No expletives can describe one's first partment (and hopefully soon . . especially when one remembers how grossly lacking the old Cogswell Hall was in its later years. It never was an adequate building for the size and scope of the music department, and, finally, it was rapidly becoming a poor comparison to even the high school music facilities in the area! If the quality of the faculty and programs had not been what it was and is, there would not have been much to attract new students, certainly not from a physical plant standpoint.

The new structure is beautiful, expansive and far more appropriate for the excellence of the music department. Hopefully, this new facility will help launch further expansion in terms of an additional badly needed NEW auditorium and the bringing of a refurbished Fisher and Waller into the total Fine Arts complex.
