3. Rationale for Changes

The Pennsylvania Department of Education divided the social studies programs into two separate certification areas, Citizenship Education and Social Science Education. To be licensed to teach history, geography, economics, or civics, students must apply for Citizenship Education certification. Students who plan to teach psychology, anthropology, or sociology must apply for Social Science certification. As part of recent Pennsylvania Department of Education accreditation reviews, concerns were raised that if students are going to receive Citizenship Education certification that includes civics, they need to have more than one political science course. American Politics is a logical course to add to address these concerns since the content will be reflected in what graduates themselves potentially will be teaching.

- 2. To make room for the PLSC 111 course addition given the constraints of 120cr and the remaining required course curriculum, SOC 337 made the most sense to eliminate. ECON 121 is a necessary course for completion of the Economics emphasis of this degree plan. Eliminating any additional Economics courses would compromise the core content of the Economics track. ANTH 110 jointly satisfies the Liberal Studies Social Science elective and Non-Western Cultures requirements while PSYC 101 is deemed a critical course for future teachers. Hence, while PLSC 111 also satisfies the Liberal Studies Social Science electives, none of these courses can be substituted. Furthermore, the degree plan needs to include a minimum of two geography and two history courses for the above mentioned reasons since Citizenship Education certification will cover these fields, as well. The College requirements are consistent with requirements for other Bachelor of Science in Education degree options.
- 3. The use of "social studies" in place of "social science" is intended to more clearly delineate courses directly pertaining to the Pennsylvania Department of Education Citizenship Education certification from courses pertaining to the separate Social Science Education certification.
- 4. The 3.0 cumulative GPA requirement for the major should refer to social studies distribution requirements and economics courses rather than social science and history courses.
- 5. The Pennsylvania Department of Education Citizenship Education certification clearly groups history, geography, economics, and political science. Graduates will be hired to teach in one or more areas in which they are certified. Hence, restricting the choice of minors to one of these other three fields best prepares students.
