Rationale for Proposed Changes

(A) Why is the program being revised?*

The current BS in General Studies degree curriculum has several weaknesses that these revisions will correct.

- The current program is cumbersome and difficult to complete within a 120 credit curriculum, particularly if upper-class students transfer into the GS program from an existing major.
- Requiring 30 credits in a concentration allows the graduate to better meet career expectations.
- Twelve credits within a cognate area allows students to enhance their area of concentration, thus strengthening their overall
 marketability.

IUP's enrollment has been declining for several years, primarily due to the decline in traditional undergraduate enrollment. The population of adult learners has increased in Pennsylvania over the same time frame and there are now more adult learners in the state than 18 to 23 year-olds. These adult learners typically have jobs and cannot enroll in a full-time or face-to-face degree program and need to have a fully online option

We are faced with three trends: declining undergraduate enrollment, an increasing population of adult learners, and more than 1,000,000 individuals who have started but not completed a degree. The best prospect IUP has in maintaining or growing enrollment (and avoiding any unpleasant ramifications as a result of declining enrollment) is with the adult learner population. Other institutions, including Cal U (PASSHE), have developed and implemented online adult degree completion programs.

To address these issues, Developmental Studies would like to revise the current General Studies Bachelor's degree program and use it as a vehicle for engaging adult learners and helping Pennsylvania's citizens achieve degree completion. Our intention is to transform the bachelor's degree program in General Studies into a 100% online bachelor's degree completion program, in addition to the traditional program.

We are emphasizing flexibility because the adult learners enrolling may have completed coursework in any major. This degree has to be offered online because anything other than this could hamper future enrollments and cripple this program.

Revising this program will benefit the University by increasing enrollment and revenue, and generating more degree-holding alumni.

part of the Program Revision.* The BA degree program in General Studies is designed to provide the student with a broad base of knowledge in the liberal studies, while simultaneously permitting them to complete a concentration in a particular content area or field of study at IUP. This concentration may include the requirements of an already existing and approved minor program or a set of pre-approved courses to satisfy the 30 credit concentration requirement. As such, the BA degree program is strengthening its commitment to developing informed, empowered, and responsible learners (expected student learning outcomes), and these expected student learning outcomes are linked directly to the General Studies degree program student learning outcomes, as outlined below. This BA degree program accomplishes this goal by maintaining the focus on a broad liberal studies education (43 credits still required), while providing the opportunity for the student to emphasize a concentration and customize the degree to target necessary skills for future employment. Thus, these students will be able to develop depth of knowledge in a desired content area, when previously they were unable to do so.

Students earning the BA in General Studies will achieve the following learning outcomes:

- Communication Students will communicate effectively using oral, written, and visual means and/or presentations. (Empowered Learner)
- 2. Critical Thinking Students will identify, categorize, and analyze problems and issues, as well as draw appropriate conclusions.

- 3. Quantitative Fluency Students will perform calculations using symbolic operations and provide accurate interpretations and explanations of data.

programs and the Students:* The change in this program will have limited to no impact on other programs at IUP, aside from increasing enrollment in liberal studies and minor course requirements.

On the other hand, the revised curriculum would provide an additional option for students, departments, colleges, and IUP. Specifically it will aid those students who, for various reasons, can not fulfill the requirements of a particular major (GPA, Standardized Test requirements, etc) in obtaining an IUP degree. This outcome can only help retention and overall satisfaction.
