President's Report

President Driscoll was unable to attend the meeting. Provost Moerland read some remarks provided to him from Dr. Driscoll.

- President Driscoll gave his apologies for not being able to attend the meeting. He was attending a meeting on retention in Harrisburg, PA.
- The new chancellor, Dr. Daniel Greenstein will be at IUP on October 26.
- President Driscoll thanked everyone who attended and participated in the September 11, 2001 ceremony.
- President Driscoll apologized for not being able to attend the *Words: Use Responsibly* 6 O'Clock series event that took place on September 10, 2018.
- President Driscoll thanked everyone for their good hard work and positive attitude to start the new year.

Provost's Report

Good afternoon.

There are few things I would like to highlight today.

1. If you recall, the Middle States Commission on Higher Education had required a report from IUP that was due April 1, 2018. IUP received a letter on June 22, 2018 with the following few words: Action taken was to "accept the monitoring report. The next evaluation is scheduled for 2024-2025." With those few words, the work of countless individuals is recognized. Thank you to all for your hard work.

- As you are aware there are three searches for Dean's underway for the dean of the Library, College of Fine Arts, and the College of Health and Human Services. The search committees have been established, and applications are currently being accepted. Each search has a slightly staggered time line, with the first search for the Library position, followed by Health and Human Services, and Fine Arts. A consultant has been engaged for all three searches.
- 3. An update on the University College. As you may have noticed, there has been excavation work between the Humanities and Social Sciences building and Stabely Library. The work is ongoing and the University College space will be open for business before the Spring 2019 Semester. Phase one began this year with just under 200 students. In the second phase next fall, we anticipate about 800 students. These were the currently classified "undeclared" students. The new designation for this group is "exploratory" and they will call the University College home.
- 4. There has been some departmental movement over the summer with the departments of Mathematics and Computer Science merging to form the department of Mathematical and Computer Sciences. As you were aware from the Spring, the department of Adult and Community Education has joined the Professional Studies in Education department.
- 5. Finally, I want to welcome some new faces. Dr. Janet Guyden has joined IUP to serve as the interim Dean of Libraries. We welcome Dr. Charles Fey as interim Vice President for Student Affairs, and regretfully say goodbye to Dr. Rhonda Luckey as she begins her retirement. Today is her final Senate meeting. I also want to give my sincere thank you to Dr. Veronica Watson for her incredible leadership of the Frederick Douglass Institute at IUP and welcome the new FDI's new co-directors, Dr. Sibyl West and Dr. Malaika Turner.

Current Catalog Description (2017-2018):

Certificate in Popular Music Studies

Introduces basic skills in the performance, recording, and marketing of popular music. This 19-credit certificate requires students to take 13 credits of core courses and an additional 6 credits of electives. Completion of the certificate will add popular music competencies for students in communications media, music, and other areas. Audition required.

Proposed Catalog Description:

Certificate in Popular Music Studies

The Certificate in Popular Music Studies introduces students to fundamental concepts associated with the creation and reception of popular music. It is a credential that enables students to demonstrate basic competency with the performance, production, or analysis of popular music, and may be particularly appealing to those studying music, communications media, entrepreneurship, or marketing.

The certificate program is administered jointly by the Department of Music and Department of Communications Media. It requires 10 credits of core courses and an additional 9 credits of electives. While basic performance or songwriting ability is recommended, no audition is required for admission to the program.

Rationale: The revised catalog description for the Popular Music Certificate was accidently left out of the May 1, 2018 Senate Agenda when the program was revised.

Current Catalog Description:

The Vocational-Technical Professional Studies program offers undergraduate curricula that prepare inservice teachers for vocational-technical education. Programs may lead to either a bachelor of science in education degree with certification or to professional certification only. Program graduates have a broad range of employment opportunities as teachers/trainers in secondary schools, vocational-technical schools, postsecondary schools, and business and industry.

Certification to teach vocational-technical education in the commonwealth's secondary schools is issued to individuals who meet statutory requirements, demonstrate occupational/technical proficiency on a nationally standardized occupational competency examination, and complete 78 credits of the Pennsylvania Department of Education's approved university program.

Certification to serve as a cooperative education teacher-coordinator in the commonwealth's secondary schools can be earned by completing a program of studies tailored to each student's individual background and professional needs. The program prepares individuals for managing industrial cooperative training and school-to-work transitional experiences. For people holding a valid Pennsylvania Instructional Certificate, the program of studies will be individualized based on educational credits earned.

Each program requires completion of the following credits: bachelor of science in education (120cr), cooperative education teacher/coordinator certificate (15cr), and vocational-technical education certificate (78cr).

Proposed Catalog Description:

The Vocational-Technical Professional Studies program offers undergraduate curricula that prepare inservice teachers for vocational-technical education. Programs may lead to either a bachelor of science in education degree with certification or to professional certification only. Program graduates have a broad range of employment opportunities as teachers/trainers in secondary schools, vocational-technical schools, postsecondary schools, and business and industry.

Certification to teach vocational-technical education in the commonwealth's secondary schools is issued to individuals who meet statutory requirements, demonstrate occupational/technical proficiency on a nationally standardized occupational competency examination (which includes documenting 4 years of wage earning experience), and complete 60 credits of the Pennsylvania Department of Education's approved university program.

Certification to serve as a cooperative education teacher-coordinator in the commonwealth's secondary schools can be earned by completing a program of studies tailored to each student's individual background and professional needs. The program prepares individuals for managing industrial cooperative training and school-to-work transitional experiences. For people holding a valid Pennsylvania Instructional Certificate, the program of studies will be individualized based on educational credits earned.

Each program requires completion of the following credits: bachelor of science in education (120cr), cooperative education teacher/coordinator certificate (15cr), and vocational-technical education certificate (60cr).

Rationale: Governor Wolf signed Act 39 of the School Code into law on June 22, 2018 and the law went into effect on July 1, 2018. The law allows the 18 credits required to obtain a Vocational I Certificate to be counted toward the total credit hours required for a Vocational Instructional II Certificate and reduces the total number of credits required from 78 to 60.

University-Wide Graduate Committee (Senator Moore)

FOR ACTION:

1. Final Exam Policy

PURPOSE: An Undergraduate Final Examination Policy exists and is clearly presented in the Undergraduate Catalog; however, there is currently no formal policy at the graduate level for final examinations. It has come to our attention that there is a need for a written official policy to establish guidelines for final exams. This policy applies to all graduate students and graduate courses.

<u>FINAL EXAM POLICY</u>: The final examination week is part of the regular academic program and must be incorporated into each instructor's course plan for the semester. Final examinations are not the only legitimate type of terminating activity that conforms to course objectives.

The terminating activity shall take place only at the time and location assigned by the Office of the Registrar. Unless granted an excused absence, the faculty member responsible for the course must be present to direct the terminating activity. Faculty members may require student participation in the terminating activity.

Faculty members who do not schedule or do not attend the terminating activity for a course may be subject to disciplinary action commensurate with unexcused absences. Once the final examination has been set by the Office of the Registrar, changes and absences must be approved by the instructor's dean. Faculty members are only obligated to offer a makeup in cases where officially schedules exams are in conflict. Where such conflicts exist during the examination period, the following general rules apply:

- The higher-numbered course takes precedence.
- If courses in conflict are the same level and number, an alphabetical determination by full name of the department, not its acronym, will be made.

2. Graduate Academic Good Standing

PURPOSE: To revise the Academic Good Standing policy as it relates to students earning a 0.00 CGPA at the end of their first semester of enrollment.

<u>CURRENT ACADEMIC GOOD STANDING POLICY:</u> IUP master's students must maintain a minimum of 3.0 ("B") cumulative graduate quality point average to be in good standing academically. This policy remains the same for students pursuing a graduate degree at the doctoral level, except the required minimum grade point average is between 3.0 and 3.5, depending upon the program.

Students who fall below good standing are placed on probation for their next active semester or summer term, during which the cumulative average must be raised to 3.0. Students who fail to raise their cumulative averages to at least 3.0 during their probation period will be dropped from their degree program as well as from the School of Graduate Studies and Research and will not be permitted to register for further courses. A student must be in good standing to be admitted to degree candidacy and to graduate. This policy remains the same for students pursuing a graduate degree at the doctoral level, except the required minimum grade point average is between 3.0 and 3.5, depending upon the program.

Graduate students earning final grades of "F" and a 0.00 CGPA at the end of their first semester of enrollment will be dismissed from the University, except for graduate students enrolled in only one course (up to 4 credits), who may be placed on probation at the discretion of the SGSR Academic Standards officer.

3. Graduate Course Attendance Policy

APPROVED

PURPOSE: Undergraduate Course Attendance Policy exists and is clearly presented in the Undergraduate Catalog; however, there is currently no formal policy at the graduate level for course attendance. It has come to our attention that there is a need for written official policy to establish guidelines such as, what has been established university-wide in the Bereavement related Class Absences policy.

The Graduate Course Attendance Policy proposed by the School of Graduate Studies and Research mirrors that of the Undergraduate Course Attendance Policy. The policy provides guidelines that respect faculty driven attendance standards and consequences for not meeting those standards while recognizing that students may need to miss class for justified reasons. This policy applies to all graduate students and graduate courses.

<u>GRADUATE COURSE ATTENDANCE POLICY</u>: The university expects all students to attend class.

APPROVED

Individual faculty members may define attendance standards appropriate to each course and the consequences of not meeting those standards, within the following guidelines:

- Each policy must be distributed in writing during the first week of the course. Normally, it is expected that the information dealing with class attendance standards will be distributed with the course syllabus.
- Each policy must define some limited level of allowable absence.
- Each policy must recognize student's need to miss class because of illness, personal emergency, university-sponsored activities, bereavement or active military duty.
- Each policy must not penalize students who add the class during the regular or specified university drop-add period and must allow those students to make up work missed before adding the class.

EFFECTIVE: Immediately

Question: Senator Korns noted that the policy is to take effect immediately. He inquired if that meant syllabi for graduate courses need to be retroactively changed.

Senator Moore said that since the policy states "Each policy must be distributed in writing during the first week of the course" that he interprets it as taking effect next semester.

IUP Three Step Process for Educator Preparation

IUP 3-Step Process for Teacher Education

Step 1. Application for Teacher Education

Eligibility requirements for enrolling in the professional education sequence, which includes EDEX 300/301, EDUC 242, 342, 442, EDSP 477:

- A minimum of 48 earned credits and a 3.0 cumulative GPA
- Successful completion of the PAPA, Praxis Core, SAT scores/ACT scores, or equivalent with the minimum passing score established by the Pennsylvania Department of Education.
- Completion of the following courses as defined by the major with a grade of "C" or better: ACE 103*, ENGL 101, 121*, EDSP 102, 6 credits in MATH 101 or better* (*See major for specific program requirement)
- Act 24/Act 34/Act 151 clearances and Act 114 federal fingerprinting
- Completion of speech, hearing, and TB test
- Proof of liability insurance (annual update required)—PSEA membership or private insurance (must have a minimum of \$1,000,000 per claim/aggregate of \$3,000,000 per occurrence if obtained via private insurance)
- Satisfactorily completed essay
- Reviewed evidence of starting an electronic portfolio to include CD or LiveText and portfolio evaluation
- Advisor's recommendation and signature
- Completion of Act 126 training

IUP education majors are encouraged to take the PAPA as soon as they are prepared for the exams. Extensive review materials and specialized workshops are available. Students who are not successful after five attempts are required to meet with the dean's associate for Educator Preparation for a consultation.

Step 2. Application for Student Teaching

Eligibility requirements for student teaching placement:

- Successful completion of Step 1
- A 3.0 cumulative GPA
- Successful completion of Praxis II Examination or Pennsylvania Educator Certification Tests (PECT). Scores must meet PDE requirements at the time the candidate makes application for teacher certification.
- Act 24/Act 34/Act 151 (annual update required)
- Proof of liability insurance (annual update required)—PSEA membership or private insurance (must have a minimum of \$1,000,000 per claim and an aggregate of \$3,000,000 per occurrence if obtained via private insurance). Effective August 31, 2006.
- Completion of all major courses, methods courses, and Liberal Studies sciences courses with a grade of "C" or better
- Updated electronic portfolio review to include CD or LiveText and portfolio evaluation
- Advisor's recommendation and signature
- Current TB test
- Completion of Act 126 training

Step 3. Application for Graduation and Pennsylvania Teacher Certification

Eligibility requirements for graduation:

- Successful completion of Step 2
- Successful completion of student teaching with a grade of "C" or better
- A 3.0 cumulative GPA
- Final approval of electronic portfolio to include evaluation of teacher work sample

- Completed application for graduation
- Completed application for Pennsylvania Teacher Certification
- The recommendation of student's academic advisor
- The recommendation of the IUP Teacher Certification officer

REVISED POLICY:

IUP Three Step Process for Educator Preparation

Step 1 - Application for Teacher Education

Eligibility requirements for enrolling in the professional education sequence:

- A minimum of 48 earned credits and a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA
- Successful completion of the following (scores may be mixed and matched): The Pre-Professional Academic Performance Assessment (PAPA), Praxis Core, SAT, and/or ACT exams with the minimum passing scores established by the Pennsylvania Department of Education
- Completion of the following courses with a minimum grade of "C":
 - ENGL 101
 - ENGL 121 for all majors, except: ENGL 122 for ENGL and MUHI 102 for MUED
 - EDSP 102
 - ACE 103 (or major program requirement in lieu of ACE 103); includes satisfactory evaluation of Step 1 LiveText portfolio
 - 6 credits in mathematics (level 101 or higher)
- Act 34 Criminal Background Check (Must be renewed annually)
- Act 151 Child Abuse Clearances (Must be renewed annually)
- Act 24 (PDE-6004) Arrest or Conviction Report (Must be renewed annually)
- Act 114 FBI Fingerprinting (Continuing enrollment in IUP Teacher Preparation Program is required for fingerprinting results to remain valid; some districts/sites require an updated Act 114 within the year).
- Documented completion of Act 126 Training <u>www.reportabusepa.pitt.edu</u> (Must be retaken annually)
- TB Test (results must be current prior to entering schools / annually; some districts/sites require a two-step TB)
- Speech and hearing test (One time only)
- Proof of Liability Insurance (annual update required or join multiple years)

 PSEA student membership or private insurance (Must have a minimum of \$1,000,000.00 per claim and an aggregate of \$3,000,000.00 per occurrence if obtained via private insurance)
- Satisfactorily completed essay
- Advisor's recommendation and signature
- Documents (Clearances, TB results, and Liability Insurance) should be updated and uploaded into CastleBranch

Step 2 - Application for Student Teaching

Eligibility requirements for student teaching placement:

- Successful completion of Step 1
- Maintenance of a cumulative GPA of 3.0
- Current Act 34 Clearance (Must be renewed annually)
- Current Act 151 Clearance (Must be renewed annually)
- Current Act 114 Clearance (Must be renewed annually)
- Current Act 24 (PDE-6004) Arrest or Conviction Report (Must be renewed annually)
- Current documentation of completion of Act 126 Training <u>www.reportabusepa@pitt.edu</u> (Must be retaken annually)
- Current TB Test (results must be current prior to entering schools / annually; some districts/ sites require a two-step TB)
- Successful completion of <u>ALL</u> required PRAXIS II or PECT (Pennsylvania Educator Certification Tests) Exams (The PRAXIS and PECT cut-off scores for each test must be at or above the current PDE established passing scores at the time a candidate applies for Pennsylvania Teacher Certification)
- Proof of Liability Insurance (annual update required) PSEA membership or private insurance (Must have a minimum of \$1,000,000.00 per claim and an aggregate of \$3,000,000.00 per occurrence if obtained via private insurance)
- Completion of all major courses and methods courses with a minimum grade of C
- Completion of liberal studies science courses with a minimum grade of C
- Advisor's or Program Coordinator's recommendation and signature

Results of Step 2 approval: Ability to register for Student Teaching

Step 3 - Applications for Graduation and Pennsylvania Teacher Certification

Eligibility Requirements:

- Successful completion of Step 2
- Successful completion of Student Teaching with grade of C or better
- Maintenance of a cumulative GPA of 3.0
- **If needed verification of sliding scale Praxis 2 or PECT results based on final posted GPA
- Final *satisfactory* review of the LiveText Teacher Work Sample (submitted in LiveText)

- Completed application for graduation
- Completed application for Pennsylvania Teacher Certification
- Copy of TIMS coversheet from PDE website
- Copy of IUP Marketplace receipt for certification processing
- The recommendation of designated student teaching supervisor and program coordinator
- The recommendation of the IUP Teacher Certification Officer
