Writing Summary--AR100 Arts of the Twentieth Century

AR100, Arts of the Twentieth Century is proposed for identification as a "W" course. The course is taught every semester as part of the required core for Art Studio, Art Education, and Art History majors. It is listed as a freshman level course, but there are usually some sophomores who enroll in it. The course is intended to introduce the students to some of the aesthetic ideas, movements, artists, and art forms of the twentieth century.

There are at least five types of writing which occur in this class.

1. Critical reviews -- writing to clarify thinking and enhance seeing.

As part of the course requirements, the students write two critical reviews, each based upon a single art work from specified exhibits in Kipp Gallery. Each review is to be three to four typewritten pages.

The purpose of this writing is to place the students in a position where they must follow a process in criticism which moves sequentially from a factual description of the work to a formal analysis to an interpretation and only then into an evaluation. By writing about an art work the students have to spend more time looking at the work than they would normally take. It compels them to see more carefully and more clearly while it extends their art vocabulary, both verbally and visually. It has them begin to recognize that art doesn't just happen, but is a result of the artist's choices and that those choices affect how we respond to the work. Finally, through the process of writing they begin to understand that, while there may be multiple levels of Interpretation, it has been the artist's choices which lead us to those interpretations. The two reviews are 20% of the final grade.

#### 2. Film reviews

Two film reviews are assigned from a list of films given the students. The films listed are all available in our IUP video library. The students are advised that if they think they may be offended by the content of a listed film they are interested in viewing, they should check with the instructor so alternatives may be suggested. Each review is to be three to four typewritten pages.

There are several purposes for this assignment. It does allow the students to see some of the earlier films which may have had an influence upon current filmmaking, and it has the students think about those films in terms of the times in which they were created. Since film has been more a part of their lives than has either painting or sculpture, they more easily realize how the artists involved have controlled our responses to the work. (Not all our freshman art students have been to a museum to see art, but they have all seen films). Knowing they are to write about the film, the students tend to see with a more critical eye, once again extending their visual and verbal vocabularies and developing their organizational skills. These two reviews are 20% of the final grade.

#### 3. Performance Review

In order to have the students begin to take advantage of cultural events on campus, they are required to attend one performance during the semester. They are to review this performance in a three to four page typewritten paper turned in toward the end of the semester. While this review is not graded, it is read and marked for the student.

#### 4. Note Taking

The required text (and reading assignments from it) is used to supplement lectures, field trips, viewing of art works, documentary and narrative film sequences, performances and discussions. It is important that the student take notes in order to later review information which had been presented during class. Toward the beginning of the semester suggestions are given to help them organize their notes, as well as methods of notating specific art works viewed in class. The notebooks are not graded.

5. Developing questions from material presented in class

Toward the end of a class period the students may be asked to write three questions based upon material covered during the period which they feel would make fair test questions. They are to include the answers which may be single or multiple answers or phrases. A yes or no answer is not accepted. The questions are collected, read, and some are used in constructing the tests. This assignment is not graded.

- 6. Other informal writing assignments. Six to eight times per semester. See example p. 18.
- 7. Tests. Responses vary in length from sentence to short paragraph. Three per semester, including final.

## I. Catalogue Description

Designed to expand student response to visual, aural, and kinetic art forms with special emphasis on recent decades. The course includes lecture, studio and field experiences.

# II. Course Objectives

- 1. Students will be introduced to the Arts of the Twentieth Century with an emphasis on the visual arts of painting, sculpture and printmaking.
- 2. Students will become aware that the arts are constantly changing and will understand some of the social, political, philosophical, and/or economic influences which may have effected the changes.
- 3. Students will realize the arts of our century may also have evolved through a series of challenges or extensions to previous ideas and forms.
- 4. Students will begin to learn and recognize some of the many visual art styles and movements throughout the 20th century and be able to place them into an historical perspective.
- 5. Students will begin to learn, recognize and appreciate some of the styles and contributions of a variety of artists, as well as specific artworks of those artists.
- 6. Students will expand both their visual and verbal vocabularies through the processes of viewing, discussing, and writing about a varied series of artworks, performances, and films.

# III. Course Outline

### 1. Introduction

- A. Beginning with the 19th century French Academy, the paintings of Manet and the Salon de Refuses, the course follows the artistic revolutions in France through Impressionism and Post Impressionism.
- B. This may be paralleled with similar developments in photography, film, and the performing arts emphasizing the social, scientific, economic and political effects upon the aesthetic thinking of the times.
- C. Feldman's critical performance is introduced as one method of criticism. The stages of Description, Formal Analysis, Interpretation, and Evaluation are applied to several works in class discussion. Reviews of works from Kipp Gallery are assigned.

- D. Several concepts are introduced, defined, and illustrated, including:
  - (1) Representational, abstract, and non-objective
  - (2) Form, content, and subject
  - (3) Space (linear and atmospheric perspective)
  - (4) Appropriation and/or quoting
  - (5) The Creative Process
- E. The four printmaking areas (relief, intaglio, lithography, and silkscreen) are introduced, demonstrated and illustrated by works of late 19th and 20th century artists.
- 2. Early 20th Century Directions
  - A. Fauvism and Matisse
  - B. German Expressionism
  - C. Cubism and its Influences
  - D. Futurism
- 3. Early 20th Century Art in America and the Armory Show
- 4. Duchamp, World War I, and Dada
- 5. Surrealism and its Influences
- 6. World War II and Abstract Expressionism
- 7. Post-war Art in Europe
- 8. Johns and Rauchenberg
- 9. Art of the Sixties and Seventies
  - A. Pop
  - B. Post Painterly Abstraction
  - C. Minimal
  - D. 0p
  - E. Realism/Photo-Realism
  - F. Performance Art/Video
  - G. Land Art
- 10. Some Directions of the Eighties
- 11. Film (narrative and documentary) -- As an art form unique to the 20th century, film is examined through a variety of sequences. Film is also used throughout the course as it relates to various art movements or art concepts.
- 12. Theatre, music, and/or dance may be introduced as additional areas of study. As with film, they will be interwoven throughout the course.

The final grade for the course will be determined as follows:

- Tests. Three completion tests (one before mid-term, one after mid-term and the final). see attached due dates sheet given to students each semester.
- 20% Reviews. At least two Kipp Gallery reviews using Feldman's critical performance.

Reviews. At least two film reviews from prepared list. May include one foreign film.

Reviews. At least one performance review of an IUP scheduled performance. Off campus performances are acceptable upon approval.

Rock concerts will not be accepted.

Class participation is expected.

All Reviews are to be 3 to 4 typewritten pages, double spaced. They are to be turned in no later than the dates given during class. They will not be accepted after that date and time.

As an additional page include a sketch/drawing of the work reviewed for my reference while reading your review. Check Kipp Gallery schedule and plan accordingly. (I don't want to hear how frequently you went to the gallery but "it was never open and honestly Mr. Battaglini you have no idea how desperately I really wanted to get in to see the show because just everybody I talked to said how great and professional and creative it was but Kipp was ALWAYS closed and anyway the only work I could see from the front door was too far away so I decided if I couldn't do the job right by seeing it up close I wouldn't do it at all and I knew you would understand.") I won't!

## FILM REVIEW #1

The first film review of a selected film is due on Monday, October 31. You are to select one film to review from the list of films I have given you. The films listed are all available in our IUP video library. Please reserve the film and a viewing space at least 2 days prior to when you plan to watch the film.

At the top of the review include the title of the film, the release date, the director, and any major actors or actresses.

Although the "Critical Performance" can be successfully adapted to include some film criticism, do not use DESCRIPTION to retell the entire plot. Instead, a brief synopsis of 3 or 4 sentences might be sufficient and would allow you more space to better use description in responding to those areas which might have more interest to you and might have more importance to the film which you select.

In addition to plot and dialogue, you could respond to the directing, acting, editing, photography, sets, soundtrack, costumes, lighting, and how any or all of them are used within the film. You could also discuss the structure of the film and the use of the film media in developing both the form and content of the work. These are only suggestions in order to have you begin thinking about how the film director has a control in affecting your response to the film. You may wish to respond to an entirely different aspect of the film. If you present an opinion please defend it with a reason or reasons.

This review is to be 3 to 4 typewritten pages, double spaced, and is to be turned in no later than the date listed above, during class.

Your paper will be graded on a scale of 10 to 0 with 10 being the highest score. It is expected that your paper will have been proof read (edited) prior to being submitted.
