The November 12, 1991 minutes were amended as follows:

- 1. Senator Brigaman's name was deleted from the list of absent Senators.
- 2. Item 1 of the Senate actions taken on the program revision proposal for the Bachelor of Science degree program in Office Systems was corrected to read as follows:
 - 1. The credit hour requirement under the Liberal Studies section of the proposal was changed from 53-56 to 55-58 credit hours, and the total number of Free Electives was changed from 8-11 hours to 5-9 hours. In addition, AD 235 Introduction to Business Law was changed to BL 235 Introduction to Business Law.

The motion was then APPROVED as amended.

3. The Committee's proposal to amend IUP's Alcohol Policy (refer to Attachment A of the December 10 Agenda) was amended by deleting the word "Greek" from item C. The policy was APPROVED as amended.
