Part II. Description of Curriculum Change

1. Catalog Description

Foreign Languages and International Studies for Elementary Teaching

Elementary Education/Early Childhood majors may develop an academic specialty in Spanish and International Studies, which will prepare them to teach in elementary programs where content teaching in the foreign language is the objective. To complete this specialty area, students must: (1) attain a minimum level of Intermediate High speaking proficiency in the target language on the ACTFL/ETS scale; (2) successfully complete a six-week summer study/internship abroad at a site approved by the department (usually the summer following the junior year); (3) successfully complete the student teaching experience in a bilingual or immersion elementary school classroom; and (4) complete the following minimum number of credits in Spanish:

- 4 SP 201 Intermediate Spanish or equivalent oral proficiency rating
- 3 SP 290 Spanish for Elementary Teaching
- 3 SP 221 Intermediate Conversation
- 3 SP 321 Advanced Conversation
- 3 SP 230 Intermediate Composition
- 3 SP 340 Hispanic Civilization
- 3 SP 390 Teaching of Elementary Content Through the Spanish Language
- 3 SP Elective (taken abroad)

Other Requirements:

Students should take either GE 252, PS 387, or AN 274 as their non-western course.

*While the total number of credits required in Spanish in order to attain the desired proficiency level will vary from student to student depending on the entry level of proficiency, most students can expect to complete between 25 and 31 credits.

Students interested in the program should contact the Director of the FLISET Program in the Department of Spanish and Classical Languages.

- 2. Summary of Changes and Justification
- a. The following is a list of each proposed change with a justification.
- (1) As indicated in a separate curriculum proposal, the SP 290 course is being changed from a 6-credit intensive five-week experience to a 3-credit course offered during the regular academic year.
- (2) The SP 230 Composition course is being required in place of the SP 404 Advanced Spanish Grammar course. The SP 230 course will help students' level of proficiency, since it engages them in productive written expression at an early point in their coursework. While the SP 404 course sharpens understanding of subtle grammatical points, it does not offer the opportunity for as much productive language use. Most FLISET students have elected to take SP 230 and found it to be helpful in strengthening their linguistic proficiency.
- (3) The SP 340 Hispanic Civilization course is being required in order to expose students to Hispanic culture prior to their internships abroad. The three credits from this course will take the place of the three credits being eliminated from the SP 290 course.
- (4) Students will take a Spanish elective course as a part of the study abroad internship. The course selected by each student will be appropriate for his or her level of linguistic proficiency. Students have been taking a three-credit elective in Mexico for the past two years. This elective course will take the place of the one controlled elective offered in the old program.

The program revision places no new demands on students, since students have been taking the proposed new required courses anyway in an effort to heighten their proficiency in Spanish. The credit-hour requirement remains the same.

Part III. No new courses are being proposed.

Part IV. Letters of support from the Department of Spanish and Classical Languages and the Department of Professional Studies are attached.

Part V. Additional Questions

- How will this change affect students currently enrolled in the program? The requirements of the new program will take effect with incoming freshmen in Fall 1994. Students currently enrolled in the program will be encouraged to follow the new program, but will not be required to do so.
- How will this change affect faculty teaching loads? No additional teaching burden is anticipated, since there is only one extra course required that is not presently required. may mean an additional 3-4 students in the SP340 course.
- 3. Are other resources adequate? Yes, no impact in this area.
- Do you expect an increase in the number of students enrolled in the program as a result of this change? No, no impact.
