
The Steinways are here!

With the exception of the Steinway & Sons D 9-foot concert grand to be placed in Fisher Auditorium, the Department of Music has received the complete shipment of all Steinway pianos. There are 38 grand pianos and 54 uprights. The first shipment of pianos arrived in July 2006 with subsequent shipments arriving on October 28, 2006, November 10 & 17, 2006, December 1, & 15 2006, and concluded with the final delivery of the 3 nine-foot concert grand model D's that were placed in the Large Ensemble Rehearsal Room, Gorell Hall, and the Blue Room, on February 9, 2007.

On April 26, 2007, a celebration was held to officially declare IUP an All-Steinway school. An all-Mozart concert, under the direction of Dr. Stanley Chepaitis, was presented by the IUP Orchestra with soloist Dr. James Staples in Gorell Hall. Ray Rotuna, Steinway & Sons northeast senior district manager, represented Steinway president Bruce Stevens. He read a letter from Stevens that praised the university for its investment in eighty-two new Steinway pianos as part of the Cogswell Hall renaissance. As an All-Steinway School, IUP joins an exclusive group of less than 50 of the schools of music in the world and is one of only seven Pennsylvania colleges and universities with the All-Steinway School designation.

On October 5 and 6, 2007 the annual meeting of the Atlantic Chapter of the *Music Library Association* was hosted by the Harold S. Orendorff Music Library at IUP. The Atlantic Chapter has more than one hundred members from Pennsylvania, Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia. Music librarians from all the major universities, conservatories of music, public libraries and at least eight from the Library of Congress attended. Among the attendees were Richard Hunter (Library of Congress), a native of Indiana, Pa., and Timothy Sestrick (Music Librarian at Gettysburg College), an IUP master's degree alumnus in percussion (2003). It was the first time in fifteen years that IUP hosted a music library chapter meeting.

The first day the chapter met in the "Victorian Jewel" of IUP, the Breezedale Alumni Center. The program included Dr. Theodore Albrecht from Kent State University, who gave a presentation on "Reconstructing Beethoven's Orchestras in Viennese Libraries and Archives.' On the second day they met in the Commons of the Orendorff Music Library. Our own Dr. Matt Baumer presented a paper entitled "Music for Charity, Charity for Music: Humanitarianism, Aesthetic Advocacy, and Self-Promotion in the Career of Franz Liszt" based on a presentation he made in England last summer. In addition, there was a Community Contradance on Friday night held in the Music Theater Rehearsal Room (on the stage of the old Orendorff Auditorium) featuring the live music of Cornsilk, including Dr. Susan Wheatlev and friends. The meeting ended with a tour of the newly renovated Cogswell Hall. Several of the attendees stayed over to bike or run our local trails.

Dr. Hegberg will perform a solo recital at Zion Church on the eve of the competition.

On Saturday, April 26, 2008, IUP graduate Michael Long will host an Alumni Organ Recital at Latrobe Presbyterian Church, Latrobe, PA, where he is Organist and Director of Music. The recital will feature three celebrated IUP alumni who studied under the tutelage of our beloved Dr. Carol Teti - Michael Long, Jim Riggs and Vince Ryan. 



The IUP String Ensemble, under the direction of Dr. Stanley Chepaitis, will present the Premier Performance of two pieces for String Orchestra by IUP Alumnus Michael Barnett on November 15, 2007. The pieces are entitled *Black Tears* and *Strung Out*. The String Ensemble will repeat this performance in Heinz Hall on November 27.

Senior Percussion major **Michael Dooley** received special recognition for an "Outstanding Presentation in the Discipline of the Arts" at the 4th Annual Summer Research Institute of the IUP McNair Scholars Program - June 29, 2007.

With the help of a grant from the National String Project Consortium, the IUP String Project - a string education outreach program of the IUP Music Department directed by Dr. Linda Jennings - will expand its offerings outside of Indiana in order to provide string education to those communities without string programs.

In the fall of 2006, with the assistance of **Dr. Linda Jennings** as faculty advisor, the IUP string students chartered a new organization, IUPASTA, a student chapter of the Pennsylvania and Delaware American String Teachers Association. Some of the many successful projects sponsored by this group included: assisting with the Indiana Area School District grade school orchestra; assisting IASD string teacher Julianne Laird with her new, innovative Fiddle Club; coordinating a T-shirt design contest for the IUP String Project students; attending the ASTA National Conference in Detroit, Michigan; fundraising for scholarships to support young Haitian musicians at music camps; and providing recruiting programs for IASD and St. Bernards school.

During the spring 2007 semester the IUP Department of Music hosted two Croatian students through the IUP College of Fine Arts International Program: Maja Vikicevi (piano and composition) and Vice Zirdum (piano and music education). Plans are underway for further IUP and Croatian student exchanges this coming year, and faculty exchanges during the 2008-2009 school year.

A **Flute Quartet** coached by IUP Professor of Flute **Dr. Therese Wacker** has been accepted to play at the 2008 PMEA Conference, which will be held in Hershey, PA. Their performance will occur sometime on Friday the 18th of April.

This past summer, the **Keystone Winds**, under the direction of Dr. Jack Stamp, continued their "Composer's Voice" recording project with Klavier Records by recording the music of Ron Nelson. The disc will feature little known or neglected works of Nelson, including his Danza Capriccio for alto saxophone and band, which features our Professor of Saxophone, Dr. Keith Young. The disc will include an interview with Dr. Nelson and will be released in December 2007. In addition, a compilation disc entitled The Essential Keystone Wind Ensemble, featuring selections from past Keystone releases on the Citadel label, is being produced. This disc will be available in early 2008.

The IUP Bands of 2007 compact disc has just been released, featuring the IUP Wind Ensemble, Symphony Band, and Concert Band. Included among the many works is a solo piece for tuba with Dr. Gary Bird as soloist. This CD also boast two world premieres of works written for the IUP Bands. *Radiant Joy*, by Steve Bryant, was written for and premiered by the **Wind Ensemble**, and *Song for Lyndsay* was composed for and premiered by the **Symphony Band**.

The IUP Wind Ensemble has been invited to perform at the College Band Directors National Association's Eastern Regional Conference in Washington, DC in February 2008.

Twelve members of the IUP Sax Studio traveled to the 2007 U.S. Navy Band International Saxophone Symposium. IUP was represented with a performance by one of our own saxophone quartets, whose members include: Justin Polyblank, Mitch Custer, Justin Canzano and Will Gillespie. In addition, this quartet was selected from 38 nationwide entries as one of 12 chamber groups to compete in the Senior Wind Division of the 2007 Fischoff Chamber Music Competition at Notre Dame University. Congratulations also to Justin Polyblank and Justin Canzano for winning 1st and 3rd Place respectively in the annual IUP Delta Omicron Solo Competition.



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
