



The body of work that the MFA students at IUP are coming up with is a dynamic, curious, and vibrant representation of the state of art today: mixing, recombining, appropriating... blurring the line between disciplines.

This year's exhibition hopes to reflect the wide array of approaches to art making currently developing at IUP. It is undeniable that new technologies have infiltrated most art programs, and it is impossible to escape the fact that time-based art is finding its way into ceramics, sculpture, and painting, while space related concerns/interests also become evident in media based work.

The meeting of time and space through the hybridization of forms results in interesting experiments with light and its relationship with various materials, like cardboard, projection screens and surfaces. Issues of consumption, waste, addiction and the obsession with the body are being addressed through ceramics, painting, installation, and video work. The foreign eye is visible too, bringing the necessary cultural criticism, observation, and reflection on what it physically means to be dislocated in a world of fabricated and superficial identities.

The Graduate Art Exhibition at the University Museum is a venue to view some of the newest contemporary art at the graduate level. Therefore, this is a significant event for IUP and is the result of hard work that the faculty and the students have accomplished over the past year. It shows the strength, ability and commitment of the arts at IUP and clearly rivals some of the best schools in the country. Traditionally, the show exhibits graduates who come from all over the world and this year is no exception. Our graduate students are pushed to be technically and conceptually innovative artists who are held accountable to defend their position. The plethora of views within the exhibit is a testimony to its audience of the vast array of decision making within the arts that is pluralistic in nature. 
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
