Rationale for Proposed Changes

(A) Why is the program being revised?*

Rationale: In Spring 2017, the History Department updated its own Honors Track in light of uncertain future offerings of HIST 487/H . Economics students generally follow career paths linked to business, banking, quantitative and qualitative data analysis, public policy, and international affairs. Hence, as the Honors Track was reviewed following the Senate-approved History Honors Track changes, the Economics Department determined there was a desire to expand potential course offerings for the fourth class to more fully reflect the different career paths typically pursued by graduates of the economics program.

Additionally, as part of this program revision process, it has been determined that the number of LS credits for the BA-Economics and BA-Economics/Pre-Law Track exceeded the upper bound of 48 credits set by PASSHE recently. Hence, included in this proposal is a reduction of the liberal studies electives from 9 cr to 6 cr, with a commensurate increase in free elective credits by 3 cr.
