## **Making an Impact**



As of September 30, Impact 150, IUP's comprehensive campaign launched in August to celebrate IUP's sesquicentennial, has raised \$97,842,766, or 65 percent of its \$150 million goal. The campaign's themes are healthy students, a healthy university, and healthy communities.

Part of the Impact 150 campaign, IUP's proposed college of osteopathic medicine and its commitment to addressing the rural health crisis have resulted in funding from individual donors, foundations, agencies, and legislators totaling more than \$48 million.



Impact 150: IUP Criminology Graduate to Gift More Than \$3 Million to Support Education, Criminology Seniors at IUP

Arlene Eva Langley-Mendenhall, '78 criminology and sociology, will gift more than \$3 million to establish the Arlene Eva Langley Memorial Scholarship at IUP. The scholarship will support tuition, fees, and books for two full-time seniors annually: one student majoring in education and one student majoring in criminology.



#### <u>IUP Alumni Deb and Tim Cejka Honored With</u> <u>2025 Keepers of the Flame Award</u>

Alumni Tim and Deb Cejka '73, were honored by the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education with the 2025 Keepers of the Flame Award for their sustained leadership, vision, and generosity. The Keepers of the Flame Award recognizes an individual from each of the 14 State System university campuses for their contributions to creating and promoting diverse and inclusive environments that cultivate a sense of belonging.



IUP Scholar in Residence, Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient, Wins International R&D Award for Breakthrough in Mass Spectrometry; Proof of Technology Demonstrated at IUP

Howard M. "Skip" Kingston, '73, M'75, scholar in residence at IUP's Madia Department of Chemistry, Biochemistry, and Physics, IUP, and the IUP Research Institute, won a 2025 R&D 100 Award for "Thor's Hammer," a breakthrough that has the potential to advance precision medicine and rural healthcare. Kingston has gifted state-of-the-art equipment valued at more than \$1.8 million to IUP, including the university's first inductively coupled plasma mass spectrometer (ICP-MS), which allows isotope analyses. This equipment is part of the Kingston Laboratory in IUP's John J. and Char Kopchick Hall, which is used by faculty and by students for a variety of courses and research projects.

#### IUP Receives \$1.3 Million for Crimson Hawk Bridge Program to Serve Students With Intellectual Disabilities

IUP has received \$1.34 million from the U.S. Department of Education to develop the Crimson Hawks Bridge, a multi-year program to help individuals with intellectual disabilities gain skills, experience, and credentials to live independently and successfully transition to the workforce.

A total of 429 students will be receiving degrees at the associate's, bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels at IUP's commencement ceremonies on December 13. Of the 289 bachelor's degree recipients, 149 qualified for honors (3.25 or above cumulative grade point average).

# IUP Receives \$2 Million from National Science Foundation to Support Students Earning Data Science Degrees

IUP received \$2 million from the National Science Foundation to help academically talented and financially challenged students earn data science degrees. Spanning six years and starting in spring 2026, the project, Experiential Pathways and Networks for Data Science (EXPANDS) Opportunities Scholarship program, will support 36 scholars, with particular focus on transfer students from regional and partner community colleges, to transition to IUP to complete bachelor's and graduate degrees in data sciences.

#### <u>IUP Student Wins Pennsylvania Historical</u> Association Prize

Applied Archaeology graduate student Emma Lashley won the 2025 Pennsylvania Historical Association (PHA) Magruder-Newman Prize for Best Student Paper Presentation for her paper "The Wanton Women of Western Pennsylvania: Identifying Individuals of the Sex Work Industry in Early 20th Century Rural Pennsylvania."

The Madia Department of Chemistry, Biochemistry, and Physics hosted a research seminar featuring Belinda Lin Xu, who presented her summer research experience at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center. She spent 10 weeks in Houston, Texas, as part of the Partnership for Careers in Cancer Science and Medicine and the John J. Kopchick Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship. This highly competitive program provides undergraduates with the opportunity to conduct hands-on biomedical research alongside world-class scientists.

Baker '05 each donated \$5,000, which included prize money for the winning groups and a \$5,000 donation to the Student Assistance Fund.

## Braun named Tri-State PGA Golf Executive of the Year

Dan Braun, coach of IUP men's golf and president of the Tri-State PGA, was named 2025 PGA Tri-State Section Golf Executive of the Year. The award recognizes a PGA professional in good standing for at least 10 years who has served in an executive management role for a minimum of three years. Braun is in his seventh season leading IUP men's golf and serves as the athletic department's first academic coordinator. He previously became IUP's inaugural academic coordinator before adding coaching duties. He also directs academic support for multiple varsity teams.

## Smith named Player of the Year, Hays and Lattea named CCA All-Region

Three IUP women's soccer players earned all-region honors from the Division II Conference Commissioners Association. Elle Smith was named the Atlantic Region Player of the Year after leading Division II in goals. PSAC West Defensive Player of the Year Emma Hays joined Smith on the first team. Emily Lattea was selected to the second team after finishing among the nation's top 10 in goals scored.

#### Rueve named Harlon Hill Award Nominee

IUP graduate student quarterback Matthew Rueve was named a nominee for the 2025 Harlon Hill Award, given annually to the nation's top Division II football player. Rueve is one of 36 nominees, including eight from Super Region I.

#### IUP Volleyball Advances to Second Regional Final in Three Seasons

IUP women's volleyball made a fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance in 2025, advancing to the NCAA DII Atlantic Region championship match (NCAA Sweet 16) on December 6 in Erie. The Crimson Hawks won 23 matches under the direction of first-year head coach Avery Moore. Three student-athletes earned all-region honors by the American Volleyball Coaches Association.

#### IUP Women's Basketball Ranked No. 13 in WBCA Poll

IUP women's basketball is off to an impressive 6-0 start this season, rising to 13th in the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) Division II Coaches Poll, released December 2. The Crimson Hawks have defeated two top-20 teams this season, with both wins coming at the KCAC.

#### IUP Sees Highest Retention on Record of New, First-Time, Bachelor's Degree Seeking Students, Increase in Undergraduate Enrollment and New Students, Increase in Persistence Rate

For fall 2025, IUP achieved record-breaking retention rates for new, first-time, bachelor's degree-seeking students, as well as increases in both the number of undergraduate degree-seeking students and new, first-time, bachelor's degree-seeking students. Additionally, there was a five percentage point increase in continuing student persistence (students continuing for a third year of study). The retention rate of new, first-time, full-time bachelor's degree-seeking students entering in fall 2024 and returning for fall 2025 is at 78.2 percent, an increase of nearly three percentage points from fall 2023 to fall 2024 retention rate of students in this category.

## IUP Computer Science Program Ranked Seventh in Nation by Cybersecurity Guide

IUP's computer science program has been ranked seventh in the nation by Cybersecurity Guide in its 2026 Cybersecurity Guide. IUP's program is the only program at a Pennsylvania college or university selected for the ranking of "best computer science with cybersecurity emphasis" program.

# IUP Clinical Psychology Doctoral Program Graduates Have 100% Pass Rate on Psychology Licensing Exam

IUP Clinical Psychology Doctor of Psychology program graduates who took the Examination for Professional Practice in Psychology from January 2020 through December 2024—required for licensure and certification in the United States—achieved a 100 percent passing rate. IUP's program has the only 100 percent passing rate of programs at public universities in Pennsylvania for this time period; only five Pennsylvania colleges and universities achieved a 100 percent passing rate.

# IUP Selected for Princeton Review's 2026 Best Colleges: Region by Region Best Mid-Atlantic Listing

IUP continues to be recognized by The Princeton Review, this time, in its 2026 "Best Colleges: Region by Region" listing. IUP is one of fewer than 100 colleges and universities chosen for the Best Mid-Atlantic ranking, which considers colleges in Delaware, the District of Columbia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia. Princeton Review editors selected schools considered to be "academically outstanding."
