At our September 6, 1990, meeting we approved your design for the Liberal Studies component of the B.S. in Biochemistry degree. In doing so, we only took action on the places where your program deviated from the university-wide program by restricting student choices. (See attached catalog format.) We considered the other information and check lists which you sent us to be your own advising materials and without need for approval. Thus, if the lists of available courses change, as they will, you can make those adjustments "in house."

In the catalog, the foreign language requirement will show as a "College" requirement because it is that rather than a LS requirement. This does not affect your students' ability to use language courses as LS Electives, but the catalog should identify who is responsible for the requirement--in this case the college.

(In going over your advising sheets, one member did note that you might add a notice that at least one of the LS Electives must number 200 or higher. Of course your people will do this with the foreign language--but if you want to cover all the rules, then it should be added.)

We will forward this to the UWUCC so that it can be put on the Senate agenda for final approval.
