceptions of campus sexual assault."

Along with Dr. Anthony Perillo and Dr. Jen Perillo (IUP Psychology Department) and Dr. Cristina Reitz-Krueger (Warren Wilson College), Adrie led an examination of the effect of victim and perpetrator alcohol intoxication on perceptions of campus sexual assault while a Clinical Psychology Psy.D. student at IUP. After reading a short story that varied the amount of alcohol used by a victim and her assailant, participants shared their perceptions about each party's level of responsibility and blame for what occurred. In contrast with past research, people were less likely to blame the victim and more likely to perceive the event as sexual assault when the victim was highly intoxicated. The authors discuss the findings in light of the current social climate, including the #MeToo movement. The study was completed with the help of 14 additional students from IUP's undergraduate and graduate psychology programs.

NASP asserts that "just as we continue to grow and develop as people and with our skills, sometimes with support from others, we can develop resilience beyond stressful circumstances. School psychologists are particularly skilled at assisting students and staff in growing and working together while shifting into different gears to meet the demands of school and life." The student organization for the school psychology programs, School Psychology Association Network (SPAN), participated in a Friendsgiving event during National School Psychology Awareness Week to grow, engage, advocate, and rise. During this Friendsgiving event, SPAN members invited other students, who were not SPAN members, to join for the purpose of increasing networking opportunities and getting "in gear" to support one another, especially during the busy season of the semester as finals week approaches. Are Educators Ready to Apply Trauma Informed Practice?

<u>Dr. Timothy Runge</u>, in collaboration with colleagues at Bloomsburg University, completed a comprehensive survey regarding educators' preparedness to recognize and respond to students impacted by trauma or distress.

Timothy in collaboration with Dr. Timothy Knoster and Ms. Danielle Empson (McDowell Institute at Bloomsburg University of PA) completed their comprehensive survey of almost 5,000 Pennsylvania educators regarding their preparedness to recognize and respond to students impacted by trauma or distress, including trauma or distress related to COVID-19. Results indicated that less than half of educators felt prepared to recognize signs of trauma in their students. Further, only one in four educators felt prepared to implement trauma-informed practices. On a positive note, the overwhelming majority of educators believe that professional development in trauma-informed practices is needed.

Local Community Group Supports Friendsgiving

When the Punxsutawney Activities Group, a student organization at IUP Punxsutawney, wanted to host a Friendsgiving, the idea of making a Thanksgiving dinner for all the students was more than they could handle alone. Luckily, the Welcome Wagon stepped in!

The Punxsutawney Welcome Wagon, a volunteer community organization created to help welcome students to Punxsutawney, sponsors events each year to help students feel a part of the Punxsutawney Community.

At the beginning of the semester, the Welcome Wagon group hosted a Meet & Greet where local businesses came to campus for students to learn about services they offer. Nearly 30 businesses and organizations in Punxsutawney participated in the Meet & Greet, and each group offered information and a "freebie" to the students. Psychology Professors Publish "Hot Tubbing" Research

Drs. Jen and Anthony Perillo recently published their research on bias among experts asked to team up with an opposing expert during court evaluations. Their article, "Testing the waters: An investigation of the impact of hot tubbing on experts from referral through testimony," was published in the journal Law and Human Behavior. Along with collaborators at John Jay College of Criminal Justice, Jen and Anthony examined the practice of concurrent expert testimony, nicknamed hot tubbing, which involves expert witnesses from opposing sides in a case discussing the case prior to trial and outlining their areas of agreement and disagreement about the case. They recruited forensic clinicians and advanced clinical doctoral students as mock experts in an insanity defense case and compared the attitudes, reports, and testimonies of experts who testified according to traditional adversarial procedures against those who used the concurrent procedure. Results showed "hot tubbing" experts showed similar levels of adversarial allegiance—unconscious bias for their retaining party—to experts who testified under traditional procedures, suggesting hot tubbing may not be an effective reform for expert bias. Currently practiced in some international courts, "hot tubbing" has been proposed as a possible way to reduce expert bias for the side that hires them. Jen's and Anthony's study, the first to empirically examine hot tubbing, suggests expert bias remains powerful and is not actually reduced by hot tubbing.
