

Academy of Culinary Arts to Rebuild and Renovate

On April 15, US Rep. Glenn "GT" Thompson announced \$500,000 in federal funding towards updating the facilities at the Academy of Culinary Arts in downtown Punxsutawney.

The master plan, formally endorsed by IUP's Council of Trustees in March, will provide state-of-the art facilities for future culinary and baking and pastry students. As proposed, the current Fairman Centre will be renovated to provide more efficient space for enhanced use and increased impact of the building. The new building will offer over 30,000 square feet of instructional space that will provide new opportunities for increased enrollment at the Academy.

At the recent press conference, culinary student Shakyra McNeal from Verona, Pennsylvania, spoke about her current experience in the program. Shakyra mentioned the love she had for her instructors and that they, "never give up on you and they push you

to do your best." Shakyra would like to further her education at IUP after she completes the culinary program; however, she is focused now on finishing the summer semester and completing her 450-hour externship in the fall. She is very excited to think about what the new facilities will offer the students in the future.

Criminology & Criminal Justice Distinguished Alumni

Two Department of Criminology alumnae were honored as IUP's 2022 Distinguished Alumni: the Deputy Assistant Director of the Counterintelligence Division at FBI Headquarters and the Professor and Assistant Chair at Appalachian State University.

Assistant Deputy Director Debra Evans Smith received her baccalaureate degree in 1981 in Criminology and had a stellar career with the FBI for 30 years, beginning as one of the first 50 Black female agents in the 1980s and ending in the top ranks. Dr. Catherine Marcum was awarded her Ph.D. in Criminology in 2008. She is published in over 60 peer-reviewed journals and is an author or co-author of 20 books.

The Distinguished Alumni Award is the highest honor for an alumnus at IUP and recognizes IUP graduates who have achieved distinction through sustained performance in their fields or who have provided outstanding service to IUP. Smith and Marcum were celebrated as part of IUP's 2022 Celebration Weekend in early April; they are two of less than 400 alumni who have received this award out of over 150,000 IUP alumni.

The Department's April 8th Distinguished Alumni Panel was well-received by both undergraduate and graduate students who attended the event. Smith and Marcum shared their knowledge and expertise with students while highlighting the value of strong writing skills in their profession. Students were engaged, and their questions demonstrated their interest in the backgrounds and career advice of the distinguished panelists. After the presentations, students had the opportunity to meet and interact with the speakers. The Department appreciates the willingness of our distinguished alumni to enrich our students' lives and welcomes all Criminology alumni to return to IUP often.

Mikesell was recognized during the Opening General Session. "The outstanding achievements of future professionals like Paige is integral to the future of SHAPE America and our profession," said SHAPE America President Terri Drain, the founder and coordinator of the Health and Physical Education Collaborative.

Paige, an outstanding student, is very active at the university as well as in the teaching profession. As a student-athlete (swimmer) at IUP, she is successful in the pool and in the classroom. She was named a CoSIDA Academic All-American and carries a 4.0 grade point average. Paige was also named a Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Scholar-Athlete.

"Paige has been one of the strongest students to come through our program in recent years. We can't wait to see what she accomplishes as a health and physical education teacher," said Dave Lorenzi, the professor who nominated Paige for the Major of the Year Award. Paige is graduating in May and will start her MEd program in adapted physical activity at IUP in the fall. She will also be a full-time graduate assistant in the Kinesiology, Health, and Sport Science Department, helping to run teacher in-service trainings and community outreach programs.

Dietitian Nutrition Program Students Get Hands-On

Students of the newly created online graduate program gathered in person to learn how to conduct nutrition-focused physical exams, a type of exam used to assess malnutrition status in patients and clients.

Dr. Nicole Clark, faculty member in the Department of Food and Nutrition, led the session, occurring over two weeks in late February and early March. Students were able to experience the exam using accurate tools of the trade, such as calipers, measuring tapes, grip-strength testers, and balance scales. Although an online program, in-person gatherings such as these are crucial for students entering the field of clinical dietetics. Being an evidenced-based field with hands-on practical applications, the need for such an event was seen by program director Dr. Jodie Seybold and Dr. Nicole Clark, who teaches the Clinical Nutrition Assessment course tied into this event.

Special coordinated events like these are what make the Department of Food and Nutrition a standout department at IUP. Faculty members Dr. Stephanie Taylor-Davis, Dr. Pao Ying Hsiao, Dr. Nicole Clark, and Dr. Jodie Seybold create a variety of specialized and individualized experiences, preparing students for success in the field of food, nutrition, and dietetics.

CRIM Faculty and Students Present at Conference



Faculty and students from the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice participated in various sessions at the annual conference for the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS) held this year in Las Vegas. ACJS is the largest international association for criminal justice. Established in 1963, ACJS promotes criminal justice education, research, and policy analysis within the discipline of criminal justice for both educators and practitioners.

CRIM faculty Bitna Kim and Daniel Lee, along with CRIM doctoral students Vanessa Gutierrez, Kristopher Kell, and Cole Stillson delivered a paper presentation entitled Rural, Suburban, and Rural Disparities in the Research Receptivity: State-wide Surveys of Chief Probation/Parole Officers and Police Chiefs in Pennsylvania.

Kim and Stillson presented a second paper called *Crime and Criminal Justice During the Covid-19 Pandemic: A Synthesis of Systematic Review Evidence.*

A paper entitled *Unfinished: Challenges in Juvenile Justice Reform* was delivered by CRIM faculty member Alida Merlo and longtime co-author Peter Benekos from Mercyhurst University.

CRIM doctoral student Carley Pinskey along with faculty member Sadie Miller presented a paper titled Violent Video Games and Aggression: Understanding the Influence of Individual Factors on Agreement with the Moral Panic.

Faculty member Kim and CRIM alumnus (MA and PhD) Brian Payne (Vice Provost for Academic Affairs at Old Dominion University) were invited speakers for the Doctoral Summit held during the annual conference. This year's summit topic was Addressing Identity Based Barriers in Academia.
