Rationale for Proposed Changes

(A) Why is the program being revised?*

The course number for MATH 341 Differential Equations had been inadvertently listed incorrectly. The Department of Mathematics has replaced MATH 417 and MATH 418 in their curriculum with MATH 411 and MATH 412, so the Economics Honors Track is being updated to reflect this change in course offerings.

Economics Honors Program Student Learning Outcomes*

Identifying existing knowledge: Locate published research in economics and related fields; locate information on particular topics and issues in economics; search out economic data as well as information about the meaning of data and how they are derived.

Demonstrating command of existing knowledge: Write an abstract for a published journal article; summarize the existing economics literature on a research topic; state succinctly the dimensions of a current economic policy issue and identify relevant policy alternatives; explain key economic concepts and describe how they can be used.

Interpreting existing knowledge: Read and interpret a theoretical analysis, which includes simple mathematical derivations, reported in an economics journal article.

Interpreting and manipulating economic data. Construct tables from already available data; explain how to understand and interpret numerical data found in published tables such as those in The Economic Report of the President; be able to identify patterns and trends in published data such as those contained in the Digest of Educational Statistics; read and interpret a quantitative analysis, including regression results, reported in an economics journal article.

Applying existing knowledge: Prepare a five-page written analysis of a current economic problem question; prepare a two-page critique of peer research based on existing economics literature.

Asking pertinent and penetrating questions. Demonstrate an understanding of questions that stimulate productive discussion (factual, interpretative, and evaluative) and that reflect particular concerns when engaged in discussing economic issues and policies.

Creating new knowledge: Identify and formulate a question or series of questions about some economic issue that will facilitate its investigation; prepare a five-page proposal for a research project; complete a research study with its results contained in a carefully edited fifteen-page paper.
