Milestones during reporting period:

The ALI relied exclusively on individual subscribers during AY 04-05, recruiting and enrolling approximately 25 full-time students during three semesters. This was a decrease in our average enrollments from the previous year. We completed the year, however, in the black.

The ALI served as a site for teaching internships and teacher training in ESL for the MATESOL program. The ALI was also a research site where several doctoral students in the Ph.D. C&T program collected data for seminar papers and dissertations.

New initiatives begun during 2004-2005:

The ALI-P (American Language Institute-Provisional Undergraduate Admission) program was initiated. Under this program, students are accepted for one year of ESL followed by four years toward a bachelor's degree.

Faculty Fellows Partridge and Lenze authored an Internet enabled text about the Academy Award winning group simulation and animation software Massive in cooperation with the Massive Software Company. This is the only text of its kind, documenting the only commercial three-dimensional group simulation software in use today.

In December, the Gidget project (Graphical Internet Data Gateway for Emerging Technologies) reached its first targeted milestone. The primary application "Link" is operational and the first phase application "UniCom" underwent beta testing.

Thanks to the generous support of the Dean of the College of Education and Educational Technology, the Center has been provided with new swivel desk chairs and a snazzy paint treatment. Efforts to bring the Center's visual appearance up to a more professional level continue.

All local contracts with the Center for Applied Psychology (CAP) have been renewed for the 2005-2006 academic year.

A Doctor Psy.D. reunion was held on June 4, 2005, was well-attended and launched an alumni fund raising initiative.

The CAP continues to co-sponsor American Psychological Association (APA) accredited workshops and has generated revenue and publicity from social service providers in the neighboring counties.

All clinics have treated and/or assessed a record number of clients drawn from both the IUP and local communities.

A client data base has been established to track client contacts across CAP clinics and to facilitate the prompt processing of treatment record releases received from other treatment facilities.

The IUP Center for Economic Education was involved in: 1) offering teacher-training activities to increase teachers' knowledge of basic economic ideas and to familiarize them with methods, strategies, and materials so they can effectively impart that knowledge to their students; 2) providing consulting services to local school districts, education agencies, and community groups regarding needs assessments, curriculum development, course content, resource materials and strategies; 3) conducting research to evaluate existing program effectiveness, to measure student learning, and to find the most effective tools and methods for the delivery of high quality economics education; and 4) developing and distributing National Council on Economic Education (NCEE) and locally-developed curriculum materials useful in economic education.

New initiatives begun during 2004-2005:

Both co-directors of the IUP CEE attended the National Council on Economic Education (NCEE) conference in Little Rock, AR in October 2004 and the National Association of Economic Educators (NAEE) conference in Baltimore, MD in March 2005. They were nominated to membership on the NAEE Professional Development Committee, which is a national, standing committee for the organization.

The co-directors and a center director from SUNY Canton presented a session entitled "The Tenure and Promotion Issue for Economic Educators" at the NAEE Professional Development Conference in Baltimore, MD in March 2005.

Discussions with Dr. Andrew Hill, the economic education specialist at the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia, continued regarding the possibility of collaborative workshops in the Johnstown, PA area.

Discussions with EconomicsPennsylvania regarding field representative support for the IUP CEE were initiated.

The co-directors submitted their article, "Applied Introductory Econometrics," for review by *The Journal of Economic Education*, the top refereed journal in the field of economic education.

Work commenced on the development of a multicultural children's literature curriculum for use in elementary classrooms to teach economic concepts along with language arts, etc.

The co-directors submitted a proposal entitled "Eyes on the World: Economics in a Multicultural Landscape" for presentation at the 2005 NCEE Annual Conference in San Antonio, TX. The proposal was accepted.

Milestones during reporting period:

This was the 3rd year of Project REAL, Rural Education for Accelerated Learners. This is the project that supported the beginning of the Center a year ago. This contract of approximately \$74,000 from October of 04 to August of 05, supported some of what was done this year. However, much of the income was generated by consultations and presentations done by Center personnel. This represents the beginning of the Center's attempt to broaden its funding base. We did 10 school district consultations in gifted education. These were a combination of onsite consultations and meetings at IUP. Two of the consultation projects were long term. We also did 15 presentations across the state pertaining to gifted education and the IUP Center for Gifted Education, and 5 parent consultations here at the Center.

New initiatives begun during 2004-2005:

We further developed the Center by holding regular staff meetings (9 during the year), training graduate assistants to manage the office, and increasing our materials and resources. Specifically, we added curricula, books, and journals for lending to community educators. We began doing presentations on Underachievement and Giftedness, a topic which will be the focus of our new grant initiatives. We applied for a Rural Pennsylvania grant in the area of twice exceptional children, but it was not funded.

Changes in ongoing community relationships:

We worked with the IUP community by increasing communication with faculty across the University who have an interest in gifted education. We worked with Continuing Education to assist in the development and advertising of their gifted education program for middle school students. To this end, we attended 3 meetings and participated in a televised discussion about gifted education and the continuing ed program. We attended 5 meetings at ARIN IU to support their Gifted Education Consortium and attended a conference at Shippensburg to make the Center known in that part of the state, and to foster relationships with a sister university. We attended 3 meetings with the PA Department of Education to assist them with their state-wide planning and grant submission.

Major changes projected for 2005-2006:

We will be making a concentrated effort this year to obtain a grant to address underachievement in high ability and gifted students. We will assist the College of Education with their exploration of the possibility of IUP becoming a Governor's School site and with expansion of dual enrollment for high ability students.

Lead Educational Agency (LEA) Agreements were signed with three local school districts—Emerson Gridley Elementary School, Wilson Middle School and Strong Vincent Junior-Senior High School in the Erie School District.

Collaboration was continued with Edinboro University of Pennsylvania (EUP) where the second HOME PLaTe site was established while continuing the first site at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP).

Center for Statistics Education in Pennsylvania at IUP (CSEPA) continued to provide materials for past participants of SEQual and HOME PLaTe upon request.

The Armstrong School District requested a separate workshop which was entitled HOME BASE for their teachers of grades K-7. This workshop will run from July 20-22, 2005 and follow-ups in the fall of 2005 and spring of 2006.

New initiatives begun during 2004-2005:

HOME PLaTe school based workshops were conducted with Homer Center, Purchase Line, and Penns Manor School Districts' teachers of Mathematics, grades K-12. In addition, several workshops were done with students in grades K-12 in the Homer Center and Purchase Line School districts. HOME BASE (a workshop for K-12 teachers in the Armstrong School District) was developed. A second HOME PLaTe site was established at EUP for K-12 teachers. Three schools (Emerson Gridley Elementary School, Wilson Middle School, and Strong Vincent Junior-Senior High School) were targeted in the Erie School District for extensive integration of HOME PLaTe activities and philosophy.

Changes in ongoing community relationships:

A third site in the Eastern part of Pennsylvania will be established to continue to address the HOME PLaTe activities and philosophy for teachers of Mathematics, K-12, from schools in Eastern Pennsylvania who have high poverty levels and difficulties meeting the Annual Year Progress for Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) scores in Mathematics. This site will be in addition to the current two sites at IUP and EUP.

Sixty-two children were seen by Child Study Center clinicians this year at the Child Study Center. The CSC/School Partnership program served Pittsburgh, Purchase Line, United, and Leechburg school districts. Pittsburgh was added to the program this year. Eighteen school children were served in this program by Child Study Center student clinicians at no cost to the schools. The Child Study Center director was consultant to 8 rural school districts under the Project REAL contract and did 12 presentations across the state. The total amount taken in by the Child Study Center related to grants and contracts was \$1620 during this year. The fee for service amount taken in was \$1725. Twenty-seven children were served without paying a fee.

Historically the number of minorities and women employed by the trade unions in Philadelphia has been at best miniscule. In order for a person to be accepted into the apprenticeship programs of the trade unions they are required to pass a rigorous entrance examination. Many minority applicants were being denied entrance into the unions with the stated reason that they did not pass the qualifying examination.

Participants (150) in the DAP program at Cheyney University receive a minimum of 160 hours of instruction in mathematics, English, and reading comprehension skills development. Each applicant receives an assessment to determine the current academic performance level. Pre and post examinations are given to assess each student's progress. Additionally, a mid-term exam is administered to determine the need for any change to the student's instructional plan.

- B. Edinboro University provided a series of labor education workshops at the Porreco Center during the 2004-05 year including the following:

- Understanding the Hatch Act
- Advanced Workers Compensation
- Collective Bargaining
- Understanding Prevailing Wage
- Stewards Training and Boardmanship.

Edinboro workshop classes achieved a milestone with the Stewards Training class this spring enrolling 51 students for the 4-session workshop – the largest single class ever taught at their facility.

- C. Kutztown University of Pennsylvania is providing the leadership to the AFL-CIO labor councils from Berks County and Lehigh/Northampton to develop a *Young Worker Coalition*. We have been meeting since November to create a multi-county strategy to form a coalition that would identify work-related issues critical to young workers; develop and implement strategies identifying people and organizations who could act as resources to these workers, and develop a process that encourages these young workers to provide the leadership and direction of the coalition. A 2006 Young Workers' Conference is the goal.

With the grant allocation, PLEC set aside funds to enable organizations to apply for a labor education RFP to either expand an existing program or help start a special project on various topics including the health care crisis, social security, legal rights of workers, globalization and labor, privatization, worker health and safety, labor in the schools, labor history, labor and the environment, women and minority participation in unions. The following is a list of funded projects along with the amount awarded and a brief description:

- D. SweatFree Baseball – Pittsburgh Anti-Sweatshop Community Alliance, \$2,000. This project was to raise awareness to the Pittsburgh community on issues surround sweatshop based merchandise.

- E. Labor History Project – Erie Central Labor Council, \$10,000. This project entitled Worker's Rights, Human Rights was used to expand the awareness and the preparedness of teachers on the historical and current connections of workers' rights on the job and in the community with basic human rights. The Labor Council also created resources and lesson plans in labor studies for educators at grade 11 and 12 as well as for adult learners.
- F. Access to Healthcare – Mon Valley Unemployed Committee, \$10,000. This program educated low income and dislocated workers who face the loss of existing company-paid health insurance, or have none, on various resources available to them to secure health care while unemployed.
- G. Teachers and Educators Institute on Labor Education and Archival Resources – IUP, \$7,500. Funding for this project was used to develop and sponsor a five-day seminar at IUP focusing on the study of labor and working class issues. There were four modules where students learned classroom training, archival research, fieldwork, and processing of information. The topics included labor studies, health & safety issues in the workplace, archival research and its application to the curriculum, and oral history field work and methodology.
- H. Social Security Education Program – Pennsylvania Alliance for Retired Americans, \$5,000. The program was used to educate Pennsylvanians on the risks associated with the federal administrations plans to partially privatize Social Security.
- I. Worker Roundtables on Health Care Access – Pennsylvanians United for Reform in Health Care, \$4,300. This project raised awareness of the health care crisis by presenting causes and proposing a comprehensive policy solution for debate and action. Town Hall meetings were used to reach out to different constituencies soliciting broad views on policy solutions.
- J. Nate Smith Documentary – Renaissance III 2000 Inc., \$5,000. Funding for this project was used to perform research, plan, and produce a sample reel for a documentary highlighting labor activist Nate Smith, Sr., whose personal struggle reflected the larger fight by minority workers to integrate the construction unions during the 1960s and 70s.
- K. The Ed O'Brien Collection – USWA and Bethlehem Steel Corporation Labor Negotiations History Program – Steelworkers' Archives, Inc., \$4,000. The Steelworkers' Archives inventoried and recorded onto a DVD, archival CD and Archival paper labor memorabilia donated to Steelworkers' Archives by Ed O'Brien, president of the Bethlehem local office of the USWA.
- L. Building the Bridge Online Learning Program – United Community Services for Working Families, \$2,935. Through this program pre-apprentice students, mostly Hispanic, were educated via on-line training to help them to increase their math and learning skills.

- M. *Westmoreland Worker* publication – Westmoreland Central Labor Council, \$5,000. This project utilized the funding to print and distribute a union newspaper to educate workers on labor issues, educate the community on the role labor plays within the community, and motivate workers and the community to take action on issues affecting the region in which they live and work
- N. Labor in the Hood and Community Forum – Philadelphia Central Labor Council, \$6,000. The Philadelphia Labor Council utilized the funding to develop an informational brochure to share labor story throughout the public school population in Philadelphia. The Council attended career days at Parkway High School, Beeber Middle School, A. Philip Randolph High School, Shoemaker Middle School and South Philadelphia High School. - After a Fall 2004 site visit by The Council on Academic Accreditation of the American Speech Language and Hearing Association, our professional training program was accredited through 2011.
