CRIM Student Receives Phi Kappa Phi Reynolds Scholarship

The IUP chapter of the interdisciplinary honor society of Phi Kappa Phi has selected Ms. Jessica Poley as this year's recipient of the annual Reynolds Scholarship. Poley graduated *summa cum laude* from IUP in December 2021 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminology with a pre-law concentration and minors in Women and Gender Studies, Political Science, and Philosophy. Poley will attend Widener University- Delaware Law School in the fall. Currently, Poley aspires to become a criminal prosecutor.

While an undergraduate student at IUP, Poley's academic aptitude was recognized many times over through various awards and recognitions including the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice's Jacqueline Watson Memorial Scholarship, Sutton Scholarships, Provost Scholar, Academic Success Scholarship, Stephen and Sandy Sheller Scholarship, Hershey Entertainment and Resort Hospitality Scholarship, IUP Outstanding Leader, Music Fund Scholarship, and Hawks Success Grant. Poley was also active



in a number of organizations and maintained leadership roles within these organizations during her time at IUP. Poley was involved in IUP College Democrats, student government, academic senate, and IUP's Haven Project.

The Phi Kappa Phi Reynolds Scholarship is awarded to the top undergraduate student member of Phi Kappa Phi who plans to continue their education with post-graduate studies. Phi Kappa Phi is an interdisciplinary honor society headquartered in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Membership is by invitation only to the top 10 percent of seniors and graduate students and the top 7.5 percent of juniors. Faculty and professional staff members and alumni who have achieved scholarly distinction also qualify for membership.

Didactic Program in Dietetics Reaccredited until 2029

Academy of Culinary Arts Faculty Judge at National ProStart

Invitational in Washington Culinary students from around the country descended upon the nation's capital May 6-8 to compete in the National ProStart Invitational[®] (NPSI), and two faculty from the Academy of Culinary Arts were on hand to judge the

competition. 48 states competed over 2 days at the Washington Hilton in Washington, DC.

The NPSI is a competition focused on restaurant management and culinary arts for secondary school students. Top performing students at the state level go on to compete at the national level each year. The competition brings nearly 400 students to compete for coveted scholarships from the nation's best culinary and restaurant management programs.

The culinary competition highlights each team's creative abilities through the preparation of a three-course meal in 60 minutes, using only two butane burners, limited access to running water, and no electricity. Students are evaluated on taste, skill, teamwork, safety, and sanitation. Chef Andrew Nutter and Chef Erin Reed were part of this year's judging panel. Chef Nutter served as a Check-in Judge and Chef Erin Reed as a Tasting Dessert Judge. Admissions Counselor Kala Vargo also represented the Academy of Culinary Arts at the event's Business and Education Expo.

The IUP Academy of Culinary Arts offered a \$2,000 scholarship to all 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place team members in both Culinary and Management categories.

Dr. Swauger engages students by teaching a variety of DEI courses, often incorporating service-learning activities. She collaborates and works with vulnerable and disadvantaged populations, and she serves on many university, community, and regional committees and organizations dedicated to raising awareness, solving problems, and fostering change.



Ms. Nabiha Islam, a graduate student in the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice, received the newly created *Outstanding Efforts at Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Graduate Student Award*. Nabiha served as a graduate assistant where she dedicated herself to bettering the lives of her fellow students by spearheading social justice and inclusion efforts. At the Office of International Education, she managed the Culture Café, in which international and domestic students came to



mingle and learn from one another. While with the Social Equity and Title IX office, she was one of two leaders in the Walking Audit, an exercise that involved walking, observing, and conversing with Black, Brown, and LGBTQIA+ students and literally taking steps to make the campus more inclusive. As part of the Division of Student Affairs and the Center for Multicultural Student Leadership and Engagement, Nabiha assisted in the creation of the Crimson Scholars Circle, an initiative to ensure the safe transition into college life for Black and Brown students and to provide mentors at IUP. Nabiha is also a founder of Students Against Racism (SAR), a recognized student organization which holds weekly meetings and activities and hosts difficult discussions in a safe space. Nabiha's experiences at IUP taught her anything is possible and she can have an impact on the world.

Mr. Charles Coleman, a Public Health major with a minor in Economics, received the newly created

Outstanding Efforts at Diversity, Equity, and Undergraduate Student Award. Charles examined disparities of African American individuals in STEM-based professional roles, an Affirmative Action project presented at the IUP Undergraduate Scholar's Forum in April. He also published the results of an earlier study investigating the historical trends of racial segregation by position in the National Football League. Charles is interning this summer at a college preparatory school serving low-income boys and families in grades 9-12 from a cross section of the Mon Valley, assisting in the classroom, acting as a mentor/counselor, and serving as assistant basketball coach. After graduation, he will continue at IUP in the Master of Science in Health Service Administration Program in the Fall 2022.





Dr. Bitna Kim, Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice, received the *Outstanding Researcher Award*, given to a faculty member who has demonstrated significant research in the field/discipline; quality, originality, and interdisciplinary nature of their research; breadth; and mentoring future or less experienced researchers. Dr. Kim's scholarly activities have contributed to the discipline's strong demand for evidence-based research and multi-agency partnerships with a focus on meta-analyses of interventions, policies, and programs), anti-oppressive attitudes, community policing and community corrections, and multinational collaborations.

Dr. Joshua Castle, professor and chairperson of the Department of Kinesiology, Health, and Sport Science, received the Outstanding Service Award which is given annually to a faculty member who has demonstrated quality service at the department, college, university, community, state, national, and professional levels. Dr. Castle's service encompasses many levels and areas, and he volunteers regularly as a committee member, committee chair, program coordinator, department representative, director, co-director, and board of director member.





Dr. Tara Johnson, Department of Psychology, received the Outstanding Teacher Award. The award is given to a faculty member who possesses critical or synthetic thinking skills, who mentors or supports students outside the classroom, and who displays excellence in teaching. Dr. Johnson not only motivates her students to play an active role in their education, but she also teaches them how to effectively learn. She expects student involvement in class, encourages professionalism, emphasizes transferrable skills, builds teamwork, and holds students accountable.
