Criminology Program Ranked Best in Pennsylvania

The <u>online master's in criminology</u> has been ranked first in Pennsylvania by Intelligent.com and second in the nation in its 2022 Best Online Programs in Criminology listing. More than 400 programs were compared by editors for the ranking, designed to recognize "top-quality programs that are offered online to ensure flexibility and accessibility for working professionals and those who cannot attend on-campus classes," editors said.

Programs were evaluated on the basis of cost, course offerings, outcomes, flexibility, faculty, and reputation, with special focus on review of program strength, student readiness, return on investment, cost, and student engagement. IUP's program achieved a near perfect score of 98 out of 100.

"It is great to have our program recognized with such a strong ranking," Daniel Lee, chair of the <u>Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice</u>, said. "It is humbling to see us placed alongside other strong programs, but this ranking is evidence of how hard our faculty work to bring a strong curriculum to our students. Our program emphasizes the integration of theory and research to produce sound evidence-based practices, and our students are well-prepared to establish their careers and make a difference in the world."

CJTC Expands Act 235 Lethal Weapons Training

The Criminal Justice Training Center (CJTC) recently expanded its training programs with the addition of a new 5-year agreement to provide Act 235 Lethal Weapons Training to employees of Geo Group Inc. in Philipsburg, Pennsylvania. Geo Group has a government contract to provide security services at the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement Moshannon Valley Processing Center in Clearfield County, which is slated to be the largest immigration detention center in the Northeast. The CJTC has already graduated their first cohort with 19 students completing the 40-hour training program.

The Act 235 Lethal Weapons Training Program, regulated by the Pennsylvania State Police Lethal Weapons Certification Unit, is a 40-hour training program that certifies individuals working for companies to carry firearms and other defensive weapons while on duty as security guards. The IUP CJTC has been approved to provide this training for several years on an as needed basis, and this 5-year agreement with Geo Group Inc. has opened a new and exciting opportunity. The CJTC Director Dennis L. Marsili expressed gratitude to CJTC Program Coordinator Marcia Cole for working with company representatives on the required state approvals and for revising course materials as well as HHS Assistant Dean of Business Operations Joshua Muscatello for his assistance in drafting the 5-year agreement.

The scholarship is awarded to a student who achieves an overall grade point average of 3.25 or better and who participates in the university or local community for at least one semester, demonstrates an interest in the humanities (art, music, drama, dance, or literature), or demonstrates an interest in and/or knowledge of world affairs.

Perillo Receives Early Career Teaching & Mentoring Award

The American Psychology-Law Society (Division 41 of the American Psychological Association) has named Dr. Anthony Perillo its 2021 Early Career Teaching and Mentoring Award recipient, an honor for outstanding teaching and mentoring in the field of psychology and law. The Early Career Award is for those who received their Ph.D. or J.D. degree within seven years.

Anthony, who received a 2020 Academic Advising and Mentoring Award from IUP's Center for Teaching Excellence, is an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology, Assistant Director of Clinical Training for the Clinical Psychology Psy.D. program, and Assessment Clinic Supervisor in IUP's Center for Applied Psychology. His approach to teaching and mentoring follows a pedagogy of kindness, principles that prioritize compassion for student needs. A pedagogy of kindness comes down to two things: believe students and believe in students. Through his emphasis on experiential learning and professional development, Anthony approaches his work striving to offer students an instructor and mentor they can respect and trust.

Some of Anthony's key achievements in mentoring with students include setting up a peerreview mentorship system, co-running a Forensic Journal Club with Dr. Jen Perillo for IUP's Psy.D. students, securing two dissertation grants



for his Psy.D. students, completing two peerreviewed journal articles with Psy.D. students, and advising eight student-led national conference presentations.


Nursing Faculty Member Writes Chapter

Dr. Meigan Robb recently wrote a book chapter for the 6thedition of Clinical Teaching Strategies for Nursing Education. The book, published by Springer, was released in January 2022.

Meigan's chapter, *Pedagogical Technologies in Clinical Education*, explores technologies for clinical teaching including simulated electronic health records, telepresence, telehealth, electronic escape rooms, and other technology related approaches. Suggestions are provided for how clinical nurse educators can use these technologies in clinical teaching. This chapter also includes virtual clinical learning experiences and how educators responded with technology use to COVID-19.

Criminology Alumni Recipients of International Awards

Two alumni from the Criminology doctoral program received prestigious awards from the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS), the discipline's largest international organization. Dr. Sean L. Gabbidon and Dr. George E. Higgins received the 2022 Outstanding Book Award from ACJS for

their work *Shopping while Black: Consumer Racial Profiling in America* (2020, Routledge). Moreover, Dr. Higgins is also the recipient of the

2022 ACJS Fellow Award, given in recognition of his distinguished

contribution to justice education and scholarship.

Gabbidon is a distinguished professor of Criminal Justice at Penn State Harrisburg. His research interests include race and crime, public opinion on race, crime and justice, security administration, and criminology and criminal justice pedagogy. He has authored more than 100 scholarly publications including more than 70 peer-reviewed articles and 13 books (https://harrisburg.psu.edu/faculty-and-staff/shaun-gabbidon-phd).

Higgins, a full professor at the University of Louisville's Department of Criminal Justice, focuses his research on substance use, cybercrime, race and ethnicity differences, criminal justice organization issues, and suicide. He has authored more than 200 scholarly-peer reviewed journal articles and 10 books (https://louisville.edu/justice/about-us/faculty/george-e-higgins).
