### Rationale for changes:

- 1) Adding ENGL 122 Introduction to English Studies—which serves as the liberal Studies English literature requirement for majors—to the list of courses exempt from major Elective options merely corrects an oversight since it, like ENGL 121 Humanities Literature, should not count toward the major. Without that addition, students might thus graduate with only 33 credits in the major rather than the 36 that we want to require. (This addition applies to all five tracks.)
- 2) We designed ENGL 321 Persuasive Speech and Writing after creating the Writing Studies Track; it fits just as well in this track as it does in the Language Studies Track. THTR 347 Playwriting is being submitted for crosslisting with ENGL 347 (see Course Proposal), and thus also offers a good option for fulfilling 3 credits of Craft and Genre requirements for the track. With that option for playwriting, adding ENGL 343 Drama as an option for fulfilling the Forms and Theories course allows students to gain experience in both creating and formally studying the genre. Adding ENGL 450 Film Theory to the options for fulfilling 3 credits of Forms and Theories requirements for the track gives students more possibilities for a theory course besides the current 308 Critical Theory.

Yes, faculty resources are adequate. There is no need to increase the total number of courses offerings per semester.

3. Are other resources adequate? (Space, equipment, supplies, travel funds) Yes.

### 4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students as a result of these revisions? If so, how will the department adjust?

Since the Writing Studies Track has already attracted more students to the major, adding ENGL 321 Persuasive Speech and Writing will give students in the track another option to fulfill three credits of required Craft and Genre courses and thus alleviate some of the pressure on creative writing courses. Adding playwriting and drama courses not only gives students in the track more options but may also attract students in Theater wishing to minor or double-major in English. Adding ENGL 450 Film Theory to the options for the Writing Studies Track will increase its chances of attracting enough students to be offered on a regular basis, which it might not if it were only used for the Film Studies Track.

While we have conducted annual student surveys for the last seven or eight years, a more comprehensive questionnaire has been designed (and implemented for the first time in Fall 2008) in order to determine student interest in each track and particular means of fulfilling track requirements. We will continue to fine tune and administer this survey; indeed, student input is essential for determining course rotations for the four tracks in any given year.

A student who completes the Writing Studies Track will be able to

- demonstrate skills in the analysis, construction, and presentation of texts;
- identify and apply productive, effective, and creative approaches to writing tasks for diverse audiences:
- create a portfolio of writing for use in applying to graduate programs or for professional positions.

An essential component of our evaluation plan is assessing a major requirement of the new Capstone course (ENGL 484): portfolios representative of students' work throughout their tenure as English majors. This portfolio will be stored electronically and will include a cover letter in which each student will evaluate his/her skills and knowledge acquired as represented in the portfolio contents; it will be read and evaluated by a subcommittee of the departmental curriculum committee as well as the course instructor.
