ACADEMIC COMMITTEE -- CHAIRPERSON DUNTLEY

Chairperson Duntley presented the following for <u>Senate information</u>:

At the January 20, 1998, meeting of the Academic Committee there was a review of the proposed ED389, focusing specifically on the academic policy issue of P/F grading. Understanding the nature of the course as an option when intervention is needed during the student teaching experience, it was deemed not only appropriate to use pass/fail, but desirable to keep this from impacting the student's average. By a vote of 8-0-2 the committee approved the motion to allow the course to be taught using the P/F option. The committee also agreed to bring this forward for Senate information at the time Curriculum Committee was bringing forward the course.

B. New Course Proposal

MU 240 Technology in the Music Classroom 2c-11-2sh

Perquisite: Sophomore Standing, CO/BE/IM 101

Introduces the student to the technology resources available for use in the music classroom and with instructional technologies appropriate to their application in K-12 settings. Students will be exposed to a variety of media and will have the opportunity to gain familiarity in their use. Emphasis will be placed on the use of the computer in the classroom, Computer Based Instruction, and Musical Instrument Digital Interface (MIDI).

GRADUATE COMMITTEE--CHAIRPERSON WILLIAMSON

Chairperson Williamson presented the following for Senate information:

1. Revision to the Policy on Variability in Delivery of Graduate Programs

Rationale: Revised to be consistent with the Approval Process for Courses Using a Distance Education Mode of Delivery. (Changes are in bolded and italicized.)

Policy On Variability In Delivery Of Graduate Programs

The Graduate Committee encourages and supports innovation in the delivery of graduate programs. A wealth of scholarship and practice exists at IUP in the area of graduate program delivery methods, including distance education, off-campus education, external degree programs, extension programs, non-traditional programs, and programs serving special graduate populations. The purpose of this policy on variability in delivery is to assure that proposed new methods of delivery are consistent both in quality and content with their original programs.

All programs that involve any modification in the delivery of any course or component or their program must inform the Graduate Committee of their intention(s). When a department plans to modify the delivery

- of 33.33 percent or more of the required courses in an approved program, the following procedure must be followed.
- A. Method of Delivery
- 1. Submit a proposal to the Graduate Committee detailing the plans to modify the mode of delivery of an existing program in terms of:
 - a. Faculty
- Identify how faculty will be selected and appointed in a manner that assures maintenance of academic quality of the program and its goals and objectives, including the proportion of tenure-track faculty involved in the delivery.
 - b. Facilities/Location

Describe the location and nature of facility requirements and availability.

- c. Learning Resources/Equipment
- List any needed additional resources or equipment (books, films, periodicals, computer equipment), stating the manner in which these needs will be addressed or met.
 - d. Course Schedule

When classes meet (weekends, intensive workshop, self-paced) and for how long (4 hrs. per day for six weeks, 8 hrs. per weekend for a semester, etc.).

- B. Impact of Program
- Provide information relative to the intellectual values and community enhancement of the program in each of the following areas:
 - 1. Student demand
 - 2. Market environment
 - 3. Impact on existing program
- C. Compliance Requirements

The proposal should comply with all the relevant guidelines enumerated in the Collective Bargaining Agreement, Meet and Discuss agreements, the SSHE and IUP mission statements, and the Graduate Curriculum Handbook.

The Senate $\underline{\textbf{APPROVED}}$ the following new course:

2. New Course:

HP 620 Exercise Prescription for Chronic Diseases

3c-01-3sh

This course will examine the medical and therapeutic considerations for exercise prescriptions as defined by the American College of Sports Medicine, for individuals with chronic medical disorders. Competencies needed to function as clinical exercise specialist will be emphasized. Prerequisites: Permission.

The Senate **APPROVED** the following new cross-listed course:

3. New Cross-Listed Course:

BE/CM 614 Instructional Computing Basics

and

BE/CM 631 Interactive Multimedia

Rationale:

On November 7, 1995 the University Senate approved two new courses, CM 614, Instructional Computing Basics and CM 631, Interactive Multimedia. These courses were approved to be cross-listed with the Department of Business Education because of subject overlap. The mechanics of listing this as a cross-listed course were never implemented.

The Senate $\underline{\textbf{APPROVED}}$ following Minor Program Revision:

4. Minor Program Revision in the Administration and Leadership Study, Human Services Track (Ph.D.)

This revision involves some minor curriculum changes and two new course proposals.

Rationale:

- (1) <u>Changes in the core.</u> The original core included SO 610, SO 611, and SO 701, along with the three required Leadership courses. This core better meets the needs of students in the Administration and Leadership Studies program (Human Services track). The proposed core therefore includes the following courses: HS 701, HS 702, HS 703, SO 610, SO 611, SO 701.
- (2) <u>Changes in the required block.</u> Some of the courses included in this block either no longer exist or are not essential to the program. Additionally, to permit greater flexibility for students (those expressing interest in the program have indicated a diversity of interests), the required block would be reduced from 12 to 9 credits; this reduction would allow students to take an additional elective.
- (3) <u>Changes in electives.</u> The revised program includes an updated course list and retains the flexibility of the original program in allowing substitutions. Students will take three, rather than two, electives.
- (4) Changes in the research component. Students in human service administration need solid grounding in statistical methods in order to succeed in research and dissertation preparation. Because entering students will have varying levels of competence in this area, they are being required to take a statistics course at a level appropriate to their background. The methods courses in the original program are more appropriate for D.Ed. students than for Ph.D. students in human services. The proposed program therefore includes a new course, SO 764, Seminar in Applied Human Services Research, to meet the needs of human service administrators in areas such as program evaluation and needs assessment.
- (5) Change in the internship/field experience component. This course is being changed from Internship in Administration & Leadership Studies to Field Experience in Administration and Leadership Studies. A traditional internship is not appropriate for students at the doctoral level who have, in most cases, already had extensive experience in human service or administrative settings. The proposed course is designed to provide students with the opportunity to apply the knowledge they have gained from the program to the solution of practical problems in actual administrative situations.

SO 764 - Seminar in Applied Human Services Research 01-3c-3sh
This course will emphasize the analytical tools and methodologies relevant to students in human services administration and is intended to serve as the foundation for the completion of the students field experience and dissertation research requirements. Projects will be assigned to facilitate an in-depth understanding and working knowledge of social science research processes, methodologies, and analytical tools, with emphasis on those especially applicable to program evaluation and needs assessment. In addition, by the end of the course, each student should have identified a dissertation topic and developed a preliminary dissertation research design. Prerequisites: SO 664 and GR 681: Statistics for Human Services.

HS 798 Field Experience in Administration and Leadership Studies 01-6c-6sh This course is designed to provide the student with an opportunity to solve a practical problem associated with the leadership and administration of an organization. During the third summer of the doctoral program, each student will be required to undertake a policy/problem analysis process that integrates prior substantive and analytically oriented course work. Each student will present and discuss his/her work before a faculty review committee. Students with full-time employment responsibilities will be permitted to focus on a problem related to their own organization, if it is compatible with the students' area of concentration or interest. Alternatively, if the student wants to explore another area or organization, he/she may do so. This course may only be taken after a minimum of 36 hours of course work for the Administration and Leadership Studies program (Human Services Track) is completed.

The Senate **APPROVED** the following Minor Program Revision:

MINOR PROGRAM REVISION:

Geography---M.A.

Rationale: The proposed changes to the M.A. in Geography seek to strengthen the program through the addition of the portfolio requirement for non-thesis students and the expectation of cartographic proficiency in a student's portfolio or thesis. The total number of credits for the degree is being increased by three to keep it consistent with the M.S. and to strengthen enrollment in 600 level classes.

List of proposed changes to the M.A.

- 1) Increasing the total number of credits by 3 so thesis option is 33 and non-thesis is 39 credits.
- 2) Adding a portfolio requirement for the non-thesis option.

APPENDIX A

Approval Process for Courses Using a Distance Education Mode of Delivery

Distance education is defined in the CBA under Article 42 Section A 1. Given the recent development of these technologies and the likelihood of the availability of new technologies, it is necessary to define an efficient and effective approval process that will uphold the standards listed in the CBA.

The amount of distance education technology used for instruction varies from course to course. One faculty member, for example, might post supplemental material on the Internet or cite resources that are available to the students at their option, while another might use the Internet to interact with students instead of meeting with them in the classroom for one or two sessions. In view of the various degrees of use of alternative teaching methods, the committee has determined that when more than one-third of classroom hours are conducted via distance education technologies, the course must be approved as a distance education course, even though it is an established IUP course. If distance education technologies are used for less than one-third of classroom hours, a report to the department chair and the dean is sufficient. Furthermore, when more than one-third of the required courses in a graduate degree or certificate program are designated "distance education" courses, as defined above, a program revision proposal must be approved through the graduate peer review process.

Process

- 1.A faculty member prepares a proposal to change an <u>existing course</u> to one that uses distance education technologies for more than one-third of teaching contact hours. The Instructional Design Center shall be informed if support services will be needed from the Center. Also, monetary and/or staff support needed by the faculty member shall be included in the proposal, which is to be approved by the department chair and the dean.
- 2.As the adaptation of the course nears completion, the faculty member presents the syllabus, examples of uses of distance education technologies, etc. to his/her academic department for approval. The department shall conduct a complete review, using as a guide for its approval, the criteria listed under Article 42 Section B 2.
 - a) a qualified instructor;
 - b) use of suitable technology as a substitute for the traditional classroom;
- c) suitable opportunity for interaction between instructor and student;
 - d) suitable evaluation of student achievement by the instructor; and integrity of the evaluation methods used.
- If approved by the department, the course may be listed on the schedule as a distance education course. Notification shall be reported to local Meet and Discuss, the Instructional Design Center, and for graduate courses, to the Graduate Committee through the Dean of the Graduate School and Research as an information item.
- 3. Section F of the CBA requires the faculty member to submit, each semester, a written evaluation of his/her experiences in the distance education course, which includes suggestions for improvement. This evaluation shall be shared with the chairperson, department, and appropriate dean/ management supervisor and shall serve as a basis for moderate revisions.

New course

A new course proposal shall include steps 1 and 2 of the above process <u>before</u> the proposal is submitted to the college curriculum committee. If desired, the proposed course could be offered as a special topics course after step 2 has been completed while the full proposal process is underway.
