#### I. CATALOG DESCRIPTION

#### LA. 201 INTERMEDIATE LATIN

4c-01-4sh

Intermediate Latin. More of the verb system is learned; while grammatical studies continue more emphasis is placed on learning how to read short, intermediate level selections from Latin literature. Oral and written questions continue. Ovid's Metamorphoses is the topic for class discussion and a paper. Liberal Studies credit is given.

### II. COURSE OBJECTIVES

Completion of the indicative tenses.

Learning to handle complex sentences, especially those using indirect statement and subjunctive tenses.

Ability to read aloud and with understanding passages from Latin authors.

Be able to manipulate Latin sentences in drills and exercises.

Be able to give answers to simple oral questions; also be able to answer a wide variety of written questions.

Information is given on Roman history and literature.

Students will read, discuss and analyze short literary selections by classical authors.

#### III. COURSE OUTLINE

In each unit there are sentences for memorization and short poems for close analysis. The drills and exercises are mostly with structures unlike English. In addition, several pages of text from Latin authors are read. Most of the unit is written in Latin. Each unit takes about two weeks.
