EP 202 and EP 388 are being removed from the B.S. in Communications Media as College of Education requirements.

3. Rationale for Change

Several reasons bring about this proposed program revision for the B.S. in Communications Media. The program has not undergone a major revision since 1983 and revisions are needed to bring the program more in line with changes in communications technology, standards and needs. Many of the changes associated with this program revision are a result of the department's 1995 self-study. Information gathered from two external program reviewers, surveys of current students, alumni, and media internship sites has helped focus the department on the changing needs of the communications industry and therefore the program requirements for our students.

The two most significant changes to the overall program requirements are the requirement that students complete a minimum of two production courses in their four year program and the requirement of a summer internship. These are key areas cited throughout the 1995 self-study as being critical for our students. The external reviewers specifically noted that an internship and production courses should be required for students to be competitive in career searches.

New courses have been added, courses have been deleted and many remaining courses have been revised to reflect new content designed to accommodate the changing communications industry. The use of computers in communications, and research and writing in communications were pinpointed as areas needing additional attention in the 1995 self-study. The self study research also indicated a need to de-emphasize courses that use older technology and add courses to the curriculum that would provide students with increased opportunities to learn more computer-based and digital applications.

Courses are added to help students with research, writing, presentation, and oral communication skills with the addition of CM 205, Media Presentation Skills, CM 302, Research in Communications Media and CM 475, Senior Portfolio Presentation.

Two additional prerequisites are being added to department's approved writing intensive courses. The new requirement will be for students to complete EN 101 and EN 202 with a C or better before being permitted to enroll in CM 302, Research in Communications Media, CM 303, Scriptwriting and CM 403, Broadcast Newswriting. This change is made because of the need for students to have sufficient research and writing skills before taking these courses. CM 302 is being proposed as a new writing intensive course and approval from the Liberal Studies committee is pending.

The new numbering of courses more accurately reflects recommended sequencing and a direction for students. We have also sequenced the numbers so each advancing course bears a similar number. For example, CM 240, Communications Graphics, CM 340, Advanced Communications Graphics and CM 440, Multimedia Production would likely be taken in sequence.

The college requirement of EP 202, Educational Psychology is being deleted from our program as a required course for two reasons. First, this course was originally part of the department requirements when more of our students were pursuing careers in the training and education field and needed background in the psychology of learning. Our current students are not pursuing these careers as frequently and their career goals do not typically include areas where instruction would be a significant component of their jobs. EP 202 will now be an option for students as part of their "out of department" electives.

Additionally, the Department of Communications Media has been unique in requiring EP 202. The original concept was that the course would focus on adult learners, adult needs, how adults are called to action... all concepts that would help CM majors create effective messages to reach and teach an audience. The current syllabus



focuses on issues that are covered in our management course. Finally, the option of EP 388, Interpersonal Effectiveness is no longer listed in the Undergraduate Catalog and, according to the Registrar's Office, was placed on inactive status in 1994. The three credits from this change will be added to the **Other Requirements** credit load for courses outside Communications Media.

These out of department courses could include a minor or a group of courses related to Communications Media or courses related to the specific student's career interest. There is no set list of acceptable courses but the 21 credit sequence must have the academic advisor's approval. Students have the opportunity to pursue courses in a variety of related programs that permit non-majors to enroll in courses.

One additional change is to require students to take BE/CO/IM 101 in their freshman year. Because of the number of courses in Communications Media and other departments that utilize computers, students need to have completed this course early in their program.

Part III. Implementation.

1. How will the proposed revision affect students already in the existing program?

Students currently in the B.S. in Communications Media will have no difficulty completing their program by enrolling in the new courses as advanced electives for their major. Current students will have to complete any prerequisites for new courses or prerequisites added to existing courses through course revisions. The current program has a minimal number of required courses and none of the current requirements are being eliminated. Current students will not be expected to complete new required core courses but may enroll in those courses, if they have the appropriate prerequisites. A sample student program for students entering the department under the new requirements can be seen on page 9 of this document.

2. How will the proposed revision affect faculty teaching loads?

A number of courses are being deleted as new courses are being added. The proposed curriculum can be adequately delivered with the existing number of faculty. No additional faculty are being added. Please see the sample faculty rotation on page 8 of this document for an example of how the program could be delivered.

3. Are other resources adequate?

Other resources are adequate. New production courses will be taught in existing facilities. The department will continue to update equipment as funds are available.

4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students as a result of these revisions?

The department does not anticipate significant changes in enrollment from this revision.
