2b. List of all associated course changes.

There is two changes in this revision:

MATH 125 (3 cr) Calculus I/Physics, Chemistry, and Mathematics replaces MATH 123 (4 cr) Calculus I for Physics, Chemistry, and Mathematics

MATH 216 is being added to the list of statistic courses that can substitute for ECON 355. MATH 216 has a calculus prerequisite, but ECON 355, MATH 214, and MATH 217 do not have a calculus prerequisite. There is no need for a student who has completed MATH 216 to also take ECON 355, MATH 214, or MATH 217. Also, since MATH 216 is required of ECON/MATH majors, it also should be acceptable for General Economics majors.

3. Rationale for Change.

The reason for the change is the Mathematics Department decided to replace MATH 123 which was a two-semester sequence for math and science majors covering the theory of calculus and its application with MATH 125, which is the first course in a three-semester sequence. Currently, students may take MATH 115, MATH 121, or MATH 123 to fulfill the Liberal Studies mathematics requirement. Since MATH 123 will be phased out and replaced by MATH 125, after this revision, students will be able to take MATH 115, MATH 121, or MATH 125.

1. How will the proposed revision affect students already in the existing program?

There will be no effect since MATH 123 and MATH 125 are currently being offered. When MATH 123 is phased out, students will still have three options to fulfill the Liberal Studies mathematics requirement.

2. Are faculty resources adequate?

Faculty resources are adequate since MATH 123 is being phased out and being replaced by MATH 125.

3. Are other resources adequate?

Currently, resources are adequate.

4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students as a result of these revisions? If so, how will the department adjust?

No change is expected.
