
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
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

PART II: Description of Curriculum Change

Bachelor of Fine Arts - Art Studio

1. Catalog Description of Revised Program

Proposed

Students pursuing studio or art education degrees are initially admitted into the department through the Entrance Portfolio Review. Art history majors are not required to submit a portfolio.

The bachelor of fine arts degree program in art studio prepares students for careers as professional visual artists, graphic designers, and creative practitioners and is a platform from which to go on to study for the master of arts and master of fine arts degrees. The bachelor of fine arts degree program offers two tracks: graphics design and art studio. Students pursuing the graphic design track will study a broad range of topics including web design, publication design, animation, interactive design and corporate identity. Faculty mentors assist graphic design track students with the development of a professional portfolio. Students pursuing the art studio track will elect a concentration in one of the department's studio areas including drawing, painting, ceramics, fibers, jewelry and metals, sculpture, and wood. The bachelor of fine arts degree enables students to pursue substantial instruction in their area of concentration. The BFA major must successfully complete the BFA Sophomore Review where studio faculty members assess student progress within the program. During the final semester of their studies, BFA students publicly present their art in a culminating bachelor of fine arts exhibition.

Inclusion of internship credits toward any portion of fulfillment of degree requirements must be approved by the departmental chair and student's major advisor. Approval must be obtained in writing before (3) enrollment. To enter the program, the art major must successfully complete the BFA Sophomore Review and have a minimum 2.5 GPA Student must achieve a cumulative 2.5 GPA and earn a "C" or better in all ART and ARHI courses to graduate. See advisory paragraph "Timely Completion of Degree Requirements" in the section on Requirements for Graduation.

b. Associated Course Changes

c. Rationale for Changes

- i. The most significant change in the proposed BFA degree is restructuring the existing three tracks, 2-Dimensional, 3-Dimensional, and Individualized, into two tracks, Art Studio and Graphic Design. The proposed Art Studio Track combines aspects of the existing 2-Dimensional and 3-Dimensional Tracks to better reflect the practice of students in selecting their studio emphasis. Under the existing program, students tend to select the Individualized Track as it provides the most flexibility in studio interest and exploration. We have found the 2-D and 3-D tracks to be limiting at the undergraduate level. By merging all three tracks into one track similar to the existing Individualized Track and renaming it Art Studio Track, students can better select a direction that reflects their personal interests and talents.
- Additionally, current graphic design majors find the Bachelor of Arts in ii. Studio (BA) Degree more suitable to their vocational interests. They rarely choose the BFA degree, although the BFA is considered the professional degree. Within the existing BA curricular structure, students can select all graphic design credits as part of their advanced studio requirements and free electives, and are not required to take studio courses outside their area. The BA is considered a liberal arts degree with the intention to provide breadth across the arts, however, not to serve as a professional degree. After studying the matter, the faculty realizes that the structure of the current BFA does not provide enough professional focus in the graphic designer's content area because it requires students to choose secondary "synthesis" studios. Given the broad scope of the graphic design field, undergraduates must be prepared with a wide array of technical and conceptual expertise. Thus, the revised BFA offers a separate track that should be more attractive to the graphic design major

- because it does not require synthesis studios and provides the opportunity for more content in their concentration. The revised BFA Graphic Design Track will provide a level of professional preparedness appropriate to a professional degree, which meets the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD) accreditation standards, calling for 65% of coursework in Art and Design.
- iii. The recent PA Board of Governor's mandate that limits major content and increases free electives has further initiated revisions to the BFA to better accommodate the needs of the graphic design major. The BFA will require appropriate focus in content for a professional degree, meeting the needs of those choosing a career in graphic design. We expect a significant shift in art students who desire a career in graphic design to choose the newly revised BFA rather than the BA degree.
- iv. The change in track structure and title does not require a change in courses or new courses. The revision simply repackages our current offerings to be more attractive to our art majors choosing a career as a professional artist/designer.
- v. Offering a separate track in Graphic Design is also advisable for recruitment purposes. At least half of interested studio majors who apply to our program desire a career in graphic design. Our existing tracks bury references to our graphic design program under titles that appear unrelated. It is essential that we give visibility to our vibrant graphic design program to attract more students to our department, and to IUP. Our strongest competitor for graphic designers is our sister institution, Edinboro University, which offers a separate degree for graphic designers. By creating a separate Graphic Design Track, IUP is highlighting one of the Art Department's most desirable programs and will enable us to compete more favorably with other institutions that offer a similar program.
- vi. Another significant program change will allow students to directly enter the BFA program as freshmen. Currently, studio majors enter through the BA and undergo a sophomore review in order to be accepted into the BFA program. This sequence is problematic for several reasons: First, in the BA program, students can quickly fill their free elective requirements by available in the BA program with unrelated courses then no longer selecting from a broad range of courses available in the BA program. As not all of those courses will satisfy that requirement in the BFA program, students may be reluctant to switch to the BFA program, even if that degree would better suit their career goals. The art faculty sees an advantage to begin advising BFA students as freshman to stay on track for its requirements. Due to the liberal nature of electives in the BA degree, it is easier for students to move from the BFA to the BA without losing credits, than to shift to the BFA from the BA. BFA majors will still be required to undergo a sophomore review as part of the revised program, but this review is intended to monitor progress and secure additional advisement where needed.

- vii. Free electives will increase to 4-5 credits from the current 1-2 credits. A certain number of free electives are important to provide students choice as well as a place for transfer credits, thus the maximum number of credits available are moved from controlled intermediate/advanced studio electives to free electives. NASAD requires at least 65% of all coursework to be in the content area for professional degrees. This balance allows 3 additional credits available for free electives.
- viii. BFA majors must successfully complete a review during their sophomore year. This review is intended to monitor progress and provide feedback from the studio faculty as a whole. Students who are not succeeding within the program will be advised to seek other degree options.
 - ix. Minor language changes and a simplified curricular table were designed to be more user-friendly in understanding degree requirements. The current BFA table is cumbersome for students to navigate, and difficult to understand.
 - x. For controlled Art History (ARHI) elective requirements, a listing of specific courses was revised to any 300-400 level ARHI course to accommodate future changes of available art history offerings. Additionally, the requirement that the upper level Art History elective must be writing intensive was eliminated as new studio courses, designated by the ART prefix, have been introduced. Studio majors now have additional departmental offerings in order to fulfill their liberal studies writing intensive requirement.

PART III: Implementation.

- Students may elect to stay in the BFA curriculum under the catalog term in which they entered the program, or choose to shift to the new curriculum. Since there are no new courses or deletion of courses in the revised program, students will not experience difficulty in completing the existing BFA curriculum.
- Faculty course schedule will not be affected by the revised program. Students will continue to enroll in the courses that are part of the faculty's regular load.
- 3. No other resources are necessary as the revision repackages existing courses.
- 4. We are hoping to see an increase in students enrolling in the BFA, which in turn will increase our class enrollments at the intermediate/advanced levels.. In the revised program, students will be required to take 36 credits in intermediate/advanced studios rather than 39 credits in the existing program. The reduction of 3 credits will be offset by students choosing the BFA rather than newly proposed BA degree where only 12 credits will be required under the BOG mandate.

PART IV. Periodic Assessment

1. The Art Department is accredited by National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD). A rigorous self-study is conducted by the department

and a periodic evaluation is performed, which includes a site visit by outside evaluators every five years. The comprehensive criteria for evaluation can be found in the NASAD Standards and Self-study Handbooks at http://nasad.arts-accredit.org/index.jsp?page=Standards-Handbook. Students have the opportunity during the accreditation team site visit to meet with the evaluators as an integral part of the evaluation process. Internally, student work will be reviewed during the sophomore review. The BFA faculty review committee will evaluate the student on the following criteria: design capabilities, faculty with media, conceptual capabilities, originality/creativity, and ability in written expression. A five point scale will be used. Student performance at this review will become the primary criteria for evaluating the overall effectiveness of the curriculum.

- 2. The BFA Thesis exhibition in Kipp Gallery is required by all BFA majors prior to graduation. This exhibition will highlight the final portfolio of each student, who must defend his or her work before the studio faculty. The faculty will be able to assess the success of the program based upon the quality of output seen in the student's exhibited work.
- 3. The BFA sophomore review will be conducted every year for each new cohort. The BFA Thesis Exhibition is presented every year in May. At the reviews faculty will be able to evaluate the success of the program based upon the quality of student performance. Based upon our findings, faculty will discuss the curriculum and revise any aspects of the program necessary for improvement. We are required to undergo a program evaluation with NASAD every five years.
- 4. Evaluating entities will be the Studio Division (all tenure, tenure-track studio art faculty) and NASAD.
