

Jim Dearing, Director of Choral Studies, passes away by Geraldine Teele

Jim Dearing Director of Choral Studies at IUP for 28 years, lost his battle to cancer in November 2010.

James Craig Dearing was born in Lynchburg, Virginia on October 20, 1943. His formative years were spent in Newport News and Lynchburg, Virginia. At age 16 he entered Shenandoah Valley Academy in New Market, Virginia. That is when he began his singing.

He entered college with a major in Theology and a minor in Music at Washington Adventist College, Washington, D.C. The next two years were spent at Southern Adventist University in Tennessee and it was there that he changed his major to Music. His last year was spent at La Sierra College in California.

He auditioned for the famed Roger Wagner Chorale and embarked on an international tour under the auspices of Sol Hurok Productions, sponsored by the USA State Department. It was between tours that the Army called and he entered the military. He was stationed on the border of Yugoslavia when he learned that the 7th Army Chorus was performing in Germany. He flew there, auditioned and was accepted and also was chosen to be the Assistant Conductor of the group.

Following his service in the Army, he entered the University of Wisconsin and continued his studies in Music. It was there that he received a Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance; Bachelor of Music in History & Theory and a Master of Music in Conducting. He taught at the University of Illinois – Chicago Campus; Cal-Poly Tech in San Luis Obispo, California; the University of Virginia in Charlottesville, Virginia, and the last twenty-eight years at Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

He is survived by his wife, Kristi Jo; his son, Christopher and wife, Sarah, of Madison, Wisconsin; his grandchild, Chloe; his mother, Geraldine Teele and step-father of Waynesboro, Virginia; brother Gregory, of Fayetteville, NC; nieces, nephews, and cousins.

The Joan Boytim Collection by Carl Rahkonen, Music Librarian

Joan Frey Boytim is a nationally known voice teacher, widely recognized as an expert in training young singers, as well as an accomplished French horn player and piano accompanist. She has taught voice in her private studio in Carlisle, Pennsylvania for more than forty-five years.

Boytim graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania with a Bachelor of Music degree (1955) and Master's of Music Education degree (1964), and continued her education at Indiana University (Bloomington) and the Staatlich Hochschule für Musik (Munich). In 2007 she was named a Distinguished Alumna of IUP.

Boytim has edited dozens of vocal editions published by the Hal Leonard Corporation. These include such well know works as the "First Book" and "Second Book" of vocal solo series in all voice ranges. The Music Library owns more than thirty of her publications. She compiled these anthologies from many sources that she collected over the years. As a leader in the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS), she also acquired a great deal of vocal music. In 2007 she decided to donate her massive collection of vocal music, and some French horn music, to the Orendorff Music Library.

So far she has donated nearly 300 pieces which were not previously in our collection, from standard works of well-known composers, to obscure works found in few other libraries. This has greatly enriched our Music Library collection, especially in vocal music. Each piece has a golden label acknowledging her gift.

# Faculty notes:



#### **New Music Faculty**

The Department of Music welcomes **Heather Zosel** as the interim Director of Choral Activities at IUP. She is a DMA candidate in choral conducting at the University of Arizona. While at the UA, Ms. Zosel was Assistant Director of the University Community Chorus, and served as collegiate president of the American Choral Directors Association. She sang in the Arizona Choir, Musica Sonora, Tucson Chamber Artists, and Coro, and has been featured in performances of Mozart's Vesperae solennes de Confessore, Handel's Messiah and Bach's St. John Passion.

Ms. Zosel holds a BM in music education and an MA in choral conducting, both from Washington State University. She performed in opera and musical theatre choruses for productions of *Die Fledermaus*, *She Loves Me*, *Carmen* and *High Society*; and also received the prestigious Presser Award for outstanding scholarship and musical ability.

Ms. Zosel served as Director of Choirs and Bands at Oroville High School, and conductor of the Okanogan Valley Orchestra Chorus, both in Washington State. She is active in musical theatre and has served as chorus master, vocal coach and accompanist for three production companies in the Okanogan Valley area.

Dr. Zach Collins performed at two regional conferences in spring and summer 2011. He performed a solo recital and judged the artist division solo tuba competition at the International Tuba Euphonium Association (ITEA) South Central Tuba-Euphonium Regional Conference at Baylor University in March. In May Dr. Collins performed a recital at the ITEA Northeastern Tuba-Euphonium Regional Conference at Montclair State University in New Jersey.

Dr. Henry Wong Doe's debut recording, Horizon, featuring the complete solo piano works and two chamber works by New Zealand composer Gareth Farr, was released on the Trust record label on September 22, 2011. He received two grants: one from Creative NZ, the Arts Council of New Zealand and the other from the University Senate Research Council at IUP to make the recording. He performed selections from this CD on his IUP faculty recital on September 20th in Gorell Recital Hall, and will perform these works again at Carnegie Weill Recital Hall in NYC on March 26, 2012.

Piccolo Impressions, works for solo piccolo with piano, featuring **Dr. Therese Wacker**, piccolo and **Dr. Judith Radell**, piano, will be released in November 2011. Dr. Wacker also presented two performances and a master class at Western State College in Gunnison, Colorado in April 2011. She presented a solo recital and performed Eric Ewazen's On Wings of Song with the WSC Wind Ensemble.

**Dr. David Ferguson** recently had his brass quintet arrangement of *In The Bleak Midwinter* published by Eighth Note Publications (*www.enpmusic.com/*). The work was premiered in a performance given by the Hoodlebug Brass, IUP's faculty brass-quintet-inresidence, on December 7, 2010.

Dr. Carl Rahkonen, IUP Music Librarian, will complete his service as the Finlandia Foundation Lecturer of the Year in November. He presented a lecture entitled "The Finnish American Musical Journey" in fifteen cities around the United States, as far away as Florida, California and the UP of Michigan. Rahkonen was also invited to play viola with a select group for the Jean Sibelius En Saga Septet at the FinnFest 2011 in San Diego.

Dr. Stanley Chepaitis has released a new CD. Titled Double Take, the recording features music of Bach and Telemann and Dr. Chepaitis' original jazz reflections based on the baroque compositions. Bassist Nathan Santos and pianist Peter Dugas join Dr. Chepaitis in the unusual collaboration. Jazz critic Robert Sutton, writing in the jazz blog Jazz Corner, has said: "Chepaitis delivers a scorching performance.....the energy is infectious and emotionally uplifting." Dr. Linda Jennings was a featured soloist in a performance of Lou Harrison's Concerto for Violin, Cello and Javanese Gamelan at Bates College in Lewiston, Maine in March 2011. As a member of the Arcadia Piano Trio. Dr. Jennings presented a concert in Ontario, Canada as well as concerts, master classes, lessons and lectures while in residence at Rungsit University in Bangkok and Payap University in Chiang Mai, Thailand in June 2011. She received an IUP Senate Grant to support this project. Dr. Jennings also received the Faculty Volunteer Service of the Year Award for her work with music education programs in Haiti and with the IUP String Project over the past years.

**Dr. Michael Kingan** recorded "Pegasus" by Ben Wahlund for Snare Drum solo and percussion trio and "I Remember Sky" by Steven Sondheim with **Dr. Laura Ferguson** and the IUP Faculty Jazz Ensemble for a new CD project featuring IUP Music Faculty. He also recorded "Concertino for Percussionist and Band" by **Jack Stamp**

# Joan Boytim Scholarship for Vocal Performance:



A member of the Class of 1955, **Joan Frey Boytim** received a Rotary International Fellowship to study in Munich after graduation. With a strong appreciation for what scholarships can mean to students, she established two different scholarship funds, one of which benefits voice students.

The Joan Frey Boytim Scholarships for Vocal Performance afford awards for both men and women who are in their senior year of study.

The author of The Private Voice Studio Handbook - A Practical Guide to All Aspects of Teaching, Boytim is a nationally recognized voice teacher. She received her M.Ed. from IUP in 1964 and, later, an IUP Distinguished Alumni Award. While the Boytim fund is fully endowed and currently fulfilling scholarships to students, it is worthy of continued contributions to help ensure Boytim's vision of providing continuing resources for those who excel in vocal performance.

# Jim Dearing Music Library:

When **James Dearing** died earlier this year, hundreds of students and alumni gathered for a memorial concert to celebrate his life. The memorial messages they sent for the concert program serve as testimony to the number of students he touched during the twenty-eight years he taught and directed choral groups at IUP.

If we could send a copy of that program to each of you receiving this newsletter, we would — and you would find it compelling. As one alumnus wrote: I used to chuckle at Mr. Dearing's stomping on the podium, but now, as a teacher . . . I understand it was just another way his passion shone through.

Jim Dearing was, indeed, a passionate mentor. We want to make a lasting memorial to Jim Dearing by naming the music library for him.

Gifts to name the library will be used to purchase additional scores and commission new works for choral performances, among other things.



# Gary Olmstead Percussion Room:



In 2002, the Percussive Arts Society (PAS) presented its Lifetime Achievement Award in Education to Gary Olmstead, and that award is indicative of Olmstead's contribution to IUP's music program, which spanned nearly four decades.

A group of alumni and faculty members have come together to strive to raise \$75,000 to name Cogswell Hall's percussion rehearsal room in honor of Dr. O. Gary and Michaelina Olmstead have already pledged their support, but other gifts are needed. Reaching the goal complements an endowed scholarship fund the Olmsteads established in 1995 to assist percussion students—further demonstrating Dr. O's dedication to percussion education.

Funds raised to name the room will directly benefit percussion students through the purchase of new equipment, the repair of existing equipment, provision of expenses for students to perform at conferences or other events, the hosting of guest artists, and commissioning of new and unique works for percussion.

## DiCicco Rehearsal Room:

Family and friends of the late **Daniel "Doc" DiCicco** are continuing to raise the private funds needed to officially name the DiCicco Rehearsal Hall in accordance with university policy.

Alumni remember Doc DiCicco as the champion of all things jazz. Among notable roles, he served as Director of Band for the IUP Department of Music and led *The Mellowmen* from 1973 to 1989.

On the day that Cogswell Hall formally reopened in January 2006, Dr. Dicicco, IUP class of '54, took a ceremonial turn as conductor, directing the IUP Wind Ensemble in the large ensemble room. From the moment of the first downbeat, Doc owned the rehearsal room. Now, the Music Department wishes to honor the memory of its director of bands emeritus with gifts in support of naming the rehearsal hall in memory of DiCicco and his wife.

Gifts made to name the rehearsal hall will be directed toward instrument upgrades and maintenance and continuing enhancements on the DiCicco Rehearsal Hall.



## Honors Brass Quintet:



**James Self**, class of '65, and his wife, Jamie, are the sparks behind the Honors Brass Quintet scholarship.

Self is a highly regarded freelance musician and teacher who received the IUP Distinguished Alumni Award in 2003. He and his wife recently provided a gift that named the brass and jazz rehearsal room in Cogswell Hall, along with a generous seed gift to establish a scholarship fund for brass students.

"Jim and Jamie did not want their name on the scholarship endowment. They do hope that others will contribute to the fund and help it grow to provide a sizeable scholarship award to participating students," said Shari Trinkley, the College of Fine Arts development officer. "Jim's desire is to have the fund grow to provide a minimum of \$1,000 to each of the five scholarship recipients on an annual basis."

In return, Trinkley said, the scholarship recipients will perform in the Honors Brass Quintet. As the name suggests, the scholarships will be awarded to brass students with the most potential.

## Department of Music Outreach:



The IUP Tubaphonium Ensemble has been selected to perform at the 2012 PMEA Conference in Lancaster, PA. The ensemble will perform on Thursday morning, April 19. The ensemble is set to perform works composed or arranged by IUP students, alumni and faculty.

Dr. Keith Young and twelve members of the IUP Saxophone Studio performed and attended the 2011 U.S. Navy Band International Saxophone Symposium at George Mason University, Fairfax, Va. A quartet comprised of Melanie Davis, Will Gillespie, Bailey Fulkroad, and Jake Kearney performed on the College Quartet recital series along with other quartets from around the country. This same quartet participated in a masterclass performance at IUP for composer Frank Ticheli's visit to campus last fall.

The IUP Percussion Ensemble directed by Dr. Michael Kingan commercially released a CD entitled "Opus Pocus" on Klavier Music Productions in Spring 2011. The CD features new works by IUP Percussion students and alumni including: Vince Wallace's transcription/arrangement Jaco Pastorious' "Opus Pocus," a piece by flamenco guitarist Jose Manuel Leon called "Sirimusa" transcribed and arranged by Chris Leidhecker. and "Visions in a Dream" by Dana **Difilippantonio**, a percussion quintet premiered by IUP PE. During this past year, the ensemble also premiered "Tribongolation," a percussion trio by Vince Wallace, "But I digress...,"a percussion duo by Dana Difilippantonio, and "NAMASTE - Concerto for Marimba and Percussion Ensemble" which featured Drew Lang, by Gerald Brad Bodine as part of a Consortium Commission.

The IUP String Project, under the direction of Dr. Linda Jennings, continues in its mission of providing quality string education for students in the area. During the past year, the program expanded its teachertraining portion which is now encompassed in a new Practicum in String *Pedagogy* class. The program is now more visible with its new website (www.iup.edu/stringproject) and was featured in two regional newspapers. The IUP String Project was once again granted an award from the National String Project Consortium to support scholarships for deserving young string musicians to participate in the program. The program continues its outreach support of string programs in the region through providing string instruction at St. Bernards School in Indiana and at Central Cambria School District. In Spring 2011, the IUP String Project received funding for the 2nd year from the IUP Center for Civic Engagement and Leadership to support travel money for an IUP String Project teacher to assist in teaching the first class of a new string program in this school district which was established by IUP alumn Melissa Douglas. The new Practicum course in String Pedagogy received the IUP Service Learning Project of the Year Award due to the many outreach and service learning activities that IUP string students engage in while teaching in the program.

The past year was one of the most successful years of the College of Fine Arts Exchange Program in the Music Department. In the fall of 2009, the Music Department hosted two students from the Music Academy in Zagreb, Croatia: Nela Saric, voice major, and Antonia Mimica, composition major. In the spring of 2010, the Music Department hosted faculty visits from two of our sister institutions. Dr. Mary Hastings hosted Cynthia Hansell, a guest professor from the Music Academy in Croatia, who presented a master class and worked with voice students. Dr. Linda Jennings hosted Juan Hermidez (cellist) and Misa Ito (pianist), guest professors from the University of the Americas, Mexico, Peubla. Mr. Hermidez and Ms. Ito presented master classes and

lessons for IUP students. **Dr. Therese Wacker** and Dr. Jennings joined Mr. Hermidez and Ms. Ito in an evening of chamber music on the *IUP Sound Choice Concert Series*. During the IUP International Festival of Women Composers in March of 2010, alum **Rich Auvil** was highlighted in his presentation on a Croatian composer, research that came out of his participation in a CFA exchange to the Music Academy in 2006.

This fall the Carol Teti Memorial Organ Scholarship Committee (CT-MOS) was pleased to present "An Evening of Organ, Harpsichord, and Piano" at Zion Lutheran Church. The recital was dedicated to the memory of William J. Kelly, friend, member, and supporter of the scholarship committee, and Carol Teti's husband. The organ alumni who participated were Dr. Christine Clewell (IUP Organ Professor), Mark King, Sandra Rubright and Vincent Rvan. The recital was assisted by freshman organ major Hadley Cesar, and Dr. Therese Wacker, Associate Professor of Flute at IUP.

On Sunday, November 13, 2011 and Sunday, April 1, 2012, IUP scholarship recipients will be presenting solo recitals. On November 13 Maximillian Esmus will perform a senior organ and conducting recital at Zion Lutheran Church at 8:00 pm. The recital will be presented in a service format, and it will include solo literature, hymn singing, conducting a small vocal ensemble, and works composed by Maximillian, a theory/composition major under the tutelage of Professor **Dan Perlongo**. The organ studio will also participate in the student recital series at Heinz Memorial Chapel Student Recital Series in Oakland.

Looking ahead to spring 2012, alumni and friends are also encouraged to attend two additional organ-related events here in Indiana. On Friday evening, April 20 at Graystone Presbyterian Church, CTMOS will host in recital the internationally renowned artist Hector Olivera. In addition to his solo recital, Mr. Olivera will serve as the guest adjudicator for the Sixth
