II. Description of the Curriculum Change

1) New Catalog Description

The Department of Criminology offers students seeking careers in criminology a broad liberal arts education that encourages them to think critically about crime and justice issues and also prepares them for careers in the criminal justice system. The degree offered is the Bachelor of Arts with a major in Criminology and the Bachelor of Arts with a major in Criminology Pre-Law. Additionally, students may minor in Criminology. Through the Graduate School the department also offers graduate work at both the master's and doctoral level.

The program in Criminology has a fivefold objective:

- 1. The education of students for employment and leadership in the expanding field of criminology and criminal justice
- 2. The education of presently employed criminal justice personnel who recognize a need for furthering their education
- 3. The instruction of students who wish to acquire an understanding of the processes of criminal justice as a cultural part of their higher education
- 4. The instruction of students who wish to prepare for graduate study and/or research in criminology
- 5. A curriculum that provides an excellent foundation for students preparing for a career in law

Nearly every level of government offers opportunities for professional careers in criminology. For example, employment opportunities normally exist in more than fifty federal agencies (e.g., Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Department of Treasury, Federal Bureau of Prisons). Graduates will also find employment in local and state organizations including law enforcement (e.g., Pennsylvania State Police, various municipal police departments) and correctional agencies (e.g., probation, parole, Pennsylvania Department of Corrections). Additionally, there are a wide variety of opportunities in the expanding fields of private, commercial, and industrial security, including cyber security. Furthermore, many governmental agencies have specialized units dealing with juveniles, community relations, training, education, and research.

Career opportunities are available also in research and teaching at the college and university levels and in research divisions of various agencies.

Students who wish to change their major to Criminology or Criminology/Pre-Law, or to minor in Criminology must have an overall GPA of 2.50 at the time of application to be accepted formally by the department.

3) Rationale for Changes

Rationale for Changes in Liberal Studies

The Liberal Studies specification list for Criminology students is being changed to better prepare our students for the positions they will pursue, be it a position in a criminal justice agency or organization (local, state or federal) or graduate education. Given the fact that much of the information in our discipline is statistical (e.g. the UCR – which provides us with crime rates and the NCVS – which provides us with victimization data), students will now be required to complete MATH 217 Probability and Statistics to insure that they possess a basic understanding of descriptive and inferential statistics. Due to an increased interest in forensic science, we are recommending that Criminology students complete either BIOL 103 and 104 or CHEM 111 and 112. CRIM 101 is specified as a social science course, but it will not count toward major requirements.

- 2) Rationale for changes to major required courses
 - a) Removal of two required courses:
 - i) CRIM 210 Criminal Law is being removed from the major required courses. Given the diverse interests of our majors this course is too narrowly focused to be an effective requirement. This course will remain as a CRIM elective for those interested in this area.

^{*} Data were examined to determine the average number of Criminology credits that graduating Criminology students completed. For Criminology graduates in December, 2001 and May and August, 2002 the average number of IUP Criminology credits taken was 43.28.

- ii) CRIM 300 is being removed from the major required list. Group A of the controlled electives will subsume the content of this course.
- b) Addition of one major required course:
 i) CRIM 403 is being added to the major required course list. It is obvious that nearly every career track for criminology majors includes positions where they will face complex issues and decisions (e.g. use of deadly force, use of certain investigative techniques, appropriateness of the death penalty). This course is developed to provide students with the opportunity to consider such issues and decisions in a classroom setting prior to facing them in real life.
- c) Expansion of Controlled Electives

 The controlled electives are being expanded to insure that students pursuing a B.A. in Criminology complete coursework that focuses on three necessary but distinct areas: the Criminal Justice System, Critical Issues in Criminology, and Diversity Issues in Criminology. While our discipline has no licensing or accrediting body, one of our national organizations, the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS) has developed "minimum standards for criminal justice education". These minimum standards are met with the addition of group A of the controlled electives. Groups B and C are added to insure that our students are receiving requisite coverage of critical issues and issues of diversity in the field of criminology and criminal justice.
- d) Reduction of Criminology Electives

 The number of criminology electives is reduced because of the increase in the number of controlled electives that students will be completing.

3) Other Changes

- a) Minor or concentration is required of all CRIM B.A. students
 To encourage our students to pursue a diversified course of study,
 and to be better prepared for graduate school or a criminal justice
 career, a minor or concentration will be required for graduation.
- b) Reduction in free electives

 Due to the addition of the minor requirement, and the 3-credit increase in the major, the number of free electives must be reduced.

III: Implementation

1) Effect on students in the existing program.

In the transition period, we will continue to regularly offer the courses they are required to complete. Further, we will accommodate students with unique

problems on an individual basis. We anticipate a minimum number of problems, and none that we cannot resolve in the students best interest.

2) Effect on teaching loads.

The revised curriculum will have no effect on teaching load. In fact, because of the addition of the controlled elective groupings, we anticipate being able to offer more seats to our undergraduates (see Appendix A).

No additional faculty will be needed beyond the number currently in the department, provided that the three permanent faculty positions currently held by temporary faculty since recent retirements are retained. These positions should be converted as soon as possible for the continued support of our program.

3) Effect on resources.

The revised curriculum will not require additional resources.

4) Effect on enrollments.

The addition of the controlled electives (especially Group A) will likely result in an increase in the number of seats available for our majors. Further, because our students will be required to complete a minor, we anticipate that this will reduce the demand on criminology elective courses. Otherwise, we do not anticipate these changes to impact enrollments.

IV. Periodic Assessment

- 1) The Criminology Department Curriculum Committee [DCC] will be maintained as a standing committee. The DCC is responsible for evaluating all proposed course additions, deletions, and changes, and making recommendations to the faculty.
 - i. Annual assessment: The final meeting of the year will include an assessment of curriculum changes during the academic year.
 - ii. Five-year review: The DCC will be responsible for a comprehensive review of the curriculum as part of the Department's five-year review. The comprehensive review will include:
 - 1. Review of all changes, additions, and deletions during the five-year period.
 - 2. "Exit" surveys of graduating seniors. The surveys will most likely be distributed at the final scheduling meeting for the senior class. The surveys have not been developed, but will address issues such as:
 - a. Need for coverage of new or different aspects of the discipline
 - b. Perceived strengths of the undergraduate curriculum
 - c. Perceived weaknesses of the undergraduate curriculum
 - iii. Group discussions with faculty members. The discussions will most likely take place at a faculty meeting convened for this purpose. Topics will include, but not be limited to:
 - 1. Need for coverage of new or different aspects of the discipline
 - 2. Perceived strengths of the undergraduate curriculum
 - 3. Perceived weaknesses of the undergraduate curriculum
 - iv. Surveys of the course offerings (available on-line) of similar programs.

^{*} Due to the number of majors (currently about 1000), the Criminology Department schedules group meetings, organized by class year, to distribute registration materials and to present class specific information about scheduling and graduation requirements. We expect to distribute the questionnaires during both fall and spring meetings for graduating seniors.
