Rationale for Proposed Changes

(A) Why is the program being revised?*	The Deaf Studies Minor needs to reflect 18 credits and 2 courses at the 300 level. The current Deaf Studies Minor is not in the ECR and Lynnan said to create a program revision here. The most recent version was in the 2013-2014 undergraduate catalog (see below). The Deaf Culture course was removed from the major prior to it being placed in moratorium. Deaf Culture is now immersed into the sign language courses. EDHL 465 will not be an elective at this time but EDHL 417 will be an elective. EDHL 317 will be an additional required course. A 2.5 GPA will be required for admittance and inclusion on the transcript.
