IUP Launches Impact 150 Comprehensive Campaign



On Saturday, August 23, following a <u>celebration carnival</u> and before a spectacular fireworks show, IUP officially launched its Impact 150 comprehensive fundraising campaign, the largest in the university's history. The <u>Impact 150 Campaign</u> is named in honor of the university's sesquicentennial celebration in 2025. As of August 1, the campaign has secured \$81,236,852—54 percent of the campaign goal of \$150 million—from 11,673 donors. Themes of the campaign are healthy students, healthy university, and healthy communities.

The Hawks were the only men's golf team in the conference to record a team GPA of over 3.5. The Crimson Hawk golfers earned the fourth-highest team GPA of all the IUP athletic teams.

Crimson Hawk Cross Country runner Dan Gibney was named Academic All-American by the College Sports Communicators. Gibney, who was an All-Region runner and All-PSAC First Team in 2024, was also recognized in the PSAC Fall Top Ten, the 72nd IUP student-athlete to make an appearance in the top ten.

IUP Forensic Science Major to Begin Accepting Students for Fall 2025

IUP will launch a new forensic sciences major for fall 2025. The forensic science program draws on collaborators from IUP departments and PennWest University. It will be administered by IUP's <u>Department of Anthropology</u>, <u>Geospatial and Earth Sciences</u> in the <u>John J. and Char Kopchick College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics</u>. The new major, which will use existing courses and faculty, includes three specializations: Applied Crime Scene Investigation, Laboratory Forensics, and Digital Forensics.

IUP to Host International Fulbright Recipients for Tenth Year

IUP welcomed 22 educators from 13 countries, who will stay from August 13 to December 10 as part of the university's selection as a host for the Fulbright Distinguished Awards in Teaching Program for International Teachers. This is the tenth year IUP has been chosen for the program, which brings international primary and secondary educators who are Fulbright recipients in their home countries to the United States. As part of the program, the visiting teachers will complete professional development coursework at IUP and be guest teachers the Indiana Area School District and in the Pittsburgh Public School system.

IUP's Council of Trustees approved a proposal to shift IUP's Academy of Culinary Arts and the Academy's Baking and Pastry Arts programs from clock-hour to credit-bearing programs. This approval allows students who complete the Culinary Arts or the Baking and Pastry Arts program to receive an Associate in Applied Science degree. This new format begins with students enrolling for the fall 2025 semester.
