Course Syllabus: AR 114: Color and Two-Dimensional Design Submitted By: Anthony G. DeFurio

I. Catalog Description:

AR 114: Color and Two Dimensional Design

3 credits

6 contact hrs

Prerequisites: None

This course is focuses on the constituent properties of color and the manner in which two-dimensional design field can be organized. Specific attention is given to the complex interactions of color within two-dimensional design.

II. Course Objectives:

- To provide the student with a fundamental principles of design related to the organization of two-dimensional design fields.
- 2. To provide a foundation for the understanding of the constituents of color; hue, value, intensity, perceptual components of color, and applications of color within specified problems related to two-dimensional design.
- To demonstrate relationships of color and design that can be effectively carried over to other studios such as painting, drawing, printmaking, and fabrics.
- 4. To illustrate the manner in which color and two dimensional design are incorporated into graphic design and other functional forms of the visual arts.
- 5. To relate two-dimensional design and color to uses in three-dimensional art forms; namely, applied applications and planar embellishment in ceramics, jewelry, and relief forms of sculpture.
- III. Course Outline: The following identifies the minimum expected level of course content. Selection and assignment of specific problems in visual design within this course will be left to the discretion of each professor assigned to the course. This outline assumes a 13 to 14 week semester.
 - A. Organization Of Two-Dimensional Fields:
 - 1. Principles Of Design
 - 2. Problems In Composition
 - 3. Unity and Variety: Closure, Proximity, Similarity, Dominance, Subordination.
 - 4. Figure/Ground Relationships
 - 5. Balance/Rhythm
 - 6. Design Interrelationships



- B. Basic Color Theory
 - 1. Color Theories: Prang, Munsell, Ostwald systems.
 - 2. Value and Intensity Studies.
 - 3. Perceptual Components of Color: Simulataneous contrast.
 - 4. Color Temperature
 - 5. Color Modification
 - 6. Interrelationships of Color and Design
 - 7. Color in Applied Design
- C. Manipulation Of A Visual Design
 - 1. Grid Structures
 - 2. Line
 - 3. Dots
 - 4. Planar Shapes
 - 5. Depth and Illusion
 - 6. Kinetic Qualities Of Design
 - 7. Systems Of Proportion and Measurement
- IV. Evaluation Methods: A students formal evaluation and grade is based upon a summation of all individual design projects submitted through the semester, formative in-class work habits and craft, and participation in class critiques both written and oral. Each instructor will weight these components somewhat differently, but overall it is the quality and the substance of the visual product that ultimately determines an individual's grade.

- VI. Procedures: Since this course will be taught by a variety of instructors a variety of methodologies will be utilized. However, the Department of Art generally adheres to methods which encourage divergent thinking and creative problem solving. Following instruction and demonstration, students are given specific problems in design. The solutions to these problems in visual design can be presented in many ways. Students are encouraged to avoid trite and common ways of finding solutions to these problems in design. Students are expected to work both within class and out-of-class. Studio practice is rigorous and complemented by focused in-class critiques.

COURSE ANALYSIS QUESTIONNAIRE

Section A: Details Of The Course:

- A1. Presently students do not receive substantive instruction in color and two-dimensional design. Without instruction in the fundamentals of design and color the students are disadvantaged in other courses; namely, painting, drawing, printmaking, and later almost every advanced studio. Students do receive instruction in three-dimensional design. This course will add needed substance to the foundation block that all majors must fulfill.
- A2. This course does not require changes in any existing course.

 The content of this course is discretely different from any other foundation or advanced studio course.
- A3. This course follows the traditional types of offering by the department.
- A4. Not within the past 15 years. In the early seventies, when we switched over from 2 to 3 credit courses, a two-dimensional design course was dropped from our offerings.

A5. No.


- A6. Variable credit does not apply. This is a 3 credit course.
- A7. Yes. This type of course is found nationally in virtually all undergraduate visual arts programs in reputable colleges and universities.
- A8. Art studios are so specialized that no existing course could adequaltely incorporate the content of this particular course. By practice, rather than by formal recommendation of some accrediting agency, this type of course is indeed necessary to the practicing artist. Item A7 in one sense serves to address this item.

Section B: Interdisciplinary Implications:

- B1. This course will be taught by one instructor.
- B2. No additional corollary courses will be needed now or later.
- B3. This course content is unique to the Department of Art. It does not conflict with courses in any other department.
- B4. No. The seats in this course must be dedicated to art majors.

Section C: Implementation:

C1. Resources within the department are adequate to meet the needs for this offering.



Faculty: Several faculty are well-qualified to teach

this course.

Space: Existing studio space is adequate.

Equipment: No special or extraordinary equipment is

necessary.

Laboratory Supplies and other Consumable Goods: Furnished by

the student. Art majors are responsible for

furnishing their own supplies.

Library Materials: Adequate.

Travel Funds: Not applicable.

C2. No

C3. This course will be offered each semester. It is not seasonal.

C4. One or two sections initially. Not more than three in any given semester.

C5. Each section will accommodate approximately 22 students.

C6. Normal practice, space, and storage limitations dictate enrollment limitations.

C7. Yes. Due to the Liberal Studies Program and inclusion of this course, elective components will be modified in most instances.
