WRITING-INTENSIVE COURSES

SCHEDULING INFORMATION FOR CHAIRPERSONS AND DEANS

This memo outlines the information you need to indicate which of your sections will carry the Writing designation as you prepare your class schedule

Please do not designate a section as writing-intensive if the course/professor has not been approved by the Liberal Studies Committee.

<u>Placing a 'W' on your Schedule.</u> To designate a section as writing-intensive, in Banner form SSASECT, use a W as part of the section number in the 3-character Section field, i.e., section W02 to designate section 2 as writing intensive.

Authorizations. Authorization to use the 'W' is given in three ways:

- (1) Professor Commitment
- (2) Departmental Course
- (3) Professor-Individual Course

The Chairperson's options. The Senate guidelines describe your options this way:

"In the case of a professor commitment, the chairperson may apply a 'W' to any course or section of a course, any time this professor is the instructor (assuming, of course, that the professor agrees to teach this course in a writing-intensive manner).

"In the case of a departmental course, the 'W' may be applied any time that the department can fulfill its promise to insure the course is writing-intensive.

"In the case of a professor-individual course authorization, the chairperson may apply a 'W' only when the specific professor(s) and specific course are paired on the class schedule."

You also have the flexibility to designate some sections of a course without designating all; you can also designate a course for one semester without having to designate it every time thereafter.

Omissions of the 'W' designation continue to be a problem, and correcting the omission after grades are recorded is time consuming for the Registrar's Office, as the record of each student enrolled in the class must be edited to add the 'W'. In an effort to avoid this problem, please check with Type I professors in your department about their intent to designate a course as writing intensive before the schedule is finalized. Even though a course and/or professor has been approved as writing-intensive, the 'W' will not automatically appear on the schedule, but must be designated, as noted above, by the person entering the information into Banner.
