- 3. Rationale for change: The proposed revision expands the list of courses from which a student may select for a "controlled elective". This provides students with the opportunity to select a course they feel will add to their professional development. The field of Rehabilitation is broad and this change will help us accommodate the needs of students interested in specializing in diverse aspects of the field.

Part III. Implementation:

- The program revision will have a positive effect on students already in the existing program. Because they will be able to choose from a wider number of controlled electives, they will be better able to tailor their coursework to their professional interests and needs.
- 2. The program revision is not anticipated to affect teaching loads in any appreciable manner. We anticipate that the students will be dispersed relatively evenly among the different courses. Furthermore, they will have several years to complete this 3 credit requirement so their course enrollment will also be dispersed over time.
- 3. There is no apparent reason to anticipate the need for additional resources.
- 4. We do not expect that this change in a controlled elective will have any impact on the number of students enrolled in this major.
