IUP celebrated the **\$4.6 million renovation of Whitmyre** Hall, home to the Cook Honors College, and the 20th anniversary of the first graduating class of the college, with a ribbon-cutting ceremony featuring remarks from Distinguished Alumni Award recipient Dave Reed '00, a member of that first graduating class. The Cook Honors College welcomed its largest freshman class in its history – 138 students — in fall 2019.



In October, IUP dedicated the Larry F. Sobotka Science Discovery and Outdoor Learning Center. This 7,150-square-foot outdoor classroom is funded by a gift from Sobotka, a 1963 education graduate, is used by community members and students of all ages, and is a tool for education students to develop strategies to teach environmental education.

IUP's Holocaust Remembrance Committee coordinated a day of programming in the community and on campus with Holocaust survivors and scholars, including a special training event for cadets in IUP's Criminal Justice Training Center.

IUP's Department of Anthropology has launched a Cultural Competencies Certificate to help prepare students for life and professional practice in culturally diverse settings.

Extending IUP's commitment to creating opportunities for diversity and inclusion, Shijuan (Laurel) Liu, of the Department of Foreign Languages, created a year-long bilingual forum for students, faculty, and the Indiana community.

Alumni Kareem Jordan ('99, M'01, D'05) was the keynote presenter for the **Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice's "No Place for Hate" seminar**, a response to a September racist social media post. More than 300 students attended the program, which was followed by a workshop on difficult dialogs, led by Gwen Torges and David Chambers (Political Science).

Athletics and the Department of Food and Nutrition


has created a fueling station for student athletes. Sports Performance Nutrition Services, staffed by undergraduate and graduate nutrition students, provides nutrition education and counseling to student athletes, showcasing the connection between athletics and academics.



Following three years of work, the IUP Food Pantry and Help Center opened in September, under the direction of the Division of Student Affairs. Student volunteers from the Each One, Reach One program in the Frederick Douglass Institute provide staffing for the center.

Environmental Water Resources Institute, a branch of the American Society of Civil Engineers, has a new chapter at IUP. Students in the Environmental Engineering program have been active in establishing the university's chapter. Veronica Watson (English) received \$155,454 to support the work of the Frederick Douglass Institute Collaborative. The two-year award was made by Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education, with additional support coming from IUP. This marks the ninth year of continuous funding from PASSHE.

A team of six undergraduate students and two faculty members from the **Department of Biology** conducted a study of Lyme disease risk in the Pittsburgh regional parks and co-authored an article based on their research, published in the *Journal of Medical Entomology*.
