

## MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE

The December 8, 1981 meeting of the University Senate was called to order by Chairman Stan Tackett at 3:20 p.m. in Pratt Auditorium.

Dr. Worthen, IUP President, announced that he, Provost Norton, and David Johnson, a member of the IUP Board of Trustees, attended the meeting yesterday of the Senate Education Committee, at which the SSHE Bill (SB 506) was reported out of committee. They attempted to introduce amendments at the committee level which would strengthen the local control provided by the Bill and specify that funds being appropriated for the purpose of instruction (which amounts to approximately 46%) be allocated on the basis of enrollment by program by level. Although a funding amendment was approved, it was not nearly as strong as that proposed by IUP.

Dr. Worthen also announced on behalf of the IUP Foundation, that a very significant gift was made by two IUP alumni, Mr. and Mrs. William Leasure. They have deeded to the Foundation all of the gas rights under Mack Park. Engineers' reports indicate that there is about 1.7 million mcf of natural gas there. This is a very significant gift and one which the Foundation will use as a model to encourage others. Details as to how to get the gas produced, who to sell it to, how to manage the cash resources, etc., must be worked out. There is the possibility that an endowment will be built, from which the earnings and interest would be given to the University to strengthen its academic program.

Chairman Tackett made the following announcements:

1. Spanish 502, which was approved at the November Senate meeting as a dual level course, will not be submitted to the Board of Trustees as part of Committee B2 actions because its undergraduate counterpart has not been submitted to Committee B2.
2. Senate Committees have been working diligently this year, but attendance at Senate meetings is "sour". His concern is that the constituents of the Senators who do not attend are not being represented. He has asked Committee A to look into attendance records for the first four meetings of the year and to take action according to Senate By-laws.
3. On a motion by Senator Chamberlin, seconded by Senator Simkins, the Senate approved the following recommendations of the Senate Chairman concerning the four faculty awards to be presented at Commencement:
  - a. That the Research and Creative Arts award recipients be selected by Committee E-1.



- b. That the Outstanding Teacher and Community Service award recipients be selected by Committee B-1. Two ad hoc members will be added to Committee B-1 to make it representative by School. The School representatives proposed are:

Because the recommendations of these committees must be given to the Commencement Committee by April 1, 1982, Senator Duntley moved that the Senate empower the B-1 Committee/Subcommittee on Faculty Awards to establish appropriate guidelines and timelines for the processing of the 1982 awards on an ad hoc basis, with the understanding that the long-term guidelines will be developed during the spring semester for subsequent years. This motion was seconded by Senator Chamberlin and passed by the Senate.

On a motion by Senator Gaylor, seconded by Senator Worthen, the minutes of the November meeting stand approved as published.

Committee A, Rules, made the following announcements:

1. Next Senate meeting: February 9, 1982 (agenda items due: Dec. 15, 1981)
2. Committee A meetings are held the first Tuesday following each Senate meeting in Room 210, Stabley Library, at 3:15 p.m. (No meeting December 15 because of finals.)

The above members of Subcommittee E-1 will serve the rest of this year and next year. In the Spring of 1983 the members of Subcommittee E-1 will be elected according to the current By-laws during the scheduled Senate elections.

The following recommendations of Committee B2, Curriculum, chaired by Senator K. Jones, were approved:

1. New courses:

- a. EX 410 - Senior Seminar in Special Education - 3 s.h.  
Gives students who have demonstrated outstanding potential for contributing to the field, opportunities to explore specific areas in greater depth than in required courses. Enrollment is by invitation of the departmental faculty only.
- b. SA 441 - Accident Investigation - 3 s.h.  
Focuses on the various aspects of accident investigation such as recent theories associated with accident causes, investigative techniques, data acquisition, structure of investigative reports, management responsibilities and remedial actions. Particular emphasis is placed on determining sequence of events to develop management actions which will prevent recurrence of accidents. Prerequisite: SA 101 and Junior Standing.
- c. ED 242 - Prestudent Teaching Clinical Experience I - 1 s.h.  
Observation/participation in a basic education classroom beginning not later than the sophomore year.
- d. ED 342- Prestudent Teaching Clinical Experience II - 1 sh.  
Students work toward the development of specific competencies that relate to individual major fields of teaching. Prerequisite: ED 242.

2. Program Modifications for the B.A. and B.S.Ed. in Chemistry:

- a. Change MA 123, 124 to MA 121, 122
- b. Change PY 131, 132 to PY 111, 112 (lecture and lab)

3. General Education Substitutions:

- a. PH 210 - World Scriptures for PH 110, World Religions
- b. PH 330 - Philosophy of Science for PH 221, Symbolic Logic I

4. New Program - B.S. in Physical Education and Sport

5. New courses in Health & Physical Education - to be included in the B.S. in Physical Education and Sport Program:
  - a. HP 230 - Aerobic Fitness - 2 s.h.  
Course offers students an opportunity to participate in a variety of aerobics activities; will aid fitness leaders in developing and implementing several types of aerobics programs; and will offer current information on aerobics as preventive medicine. (Two 1 1/2 hour sessions per week)
  - b. HP 399 - Internship - 3-12 s.h.  
Educational opportunity which integrates classroom experience with practical experience in community-service agencies, industrial, business, or governmental organizations. Prerequisite: Junior Standing.
  - c. HP 410 - Exercise Prescription - 3 s.h.  
Prerequisite: HP 343 - Physiology of Exercise. Course is designed to teach individuals to write exercise prescriptions based upon a subject's tolerance for physical activity. Special emphasis will be given to risk factors, techniques of evaluation, drugs, injuries, environmental factors, motivation and their role in physical activity assessment.
  - d. HP 412 - Physical Activity and Stress Management - 3 s.h.  
Acquisition of necessary understandings of anxiety and stress to understand the nature, the place they hold in our society, and the intervention strategies as they relate to physical activity.
  - e. HP 413 - Physical Activity and Aging - 3 s.h.  
Prerequisite: None. The goals of the course are to present the major aspects of physical activity, its importance to the older adult and the organization of an activity program. Specific attention will be given to the physiology of physical activity, effects of activity on growth and aging, exercise prescription, flexibility, overweight and obesity, and motivational strategies.
6. Four courses to be included in the General Education Program:
  - a. HP 125 - Basic Tap and Ballroom Dance - 1 s.h.  
The first half of the course will be the techniques and background of the traditional and modern ballroom dances of the western culture. The second half of the course will develop basic tap techniques.
  - b. HP 133 - Racquetball - 1 s.h.  
Includes the techniques, rules, equipment and conditioning to play racquetball. Two meetings per week (labs).
  - c. HP 161 - Basic Rock Climbing - 1 s.h.  
Basic principles of rock craft (Fee)
  - d. HP 163 - Backpacking - 1 s.h.  
The knowledge and skills necessary for basic backpacking (Fee)  
Three 5-hour sessions plus one weekend trip.
7. Changes in the Dietetic Program
  - a. Change FN 355 - Nutrition in Disease TO FN 355 - Nutrition in Disease I
  - b. Change FN 455 - Advanced Nutrition in Disease to FN 455 - Nutrition and Disease II (latter formerly elective; make required)
  - c. Drop the following as required courses:
    - BE 111 - Business Math
    - EP 302 - Educational Psychology
    - AG 201 - Principles of Accounting I
    - CO 200 - Introduction to Computers (required if MA 217 not taken)
  - d. Change FN 458 - Advanced Human Nutrition from an elective to a required course.

8. Approval of an experimental course with the provision that it will be reviewed by the appropriate Library Committee and submitted to Committee B-2 and then to the Senate for review and action:

LI 151 - Introduction to Library Resources - 1 s.h.

A lecture/laboratory course which provides an introduction to the resources of a university library, how those resources are organized, and how to effectively use those resources (one hour per week).

The Curriculum Committee submitted the following for information:

Committee F2, Athletics, chaired by Senator Newkerk, submitted the following for Senate information:

The Committee on Athletic Affairs concurs with the President's recommendation to appoint a committee to study "Funding of Intercollegiate Athletics at IUP". The Athletic Policy Committee recommended to the President that he appoint the following persons to the committee: Nancy Newkerk, Chairperson of Committee F-2; Robert Stonebraker, Student Co-op Finance Committee, and also a student from the Co-op Finance Committee; Larry Judge, Sports Information Director; Robert Gaylor, Special Assistant to the President; Dale Landon, Faculty Representative; Chris Knowlton, Student Cooperative Association; John Welty, Vice President of Student Affairs; Norman Norton, Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs; Ron Thomas, External Relations Director; Paul McGregor, Alumni Representative; Alice Dickie, Director of Equal Opportunity in Sport; Mark Haak, Student member of Committee F-2; an SGA representative; and Herman Sledzik, Ruth Podbielski and Jim Mill, Athletic Administrators. The Committee also recommended that the President designate a chairman for this Committee. (The committee has been appointed and will hold its first meeting later this week.)

On the recommendation of Committee F2, the following guidelines for the use of Zink Hall facilities were approved:

Zink Hall facilities may be used:

- 1) for authorized university scheduled activities
- 2) by IUP students, faculty and adult I-card holders
- 3) by I-card holders under sixteen years of age who are accompanied by a parent or guardian.

All other unauthorized persons will be considered as trespassers.

RATIONALE: There are too many young people coming into the gymnasium which creates a safety hazard and the equipment is being damaged. These persons have been jumping off the balcony onto the gymnastic mats. This is obviously a dangerous practice, in addition to the gymnastic mats being damaged. The seams are splitting on the mats and we do not have \$7,000 to replace the mats. This policy is in accordance with the IUP Athletic Facilities Policy which was approved by the University Senate on December 12, 1978. Item 7 reads: "The Departments of Health and Physical Education and the Athletic

Department have the authority to further restrict the usage of any facility when necessary to provide for the safety of individuals or the security of equipment". Item 8 reads: "Signs will be posted at each facility describing the approved policy and indicating that violators will be asked to leave the facility."

On a motion by Senator Worthen, seconded by Senator Ali, the following recommendation of Committee B1, Academic Affairs, was returned to the committee for further discussion and resolution of the questions raised during the Senate discussion. Committee B1 has recommended approval of the following: "It is an option for any department to specify courses which cannot be taken after successfully completing a higher level course in a sequence of courses."

Committee B2, Academic Affairs, submitted the following for Senate information:

- a. A department may specify prerequisites for a course and may also specify course(s) which cannot precede a given course. For example: MA 110 cannot follow MA 121.
- b. Committee B-1 has fulfilled its obligation regarding nominations for Honorary Degrees to be awarded in May 1982, and has transmitted its recommendations in the required manner to the Office of the President. Senators are reminded that this matter does not come before the Senate for action.

The Graduate Committee's recommendation for approval of the following new courses was approved:

PH 560 - Philosophy of Language - dual level - 3 cr.  
EC 522 - Microeconomic Analysis - dual level - 3 cr.  
EC 521 - Macroeconomic Analysis - dual level - 3 cr.

The Graduate Committee submitted the following informational items:

- a. Add EM 699 - Independent Study - 3 cr.  
EP 699 - Independent Study - 3 cr.  
CM 581 --Special Topics - 3 cr.  
Non-thesis Option - M.A. Labor Relations Program
- b. DROP: AG 521 - Principles of Tax Accounting
- c. Change AC 520 - Introduction to Adult Community Education - 3 cr.  
TO AC 620 - Introduction to Adult Community Education

Senator Norton suggested that a different method of taking attendance at Senate meetings be tried. He suggested that Senators initial a roster before entering the meeting, rather than passing the roster while the meeting is in progress. Committee A indicated that it will work on this for the February 1982 meeting.

As all business had been conducted, the meeting was adjourned at 4:15 p.m.
